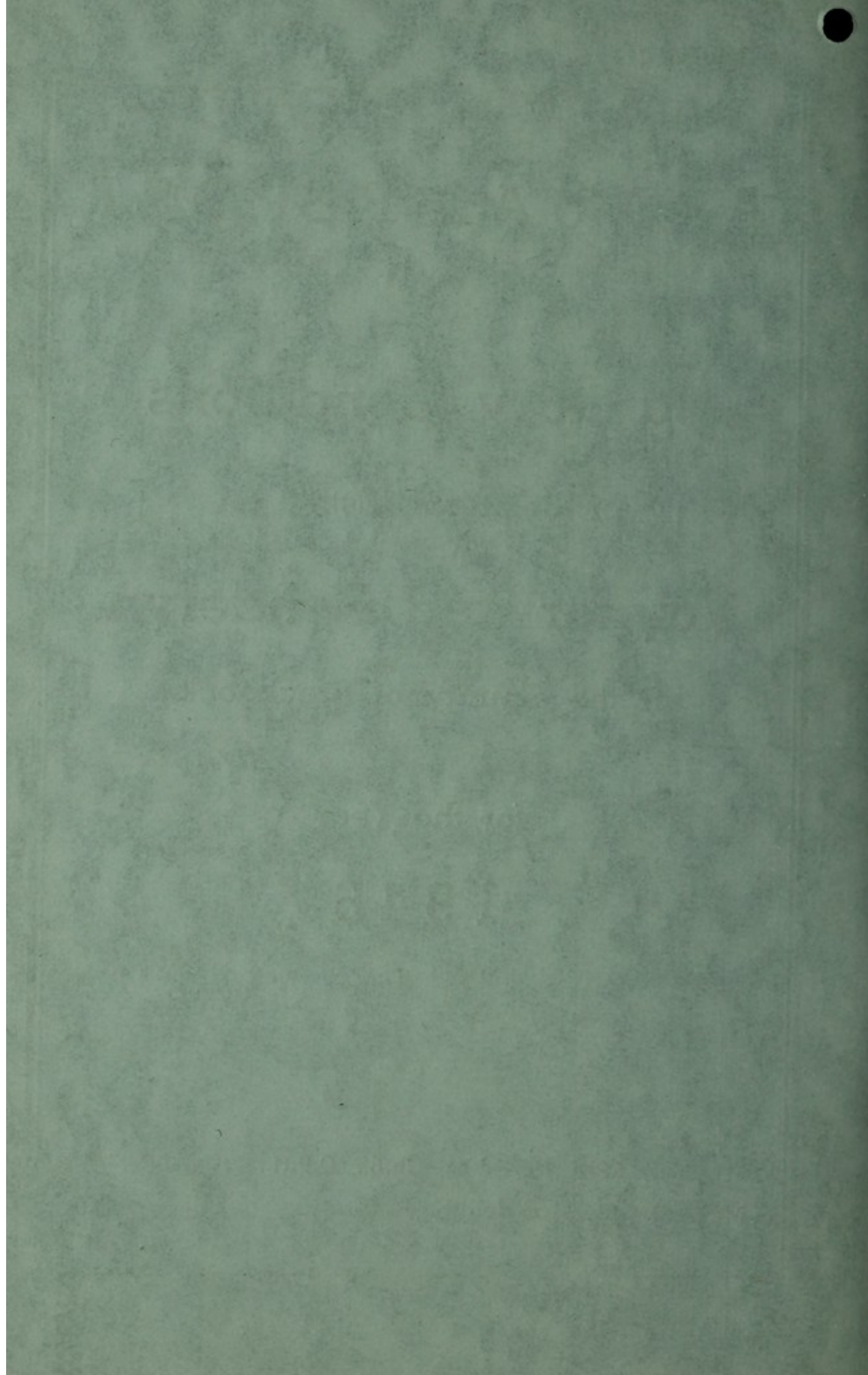

To the Chairman and Members of the Vaynor and Penderyn Rural District Council.

Gentlemen—

I beg to submit for your consideration, the Annual Report of the Sanitary Conditions existing, and the Vital Statistics relating to the Rural District for the year 1946. The report is in accordance with the Memorandum issued by the Ministry of Health.

