

TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE VAYNOR AND PENDERYN RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL.

GENTLEMEN,-

The Welsh Board of Health has intimated that the Minister has directed that while for the present he is satisfied that the Annual Reports of Medical Officers of Health should not be discontinued, he is of opinion that they should be considerably shortened. These reports, it is suggested, should be confined to essential and urgent matters which had affected the public health during the past year, especially matters arising from the war, and of Infectious Disease. It was added that the annual returns of the Registrar General would not be available until July. These returns reached me on October 1st.

Topography.—The district consists of Three Parishes of Vaynor, Penderyn, and Ystradfellte, in the Southern part of the County of Brecon, the Brecknock Beacons and their foot hills form the Northern boundary of the District, and the Southern boundary is formed by the Districts of Merthyr Tydfil, Aberdare, and Neath Rural in the County of Glamorgan. The district is hilly, and the elevation varies from 263 feet to 2,250 feet.

Area.—The total area of the district is 39,271 acres, and has an average length of 8 miles, and a width of 12 miles.

The decrease from 1921 to 1931 of the three Parishes was 9.8 per cent.

SOCIAL CONDITIONS.

The population per acre for the Rural District is only .14⁻ It is sparsely scattered over a wide area, except for four or five villages in Vaynor and Penderyn, the Parish of Ystradfellte has a density of only .033 per acre; the principal occupation is in the coal mines of the adjoining districts of Merthyr, Aberdare and Neath. Some of the inhabitants are employed in the quarrying of local stone. The remainder are engaged in agriculture, mostly sheep farming. There has been, and still is, considerable unemployment in the district, principally due to the restricted coal industry in the local coalfield.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Births.—The Births in the Rural District numbered 77, compared with 67 in 1938 and 68 in 1937. Illegitimate Births were 4.

Birth Rate.—The rate of live births per 1,000 of the population was therefore 14.6, compared with 12.79 in the previous year and 12.88 in 1937. The Birth Rate for England and Wales in 1939 is given by the Registrar General as 15.6, and that for Brecon County in 1938 was 13.96.

Still Births numbered 5, compared with 8 in 1938. The rate of Still Births in the District was .95, compared with 1.5 in 1938. The rate in England and Wales for 1939 was .59, and that of Brecon County in 1938 was .92. This rate is excessive in this district but shows some improvement at the higher birth rate and the lower still birth rate suggests some increase in the prosperity of the district.

Live Births were: legitimate, 40 males and 33 females, making a total of 73. Illegitimate, 2 males and 2 females, making a total of 4. There was no still born illegitimate child.

The rate of Still Births per 1,000 of the population was 64.

DEATHS.

The total number of deaths recorded, which included 15 deaths of residents occurring out of the district, and excluding one death of a non-resident, was 79 (47 males, 32 females) compared with 87 in the previous year.

Death Rate.—Calculated on the average population was 15 per 1,000. The rate for 1938 was 16.69. The rate for England and Wales, as furnished by the Registrar General in 1939, was 12.1 per 1,000, and that for Brecon County in 1938 was 12.89 per 1,000.

Deaths from Puerperal Causes.—There was no death assigned to these causes during the year.

Deaths of Infants under one year of age.—There were 7 deaths of infants under 1 year old, 5 males and 2 females, one of them was an illegitimate child. In respect of these, 7 deaths were assigned to premature birth or congenital debility; 2 to convulsions; 1 to gastro enteritis; 1 to pre-natal illness of the mother. In one case an inquest was held (death due to convulsions). Two of the infants died in hospital.

Death Rate of Infants under one year of age, per 1,000 live births was 90.9. Legitimate infants, 82 per 1,000 legitimate live births, and illegitimate infants per 1,000 illegitimate live births, 250.

Death from Cancer.—All ages, 10 (8 males, 2 females).

There were no deaths from measles, whooping cough or any other notifiable disease other than Tuberculosis, and there was no death from diarrhoea under 2 years of age.

