

# To the Chairman and Members of the Vaynor and Penderyn Rural District Council.

Gentlemen.

I have the honour of presenting the Annual Report on the Health and Sanitary Conditions, and the Vital Statistics relating to the Rural District for the year 1949. The Report is submitted in accordance with the Memorandum issued by the Welsh Board of Health.

On the 1st April, 1949, Dr. D. M. I. Harmar, was appointed as Medical Officer of Health for the Southern Combined District of Breconshire, which includes this area. He resigned and vacated his appointment on the 6th October, 1949. I have acted as your Medical Officer of Health for the Vaynor and Penderyn Rural District Council for the remaining portions of the year.

The greatest problem of this Council during the year has been housing and it is most gratifying to report that the number of post-war houses erected in the area to the end of December, 1949 is 236. These houses have been built in various parts of the Council's area and have helped to relieve the serious overcrowding which has occurred since the end of the war.

#### BOUNDARIES.

PARISH OF VAYNOR—East Side. The Taf Fechan River from its junction with the Taf Fawr River as far as the junction with the Car Brook.

North Side. From Car Brook to the junction of the Llysiog Brook with the Taf Fawr River.

West Side. Taf Fawr River from its junction with the Taf Fechan River to the junction of the Llysiog Brook and the Taf Fawr River.

PARISH OF PENDERYN—East Side. The Taf Fawr River from the Ffrwd Brook to Nantygourgan.

North Side. From Nantygourgan, where it joins the River Hepste, to the junction of the Rivers Hepste and Mellte, and from Mellte River to Dinas Rock.

South Side. From Dinas Rock, following Cwmnant Brook to the Cynon River near Llety Rhys, and the Cynon River as far as the junction of Nant Hir at Cwm Ynys Mwn Tan, and following Nant Hir Brook to Nant Ffrwd Brook to its junction with the Taf Fawr River.

PARISH OF YSTRADFELLTE—North Side. From Carn-yr-Onen to Nant-yr-Eira.

South Side. From Heol-Las to Scwd Eira, and along the Afon Mellte to the Bridge at Pontneathvaughan.

East Side. From Nant-yr-Eira to Blaen Hepste and along the River Hepste to Heol-Las.

West Side. Afon Nedd at Pontneathvaughan Bridge to Nant-y-Bryn and Nant-y-Bryn to Carn-yr-Onen.

## TOPOGRAPHY.

The Rural District comprises the three Parishes of Vaynor, Penderyn and Ystradfellte, in the County of Brecon. The Parish of Ystradfellte, which had been administered by the Neath Rural District Council, was added to this Rural District by a Review Order of April 1st, 1934.

The three Parishes comprised in this Rural District are of considerable extent. The total area being 39,271 acres, or over 61 square miles with an average length of 8 miles and a width of about 12 miles. They are situated on the Southern boundary of the County of Brecon, and adjoin the districts of Neath, Aberdare and Merthyr Tydfil, in the County of Glamorgan. They form four valleys in the foothills of the South escarpment of the Brecknockshire Beacons, with high table lands between.

THE PARISH OF VAYNOR comprises two valleys running northwards towards two spurs of the Brecknock Beacons, and the PARISH OF PENDERYN consists of high table land adjoining and emerging towards the same mountainous area. These Rural Parishes are only separated by the narrow streams already mentioned from the County of Glamorgan, and the important populous Urban Districts of Aberdare and Merthyr Tydfil on the south. The PARISH OF YSRADFELLTE presents similar physical features extending from the rugged Van Mountains to the north covering a rough hilly tableland intersected by two very narrow valleys converging towards an apex at Pontneathvaughan.