In 1939 it was estimated that 202 new houses would be required for the housing needs of the area, 102 were erected, leaving 100 to be built when the war broke out. The Council then contemplated enlarging their estates at Bryntaf, Cefn Coed, and at Maescynon, Hirwaun, and, also at a future date to erect houses at Pontneathvaughan and at Pontsticill. During the year 1946, the Council's housing programme re-commenced after a lapse of seven years, when a new housing site was prepared at Maesgarreg for the erection of thirty-four prefabricated bungalows, of which six were occupied by December, 1946.

Work was commenced on the Maesgwynne Site, Cefn Coed, to provide 28 houses adjoining the new Teddington Controls Factory Site.

At Hirwaun, site preparation was carried on at the Maescynon (No. 2) Site, for the erection of 60 B.I.S.F. Houses.

The provision of these houses will help alleviate the serious overcrowding that has occurred in the area through the return of young married couples and ex-servicemen, who have been forced to live in apartments or share their parents' homes, owing to the lack of houses in the area.

The restrictions imposed on owners of houses in the area by the shortage of material and labour, has caused great hardship in repairing and decorating houses. Every effort has been made to help owners to repair premises by the issue of Building Licences and certificates for the supply of materials under the Control of Civil Building. It is regretted that in many cases the scarcity of supplies prevented the repairs to be carried out in detail and only essential repairs were carried out as required by Statutory Notice.

The survey of the housing conditions in the rural area has been continued and complete records are being obtained of the condition of "working class" houses in the area, as a basis for a programme of improvement of housing conditions over a period of years. This survey, in conjunction with the Housing Application Register, will give an indication of the number of houses required to be built in the area under the Housing Programme which has been commenced during the present year.

During the year, the work required to be carried out in connection with infestation control in sewers and buildings as required by the Infestation Order, 1943, of the Ministry of Food, has been carried out by the Council's Rodent Operator under the direction of the Sanitary Inspector. The Council's sewers have been treated with satisfactory results in conjunction with the Block Control treatment of river banks and refuse tips. The results of these disinfection treatments have shown that the major infestation occurs near refuse tips, more especially where there is a river in close proximity. Difficulty has been experienced in ridding the older type cottages near the river banks, of vermin, but the infestation has been overcome by periodic baiting of the river banks passing through the villages.

BOUNDARIES.

PARISH OF VAYNOR.—*East Side.* The Taf Fechan River from its Junction with the Taf Fawr River as far as the junction with the Car Brook.

North Side.—From Car Brook to the junction of the Llysiog Brook with the Taf Fawr River.

West Side.—Taf Fawr River from its junction with the Taf Fechan River to the junction of the Llysiog Brook and the Taf Fawr River.

PARISH OF PENDERYN.—*East Side.* The Taf Fawr River from the Ffrwd Brook to Nantygourgarn.

North Side. From Nantygourgarn, where it joins the River Hepste, to the junction of the River Hepste and Mellte, and from Mellte River to Dinas Rock.

South Side.—From Dinas Rock, following Cwmnant Brook to the Cynon River near Lleity Rhys, and the Cynon River as far as the junction of Nant Hir at Cwm Ynys Mwn Tan, and following Nant Hir Brook to Nant Ffrwd Brook to its junction with the Taf Fawr River.

PARAISH OF YSTRADFELLTE. *North Side.* From Carn-yr-Onen to Nant-yr-Eira.

South Side.—From Heol-Las to Scwd Eira, and along the Afon Mellte to the bridge at Pontneathvaughan.

East Side.—From Nant-yr-Eira to Blaen Hepste and along the River Hepste to Heol-Las.

West Side.—Afon Nedd at Pontneathvaughan Bridge to Nant-y-Bryn and Nant-y-Bryn to Carn-yr-Onen.

TOPOGRAPHY.

The Rural District comprises the three Parishes of Vaynor, Penderyn and Ystradfellte, in the County of Brecon. The Parish of Ystradfellte which had been administered by the Neath Rural District Council, was added to this Rural District by a Review Order of April 1st, 1934.

