To the Chairman and Members of the
Health Committee,
Twrccelyn Rural District Council.

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present to you the Annual
Report upon the Health of your District for the year 1955.

The Registrar General's mid-year estimates show
that the population of this Sanitary District has remained
virtually unchanged, as was to be expected, in the absence
of either any major Birth Rate change or of the arrival of
any new industry. The change amounted to an increase of
but 30 persons.

This last year was the sixth/succession in which
the Birth Rate of this District has been higher than that
for England & Wales (as a whole) with the exception of 1951
when the figures were virtually equal. It has been the
fourth year in which that figure has been higher than those
applicable to the County. The Stillbirth rate has shown
a startling drop for the year under review, and is now below
that applicable to the County and is 0.8 above the figure
produced by England & Wales as a whole. During the preceding
year, as was pointed out, the figure was nearly double that
for either the County or the Country. No correspondingly
enhanced living environmental factors can be traced for this
sudden reversal.

The total number of Deaths has increased by but 5
to reach a figure of 135, there having been a preponderance
of female to male deaths in contrast to the former years.
The Death Rate per 1,000 population corrected for Age & Sex
composition shows a slight variation from 11.9 to 12.6
compared with 13.6 for the County.

Of the various causes of Death the group of
malignant Diseases (Cancer) has caused 19 deaths as compared
with 31 during the preceding year and 13 for the year
previous to that. Lung cancer equals Respiratory Tuberculosis
in producing 2 deaths. Causes of Deaths attributable to
cardiac and vascular factors (heart and blood vessels)
have remained constant.

Apart from the usual Juvenile Infectious
Diseases, such as measles and whooping cough, there have been
no epidemics such as of Intestinal infections, nor any
occurrences of poliomyelitis. Yet again, the Local Health
Authority's whooping cough immunisation drive has resulted
in only 20 cases of this infantile scourge as compared with
nearly 90 cases of two years ago.

It is satisfactory to realise that there are now
no manufacturers of Ice Cream within this District - all the
supplies of this increasingly popular but potentially
dangerous commodity being now pre-packed. The number of
Ice Cream retailer remains unchanged. Bacteriological
reports upon samples of Ice-Cream taken, show that 70%

were of Grade I quality. That figure compares with 69.9% for the preceding year and 64.2% for the year previous to that. It is to be hoped that Grade IV quality will be eliminated completely; 5% of this grade was found this year compared with 11.3% of two years ago.

It is more than unfortunate that unforeseen tendering difficulties have prevented the commencement of work upon the much needed provision of a modern Sewerage Scheme for Cemaes. For, as was pointed out in the Annual Report for 1953 this seaside village, which already possesses a Mains water supply (that would, of itself, increase the Sewage Infection risk in some ways) is of increasing tourist popularity. These above observations apply as strongly to the similar holiday resorts at Moelfre and at Benllech.

The Public Health risk continues in Llanerchymedd from a lack of a Sewerage Scheme. The Council having considered the advisability of such schemes, action was taken under the Ministry of Housing and Local Government Circular 54/52 (Wales) in relation to Sewerage Schemes for Llanerchymedd, Moelfre and Benllech.

It is to be hoped that, as soon as the commencement is made upon the Cemaes scheme, the schemes in relation to the above named three communities will receive their deserts.

Yet again, as with other Local Housing Authorities, difficult tenancy selection decisions have had to be made in view of the known feckless antecedent social history of some applicants. As has been pointed out before, always in such cases, it is the luckless child victims of their own parents irresponsibilities who (the adult population of the future) suffer the worst in such cases, it might appear that the purchase and restoration to a sufficiency of sanitary standard of present substandard property, might be the all round better solution.

In conclusion, I should, yet again, like to thank the Chairmen and Members for their interest, and the Clerk, Public Health Inspector and Officers of the Council for their willing co-operation and help.

Vaccination against Tuberculosis.

B.C.G. vaccination is carried out by the Chest Physician in collaboration with the County Medical Officer and his staff. The scheme provides for the vaccination of new born infants born into tuberculous households and of tuberculin negative contacts of known cases. During 1955, 9 such vaccinations were carried out in the District.

Diphtheria Immunisation.

A total number of 127 children were immunised during the year, of these, 109 were immunised against Whooping Cough.

WATER SUPPLIES.

As stated in the report for 1954, the Anglesey County Council took over this Council's water undertakings on the 1st October, 1954. Thus any visits which were made by me in this connection, related to water supplies for improvement grants under the Housing Act 1949.

The following villages and hamlets are supplied with mains waters:- Cemais Bay, Tregole, Llanfechell, Llanerchymedd, Benllech Bay, Llanbedrgoch, Red Wharf Bay, Moelfre, Brynteg, Marianglas, Maenaddfryn, Parc, Penysarn and Capel Coch.

On December 31st, 1955, 761 properties were connected to the mains, an increase of about 161 properties. The number of stand-posts remained at 39.

It is estimated that population served by a mains supply is about 3,500.