# ELEVATION.

The district as a whole is at a great elevation above sea level, varying from 263 feet to no less than 2,250 feet; it will be realised that the nearly 40,000 acres contained in the area includes a considerable amount of sparsely inhabited mountain land. In the Parish of Vaynor, the levels extend from 645 feet near Cefn Bridge to 1,612 feet at Twyn-y-Croes on the mountain above Cwm Glais. Penderyn Parish presents levels varying from 588 feet at Cynon Bridge, Hirwaun to 1,376 feet at the top of Twyn, Cadlan, while the Parish of Ystradfellte contains such extreme variations of level as 263 feet at the bridge at Pontneathvaughan, and 2,250 feet near the top of Fan Fawr, which mountain is partly in the Parish.

## CLIMATE.

The proximity of the well-known range of mountains known as the Brecknock Beacons, accounts for the rather heavy rainfall that prevails. Some of the largest reservoirs in Wales are partly in the Rural District.

#### VITAL STATISTICS

BIRTHS. The Births registered in the District in 1949 numbered 108 (male 59 and female 49). The Annual Birth Rate for 1949 was 19.56 per thousand of the population compared with 15.11 in 1948 and 16.70 in 1947. The County Birth Rate in 1949 was 17.30 compared with 17.09 in 1948 and 19.35 in 1947. The Annual Birth Rate for England and Wales for 1949 was 16.7 compared with 17.9 for 1948 and 20.5 for 1947.

STILL BIRTHS. Three male and two female still-births were registered during the year. The rate per thousand of the population being 0.906 compared with 0.186 for 1948 and 0.19 for 1947. The County rate for 1949 was 0.48 compared with 0.65 in 1948 and 0.56 for 1947. The rate for England and Wales in 1949 being 0.39.

DEATHS. There were 81 deaths assigned to this Area during 1949; of these 44 were male and 37 were female. This figure takes into account 24 inward transferable and 1 outward transferable deaths. The death rate of 1949 was 14.67 per 1,000 of the population compared with 10.2 for 1948 and 15.15 for 1947. The County rate for 1949 was 12.46 compared with 11.0 for 1948 and 12.77 for 1947. The death rate for England and Wales for 1949 was 11.7 per 1,000 of the population; 10.8 for 1948 and 12.0 for 1947.

DEATHS OF INFANTS UNDER ONE YEAR OF AGE. Four male infants, under the age of one year, died in 1949. Two of these were illegitimate. The causes of deaths were as follows:—

Under one week (1) (a) Premature Birth.

(2) (a) Convulsions (b) Spina Bifidia.

Three to six months.

(3) (a) Asphyxia due to inhalation of vomited milk.

(4) (a) Merasmus.

The number of deaths under this heading was one less than las year and the infant mortality rate has dropped from 61.7 to 37.0 per 1,000 births. The rate for England and Wales for this year was 32.0 per 1,000 live births.

DEATHS UNDER ONE YEAR FROM DIARRHOEA. No deaths were recorded from this cause.

DEATHS FROM PUERPERAL SEPSIS, Etc. There were no deaths notified from a Puerperal cause this year.

DEATHS FROM CANCER. The number of Deaths from all forms of Cancer increased from 4 in 1948 to 14 in this year. Of these 6 were Male and 8 Female; the percentage of total Deaths be ng 17.28 compared wth 7.27 for 1948 and 14.10 for 1947.

DEATHS FROM TUBERCULOSIS. There were 6 Deaths from this disease notified during the year; two were Male and four were female. The percentage of total Deaths was 7.4 compared with 3.63 for 1948 and 1.28 for 1947.

DEATHS FROM HEART DISEASE. Heart Disease was responsible for 13 Male and 11 Female deaths, a total of 24. This disease accounted for 29.62 of the total deaths recorded, compared with 32.72 for 1948 and 28.20 for 1947.

DEATHS FROM BRONCHITIS. No deaths were recorded under this heading during the year.

## HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA.

AMBULANCE FACILITIES. The Brecon County Council adminster the ambulance services of the area under the National Health Act, 1946. The Health department of the County Council have made arrangements with neighbouring authorities to provide ambulance facilities for our area as follows:—

Parish of Vaynor. The Merthyr Hospital Board. Hirwaun, Penderyn and Ystradfellte. Glamorgan Hospital Board. Pontneathvaughan. Neath Hospital Board.