The three Parishes comprised in this Rural District are of considerable extent. The total area being 39,271 acres, or over 61 square miles with an average length of 8 miles and a width of about 12 miles, they are situated on the southern boundary of the County of Brecon, and adjoin the districts of Neath, Aberdare and Merthyr Tydfil, in the County of Glamorgan. They form four valleys in the foothills of the south escarpment of the Brecknockshire Beacons with high table lands between.

The PARAISH OF VAYNOR comprises two valleys running northwards towards two spurs of the Brecknock Beacons, and the PARISH OF PENDERYN consists of high tableland adjoining and emerging towards the same mountainous area. These rural Parishes are only separated by the narrow streams already mentioned from the County of Glamorgan, and the important populous Urban Districts of Aberdare and Merthyr Tydfil on the south. THE PARISH OF YSTRADFELLTE presents similar physical features extending from the rugged Van mountains to the north covering a rough hilly tableland intersected by two very narrow valleys converging towards an apex at Pontneathvaughan.

ELEVATION.

The district as a whole is at a great elevation above sea level, varying from 263 feet to no less than 2,250 feet ; it will be realised

that the nearly 40,000 acres contained in the area includes a considerable amount of sparsely inhabited mountain land. In the Parish of Vaynor, the levels extend from 645 feet near Cefn Bridge to 1,612 feet at Twyn-y-Croes on the mountain above Cwm Glais. Penderyn Parish presents levels varying from 588 feet at Cynon Bridge, Hirwaun, to 1,376 feet at the top of Twyn, Cadlan, while the Parish of Ystradfellte contains such extreme variations of level as 263 feet at the bridge at Pontneathvaughan, and 2,250 feet near the top of Fan Fawr, which mountain is partly in the parish.

CLIMATE.

The proximity of the well-known range of mountains known as the Brecknock Beacons accounts for the rather heavy rainfall that prevails. Some of the largest reservoirs in Wales are partly in the Rural District.

VITAL STATISTICS.

BIRTHS. The births registered in the district in 1946 numbered 85 (male 49, female 36), the annual birth rate being 16.47 per 1,000. The county rate in 1943 was 15.96, 17.87 in 1944, 16.42 in 1945 and 17.77 in 1946. The birth rate in this area in 1946 was 16.47, compared with 18.4 in 1945, 17.3 in 1944 and 9.07 in 1943. Of the total births in the area 2 female were illegitimate.

STILL-BIRTHS. These numbered 4, the rate per 1,000 of the population being 0.70, the county rate being 0.67, and for England and Wales 0.53 per 1,000.

DEATHS. The total number of deaths assigned to this area was 69 (33 males, and 36 females); this figure takes into account 22 inward transferable deaths during the year. There were 3 outward transfers. The death rate for 1946 was 13.37, compared with 16.08 for 1945, 13.0 for 1944 and 14.4 for 1943. The county rate for 1946 was 13.25, as against 14.1 for 1945, 12.12 for 1944 and 13.18 for 1943. The death rate for England and Wales for 1946 was given as 11.5, compared with 11.4 per 1,000 for 1945, 11.6 per 1,000 for 1944 and 12.1 per 1,000 for 1943.

DEATHS OF INFANTS UNDER ONE YEAR OF AGE. These numbered 4 being 4 less than the previous year. 2 were male and 2 were female.

It is to be noted that the number of deaths was 4 less than the previous year, and that the infant mortality rate has decreased from 85.1 to 47.0 per 1,000 births.

DEATHS UNDER ONE YEAR FROM DIARRHOEA. No deaths were recorded under this heading.

DEATHS FROM PUERPERAL SEPSIS, ETC. One death from a puerperal cause was notified during the year.

DEATHS FROM CANCER. Deaths from all forms of Cancer remain very high, numbering 8 for 1946, compared with 11 for 1945, 14 for 1944 and 7 for 1943. There were 4 male and 4 female deaths.

The percentage of the total deaths from all causes was 11.6 for 1946. This treacherous disease has taken a great toll of life and the facilities for proper treatment of this disease have been limited but at the time of writing modern facilities for diagnosis and treatment are available.

DEATHS FORM TUBERCULOSIS. Tuberculosis was responsible for 5 female deaths, the percentage of the total deaths being 7.2, compared with 7.3 for 1945, and 3.03 for 1944.