Other Causes of Death include 23 from Heart Diseases; 6 from Tuberculosis; 7 from Bronchitis and forms of Pneumonia; 7 from Cerebrol Haemorrhage; 8 from Senility.

Causes of Sickness.—I have no evidence that unemployment has exercised any significant influence on the health or physique of the inhabitants.

HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA.

• Officers.—The Medical Officer of Health possesses the D.P.H. The Sanitary Inspector, who is also the Sanitary Engineer Surveyor, has the Diploma of the Royal Sanitary Institute, and has a certificate for Meat Inspection; he has one clerk. Another Sanitary Inspector, in my opinion, is necessary.

Laboratory Services.—The services of R. Pendrill Charles, Esq., I.C.S. Public Analyst and Bacteriologist, are frequently used, and samples of milk are also sent to Aberystwyth University College.

Ambulance Facilities.—These are adequately provided for the local hospitals, and the Council has recently made arrangements to extend such provision to the smaller villages and outlying districts.

Nursing in the Homes.—Grant in aid is given to Cefn Coed Nursing Association for mid-wifery, health visiting and schoolnursing by the County Council, and a whole-time midwife is provided by the County Council for Penderyn and Ystradfellte.

Treatment Centres and Clinics.—Maternity and Child Welfare Clinics are in existence at Cefn Coed and at Hirwaun.

Tuberculosis Centres.—There is no Tuberculosis Centre for diagnosis and treatment of cases of tuberculosis in the district; such cases are seen at the Centres at Merthyr and Aberdare.

Hospitals (Public and Voluntary).—The Public Institution Hospital for the district is at Brecon. Good provision for sickness and accidents is afforded by the Merthyr General Hospital and Aberdare Hospital. There is no hospital for Infectious Disease, and arrangements exist for the admission of both cases to Mardy Hospital, Merthyr, when possible, although a Joint County Hospital for such cases at Brecon has been approved but sanction to proceed with the work has not been given during the war emergency.

Milk Supply.—Farms and Dairies are visited, and samples of milk have been sent for bacteriological examination. In one instance it was found that milk was being sent to a dairy where a case of tuberculosis had been reported. The dairy was closed and a new dairy was provided elsewhere.

Meat and Other Foods.—These have been kept under regular observation, and the only slaughterhouse in the district visited when slaughtering has been carried on, by the Sanitary Inspector, who has a meat inspection certificate. Shops where meat and other foods are for sale are also inspected.

Non-notified Deaths from Tuberculosis.—There was one such death. This occurred in a Public Institution, and it was stated that it was supposed that the case had been notified prior to admission. It was a case of Tuberculosis Meningitis, and no action was taken, except drawing attention to the omission. There is no evidence to suppose any particular occupation caused excess of cases of Tuberculosis.

HOUSING.

Up to 31st December, 1939, 94 new houses had been executed and occupied to deal with Slum Clearance and overcrowding, namely 44 houses at Cefn Coed and 50 houses at Hirwaun, and 8 houses at Hirwaun were in course of erection at the outbreak of the war. Their completion was suspended, but later in the Spring of 1940 permission was given to complete them. The Council has prepared plans and secured sites by purchase or arbitration for a further 99 houses, viz., 77 houses at Cefn Coed, 6 at Pontsticill, 6 at Penderyn, and 10 at Pontneathvaughan. These will be erected as soon as sanction is given, and the total number of 201 houses will, in a great measure, deal with the question of insanitary houses and overcrowding in the district.

EVACUATION.

The Council made complete preparation for the reception of evacuees which it was anticipated might be sent into the area, and provided and equipped a hostel of 12 beds, but up to the present no assignment of such cases has been made to the district.

DRAINING AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL.

I have to record that the sewerings and disposal works at Penderyn has now been completed, and the villages of Cefn Coed, Pontsticill, Hirwaun, Penderyn and Pontneathvaughan have now been provided in this respect. The small hamlet at Ystradfellte remains to be undertaken, and the modernising of the outfall works at Hirwaun should receive early attention.
