the Health Committee,
Trecelyn Rural District Council,

Mr. Chairman, Lady and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present to you the Annual Report upon the health of your Sanitary/Housing District for the year 1970. Your population, after being stationary at 9,770 for the two previous years in succession, has now, according to the mid year figures of the Registrar General, increased by 220 to the current 9,990. There had been an increase of 260 during 1967.

The population uncertainty of the last several years due to variations necessarily associated with any major constructional project, will now reflect more reliably the true picture, with that project becoming commissioned. Your Rateable Value has increased from £212,029 to £219,688, and a Penny Rate productivity has increased from £836 to £857.

In terms of planning for future needs, your Birth Rate decreased from 1955 to 1959 followed by an increase in 1960, an upward trend that continued to 1963 when the Rate was 18.87. By 1966 the rate figure had reached 21.7. The year 1968 reflected a figure of 24.7 (when that of the whole County was 18.6). In 1969 the Corrected Birth Rate was 24.5 (Anglesey 18.9 and England & Wales as a whole 16.3). The current figure stands at 23.6 (Anglesey 18.0 and England and Wales 16.0).

The corrected Death Rate stands at 11.4 as compared with 11.2 for Anglesey as a whole and 11.7 for England and Wales. The Infant Mortality Rate of 6.0 compared with the County's corresponding figure of 8.0. Of the uses of Deaths (of all ages) it is pleasing to note that there was not a single occurrence from Tuberculosis, but cancer deaths appreciably increased from 19 to 32 and of these Lung Cancer increased from 2 to 7.

Of Infectious Disease occurrences there was but one case of Tuberculosis notified, but an appreciable increase of Infective Hepatitis which conforms with a Nationwide increase which is being researched centrally from the Ministry with at present several possible theories being followed up. No doubt the ultimate Report will be made Public.

The accompanying Annual Report of the Surveyor/Public Health Inspector is, I think, you will agree, entirely self explanatory and makes laudatory reading in its implication of maintenance and progression. Of particular note is evidence of the Council's intentions in the direction of sewage scheme coverage for its population with the pre-existing schemes to be extended by providing coverage for the communities of Rhosybol, Talwrn etc. The local desire for the now completed Llanfischell scheme is evidenced by the fact that although completed only in the latter half of the year, yet, by the year's close already 110 properties had been connected, providing that number more families with a public service that is, of course now, in this day and age considered not a luxury but a moral entitlement. This latter fact should be borne in mind when considering the long overdue scheme for the Penysarn, Llanelilian, Nabo and Pongorffwysfa area. As will be remembered only too well, the Council desired this scheme a long time ago and in fact it was in 1967 that the Public Enquiry was held, to be followed by Ministerial refusal and by continued frustration for the Council relative to an accepted tourist area. This delay of sanction has of course (though no fault of the Council) been a most costly one due to the (to be anticipated) increasing material and labour cost. And, in fact, although the now, at last, sanctioned scheme is considerably watered down from the Council's original intentions, yet the overall cost will be a very considerably increased one. May this lesson be not forgotten, elsewhere, when consideration is applied to the desired schemes for Rhosybol and Talwrn.

The Surveyor's comments that the area is now substantially maine. water supply served should be read with the realisation of the proverbial factor that water supply provision and sewerage provision are parallels, the one to the other.

The completion of 80 new dwellings coupled with a fortunately greatly accelerated improvement grant application of no less than 81, as to the former 33 collectively spolls progress towards increasing modernisation of the population's dwelling circumstances.

In conclusion I should like to thank the Chairman and Members and also the Clerk and the Public Health Inspectors for their all time ready co-operation and assistance.

The existing sewerage schemes were working satisfactorily during the year.

Six bungalows were built by the Council at Carreglefn during the year. 29 Council dwellings were under construction in the parishes of Llanbadrig, Llanfechell and Rhodogeidio.

There was a slight increase in the number of new dwellings built privately, namely 68 as against 60 in 1969.

Following the introduction of the 1969 Housing Act, there was an increase in the number of improvement grants as can be seen :- from 33 to 81.

The work on the Llanfechell Sewerage Scheme was completed during the year. By the 31st December 110 properties had been connected to the system.
