

Rivers and Streams.

The Olway Brook has been cleaned out, and river pollution has been minimised.

Water.

A pipe supply remains satisfactory with the exception of houses on a high level. Steps are being taken to remedy the latter.

Scavenging.

Collection of House Refuse is done weekly, and the refuse carted to a distance and disposed of.

The Streets are daily cleaned, and the refuse disposed of.

All Surface Traps are daily inspected, and disinfected regularly during the summer months.

Sewerage and Sewage Disposal.

The Sewage Beds and Filters in connection with Sewage System are regularly inspected and suitably dealt with.

This is carried out thoroughly and efficiently by the Inspector daily inspections having been made during the year.

Prevalence, and Control over, Infectious Diseases.

The incidence of Infectious Disease was very slight.

The prompt notification by Schools of Infectious Diseases is a great help in the prevention of the spread of these diseases.

Disinfection and fumigation by formalin lamp is carried out in all cases of houses in which infectious disease has occurred.

No Malaria or Dysentery occurred in the Area.

Pathological and Bacteriological examinations are carried out at the County Laboratory, and a supply of Anti-Diphtheritic Serum is always available, as is also Streptocide.