DEATHS FROM HEART DISEASE. Heart Disease was responsible for 13 male and 8 female deaths making a total of 21, the percentage of the total deaths being 30.42, compared with 23.1 for 1945.

DEATHS FROM BRONCHITIS. Bronchitis was responsible for 3 deaths (2 male and 1 female) making the percentage of total deaths 4.3, compared with 2.4 for 1945.

HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA.

LABORATORY SERVICES FOR THE AREA. Dr. R. Pendrill Charles, who is Public Analyst for many authorities, has been responsible for the analysis of milk supplies and water. It was felt, however, having regard to the fact that the Emergency Public Health Laboratory at Cardiff was in closer proximity, that a more expeditious service would be obtained by submitting milk and water samples, as well as swabs, to this laboratory.

AMBULANCE FACILITIES. These are available from Merthyr and Aberdare General Hospitals, and from the Mardy Isolation Hospital, Merthyr. Arrangements exist for ambulance facilities for Ystradfellte and Hepste with the Priory for Wales; and for Pontneathvaughan with the Neath R.D.C., as reported previously.

NURSING AT HOME. This is undertaken by voluntary associations, assisted by grants from the County Council.

CLINICS. Clinics are carried out by the County Council for expectant mothers and infant welfare at Cefn Coed and Penderyn.

HOSPITALS. Owing to the close proximity of the area to Urban Areas like Merthyr Tydfil and Aberdare, we are fortunate in our hospital facilities. With regard to hospitals for infectious disease, an agreement has been reached with the Merthyr Corporation to nurse infectious diseases from our area at the Mardy Isolation at a cost of £4 4s. 0d. per week, plus ambulance fees. I am advised that there was a project on prior to the war for the erection of an Infectious Diseases Hospital in Brecon.

WATER SUPPLY. The district has been reasonably satisfactorily supplied with a good water supply. Cefn Coed from the mains of the Taf Fechan Water Board ; Pontneathvaughan is supplied by the mains of Neath Rural District Council ; Hirwaun is supplied by the mains of Aberdare Urban District Council.

Penderyn is supplied by mains from the Cadlan and Ogof-fawr regions. This supply is chlorinated at the Cadlan pump-house by means of a semi-automatic apparatus installed during 1944 by Messrs Bobby of Rickmansworth, and is giving satisfactory service.

In the village of Ystradfellte, which comprises 10 houses, a school and some scattered farms, unfortunately, there is no water supply for the main. The Council has been very concerned about this matter, and has approached the Neath R.D.C. on several occasions for a piped supply. The objection raised to this has been that the pressure at these points has been too high. This does not seem to me to be an insuperable difficulty. It is necessary that this sanitary defect should be remedied, for it is perfectly obvious that no efficient cleansing of utensils in farms where milk is produced or washing down of udders and flanks of cows can take place without a good and sufficient water supply, which, at the present time, does not exist.

DRAINAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL WORKS. The Council has now provided efficient drainage and sewage works for all the area, except the small village of Ystradfellte, where a small sewage disposal works was under contemplation prior to the outbreak of war. This proposal has of necessity been suspended. The Hirwaun Sewage Works needs to be modernised and this will undoubtedly have your consideration with the cessation of hostilities.

REFUSE COLLECTION. This collection takes place three days weekly in the Cefn Coed and Hirwaun districts; twice weekly at Pontneathvaughan; once a week at Pontsticill and Ystradfellte. There is only one motor lorry, which is owned by the Council itself. It appears to me that the question of an incinerator at Hirwaun should be examined very seriously in the near future.

MILK, MEATS AND OTHER FOODS. Since the outbreak of war, as you are aware, meat is being slaughtered in the Government Central Slaughterhouses, where the meat is inspected before delivery. There are no such slaughterhouses in our area. A close inspection of meat and other foods is made in retail establishments in this area.

Dairies and cowsheds have been inspected during the year. Many of the existing cowsheds, though clean, require modernisation. The co-operation of the County Agricultural Committee has been sought to provide grants for water supplies to farms.

64 milk samples have been taken for bacteriological examination and for keeping qualities. The bulk of the milk produced in the area is sold to Milk Depots where it is Pasteurised.