Infections disease cases in our area utilise the services of the Mardy Isolation Hospital, Merthyr Tydfil and the Cimla Hospital, Neath.

NURSING AT HOME. This work, which was undertaken by Voluntary Nursing Associations until 5th July, 1948, is now carried out by the County Council.

CLINICS. Clinics are still administered by the County Council, and Clinics for expectant mothers and Infant Welfare are held at Cefn Coed and Hirwaun.

HOSPITALS. There are no hospitals in the Council's area, but we are fortunate in having hospital facilities in the adjoining urban areas of Merthyr Tydfil, Aberdare and Neath.

LABORATORY SERVICES. An arrangement has been made for the services of the Public Health Laboratories of the Institute of Preventive Medicine, The Parade, Cardiff, to be utilised for all chemical and bacteriological analyses and examinations required by this Authority.

WATER SUPPLY. The district, which has several supplies of piped water, has on the whole, been satisfactorily supplied with water. Cefn Coed in the Vaynor Parish, is supplied from the mains of the Taf Fechan Water Board, as is the greater part of the Vaynor Parish.

In the Parish of Penderyn, Hirwaun is supplied by the mains of the Aberdare Urban District Council. At Penderyn, the water is pumped from the Cadlan and Ogof Fawr regions. This supply is chlorinated at the Cadlan pump-house by means of a semi-automatic apparatus installed in 1944.

Pontneathvaughan, in the Parish of Ystradfellte, is supplied by the mains of the Neath Rural District Council. Unfortunately, however, the upper portion of the parish, which includes the small hamlet of Ystradfellte, a school and some 45 scattered farms, has no main piped water supply. Neath R.D.C. have been approached on several occasions for a piped supply from their mains, but no agreement has been reached.

It is essential that a piped supply be brought to this area, in order that clean water be available on farms employed in the production of milk, as well as to farmhouses and cottages.

During the year thirty-five samples of water were taken for bacteriological and chemical examination. A number of these samples failed to pass the tests towards the end of a period of drought followed by very heavy rain which caused a surcharge of the water filter at Penderyn and allowed vegetable matter to enter the storage tank. This matter was attended to and the pollution of the water cleared by cleansing the main supply pipes and storage tank. The quality of the water was maintained by constant checking of the chlorination plant and by varying the dosage of "Chloros" after filtering the water.

DRAINAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL WORKS. The Council has provided efficient drainage and sewage works for the whole area with the exception of the small hamlet of Ystradfellte.

## PUBLIC CLEANSING.

REFUSE COLLECTION. Refuse is collected in the Cefn Coed and Hirwaun districts three times a week, twice weekly at Pontneathvaughan, and once a week at Ystradfellte, Penderyn and Pontsticill.

REFUSE DISPOSAL. All refuse is tipped at Godre Coed, Cefn Coed, or on the Upper Pandy, Hirwaun. These tips are dressed and cleaned regularly, and care is taken to ensure that they do not become breeding places for vermin. Because of building restrictions and constructional costs, it was not possible to rebuild the existing refuse destructor, or to provide a new modern plant.

SALVAGE. The collection of salvage is carried out as a separate operation from the refuse collection, an additional lorry being used for this purpose. Salvage is disposed of to a salvage dealer.

SLAUGHTER-HOUSES. There are no slaughter-houses in this Council area. All meat for human consumption in our area is supplied from the Government Central Slaughter-houses situated in adjoining areas.

COTTAGE PIGS. The slaughter of cottage pigs for home consumption is still permitted under the Regulations to be carried out on owners' premises.

The number of pigs reared by cottagers in our area again increased this year. When these pigs are slaughtered we are notified and the carcases are examined. During the year 267 pigs were slaughtered for home consumption and the majority of these were examined and all were found to be satisfactory.

FOOD AND DRUGS ACT, 1938. A close inspection is made of meat and other foods sold in retail establishments in this area. Seventy-nine visits were made to butcher shops, food retailers, fried fish shops, ice cream premises, cafes and public houses during the year.

Condemnation certificates are issued in respect of foodstuffs condemned in our area, in accordance with the various Food Regulations issued by the Ministries of Food and Health. The following articles of food were condemned during the year, as being unfit for human consumption:

LICENSED HOUSES. Visits have been paid to all the licensed premises in our area. Informal Notices have been served upon the owners of all premises which are not satisfactory, and as a result, many improvements have been made.

The provision of proper facilities for the washing and cleansing of glasses has been made through the co-operation of the Brewers and the Licensing Magistrates.

Great improvements have been made in the sanitary accommodation of these houses, and further improvements will be sought when the supply of building materials becomes less acute.

FARMS, DAIRIES AND COWSHEDS. All the dairy farms in the area have been visited regularly, and, where necessary, advice has been given to the farmers in order that renovations and improvements to cowsheds and dairies may be carried out. Many of the cowsheds, improvised from existing farmbuildings, cannot comply with standards laid down for modern cowsheds.

On these hill farms, great difficulty is experienced in obtaining a good water supply. Until piped water supplies are laid on to the farms, it is impossible to raise the standard to the desired level. The County Agricultural Executive Committee has co-operated in endeavouring to provide water supplies to these farms. It is regretted however, that it has not been found possible to provide a piped water supply from the public utility water supplies in our area.

On October 1st, 1949 the Ministry of Agriculture & Fisheries took over responsibility for all farms, dairies and cowsheds under the Milk and Dairies Regulations, 1949. Under these Regulations the local authority was, unfortunately, forced to hand over the control and inspection of farms, dairies and cowsheds to a new department of the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries. This step has taken away from local authorities a great deal of its powers in enforcing the production of clean and wholesome milk. These Regulations have also taken away from local authorities' officers the close contact and supervision which has been built up over years of mutual interest and investigation between farmers and dairymen and Public Health Officers.

MILK SAMPLING. The milk produced in the area is mainly collected and transported to milk factories, where it is pasteurised. This milk is tested and examined on arrival at the factories by the laboratores attached to the factories.

During the year 101 samples of milk have been taken from retailers and producers in our area for bacteriological examination and keeping qualities. Sixty-eight per cent of these camples passed the bacteriological and keeping quality tests.

A higher standard of results would have been obtained during the summer months if every farm in the area had an adequate piped supply of water. During the months of June and July, which were dry, it was noticed that the standard of the milk supply was lowered owing to the lack of water for the proper cleansing of utensils in the dairies.

INFESTATION ORDER, 1943. DESTRUCTION OF RATS AND MICE. During the year under review the Local Authority has carried out its duties relating to the Destruction of Rats and Mice in accordance with the methods prescribed by the Ministry.

The work of surveying and baiting has been carried out under the supervision and direction of the Sanitary Inspector. A fulltime Rodent Operator is employed and he is assisted at certain periods of the year by temporary employees.

The whole of the sewer systems in the Council's area have been treated twice during the year in accordance with the regulations laid down under the Infestation Order, 1943. The survey and treatment of these sewers has been carried out in conjunction with, where possible, the block treatment of the adjoining surface premises.

This area, being of a rural character, has necessitated a close watch being maintained on the vermin infestation along the river banks and culverts. This is especially important where the rivers and streams flow through the villages.

The Council's refuse tips have been dealt with at regular intervals and, as a result of these treatments, the degree of infestation at, or near, the refuse tip areas has lessened considerably.

It has been noted that, as a result of the work done under this Order during the year, that one definite conclusion can be drawn; which shows that major infestations in this rural area occur mainly where houses and buildings are in close proximity to a water course or culvert.
