Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report on the Health and Sanitary Conditions, and the Vital Statistics relating to the Rural District for 1950. The Report is submitted in accordance with the Memorandum issued by the Welsh Board of Health.

I wish to tender my thanks to the Members of the Council for their helpful consideration and co-operation in all matters affecting Public Health; and also the Officers of the Council for their help in all matters appertaining to the duties of the Health Department.

The housing problem is still a very serious matter. A large percentage of the existing houses, particularly in the Cofn Coed area, are occupied by more than one family, and there are a large number of sub-standard houses which should be considered for demolition action when conditions permit.

The Council is energetically pressing on with the building of new houses; the chief difficulties being the shortage of skilled labour and building materials. The number of post-war houses erected in the area to the end of 1950 is 278, of these 42, were erected during 1950. The number projected or under construction at the end of the year is 99.

The factories and coal-mines of the adjoining County of Glamorgan absorb the majority of our work-people but a number are employed in factories or work-places within the boundaries of this Rural District. The work-people in the more agricultural part of the District are mainly employed in farming, forestry or quarrying.

The health of the District during the year has, on the whole, been good. There has been an absence of any serious outbreaks of infectious diseases, and the majority of deaths during the year were in the higher age groups.

The incidence of influenza has been low and infectious cases have been generally limited by the Great Hygiene of the Week. Hospital cases, chiefly of Great Hygiene, are reported.

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BOUNDARIES.

PARISH OF VAYNOR - East Side. The Taf Fechan River from its junction with the Taf Fawr River as far as the junction with the Car Brook.

TOPOGRAPHY.

The Rural District comprises the three Parishes of Vaynor, Penderyn and Ystradfellte, in the County of Brecon. The Parish of Ystradfellte, which had been administered by the Neath Rural District Council, was added to this Rural District by a Review Order of April 1st, 1934.

NOTES

The Rural District comprises the
three parishes of Vaynor, Llanfrynach and Ystradgynlais, in the
County of Brecon. The Parish of Ystradgynlais, which had
been administered by the Welsh Rural District Council, was
added to this Rural District by a Review Order of April 1934.

The three Parishes comprised in this Rural District are of considerable extent. The total area being 39,271 acres, or over 61 square miles with an average length of 8 miles and a width of about 12 miles. They are situated on the Southern boundary of the County of Brecon, and adjoin the districts of Neath, Aberdare and Merthyr Tydfil, in the County of Glamorgan. They form four valleys in the foothills of the South escarpment of the Brecknockshire Beacons, with high table-lands between.

THE PARISH OF VAYNOR comprises two valleys running northwards towards two spurs of the Brecknock Beacons, and the PARISH OF PONDERYN consists of high table-land adjoining and emerging towards the same mountainous area. These Rural Parishes are only separated by the narrow streams, already mentioned, from the County of Glamorgan, and the important populous Urban Districts of Aberdare and Merthyr Tydfil on the South. The PARISH OF YSTRADFOLLE presents similar physical features extending from the rugged Van Mountains to the north, covering a rough hilly table-land intersected by two very narrow valleys converging towards an apex at Pontneathvaughan.

ELEVATION.

The district as a whole is at a great elevation above sea level, varying from 263 feet to no less than 2,250 feet; it will be realised that the nearly 40,000 acres contained in the area includes a considerable amount of sparsely inhabited mountain land. In the Parish of Vaynor, the levels extend from 645 feet near Cofn Bridge to 1,612 feet at Twyn-y-Croes on the mountain above Cwm Gleis. Ponderyn Parish presents levels varying from 588 feet at Cynon Bridge, Hirwaun to 1,376 feet at the top of Twyn, Cadlan, while the Parish of Ystradfolle contains such extreme variations of level as 263 feet at the bridge at Pontneathvaughan, and 2,250 feet near the top of Fan Fawr, which mountain is partly in the Parish.

CLIMATE.

The proximity of the well-known range of mountains known as the Brecknock Beacons, accounts for the rather heavy rainfall that prevails. Some of the largest reservoirs in Wales are partly in the Rural District.

V I T A L S T A T I S T I C S .

BIRTHS. The Births registered in the District in 1950 numbered 92 (male 46 and female 46). The Annual Birth Rate for 1950 was 16.28 per thousand of the population, compared with 19.56 in 1949 and 15.11 in 1948. The County Birth Rate in 1950 was 16.2, compared with 17.3 in 1949 and 17.09 in 1948. The Annual Birth Rate for England and Wales for 1950 was 15.8, compared with 16.7 for 1949 and 17.9 for 1948.

STILL BIRTHS. One female still birth was registered during the year. The rate per thousand of the population being 0.177, compared with 0.906 for 1949 and 0.186 for 1948. The County rate for 1950 was 0.1, compared with 0.48 for 1949 and 0.65 for 1948. The rate for England and Wales in 1950 being 0.37.

DEATHS. There were 88 deaths assigned to this area during 1950; of these 47 were male and 41 were female. This figure takes into account 21 inward transferable and 1 outward transferable deaths. The death rate for 1950 was 15.58 per thousand of the population, compared with 14.67 for 1949, and 10.2 for 1948. The County death rate for 1950 was 15.5, compared with 12.46 for 1949 and 11.0 for 1948. The death rate for England and Wales for 1950 was 11.6 per 1,000 of the population; 11.7 for 1949 and 10.8 for 1948.

DEATHS OF INFANTS UNDER ONE YEAR OF AGE. Four male and two female infants under the age of one year, died during 1950, in this district. The causes of deaths were as follows :-

VITAL STATISTICS

DEATHS. The number of deaths in the district in 1950 numbered 34 (rate 66 per 1,000). The Annual Birth Rate for 1950 was 18.14 per thousand of the population, compared with 19.66 in 1949 and 18.11 in 1948. The County Birth Rate in 1950 was 18.2, compared with 17.5 in 1949 and 17.08 in 1948. The Annual Birth Rate for England and Wales for 1950 was 18.5, compared with 18.7 for 1949 and 17.9 for 1948.

WILL BIRTHS. The number of births was registered during the year. The rate per thousand of the population being 0.177, compared with 0.166 for 1949 and 0.168 for 1948. The County rate for 1950 was 0.1, compared with 0.18 for 1949 and 0.18 for 1948. The rate for England and Wales in 1950 being 0.37.

DEATHS. There were 38 deaths registered in this area during 1950; of these 27 were males and 11 were females. This figure shows a decrease of 10 deaths from 48 in 1949 and 1 death from 49 in 1948. The County rate for 1950 was 18.14 per thousand of the population, compared with 19.67 for 1949 and 18.11 for 1948. The County death rate for 1950 was 18.5, compared with 18.4 for 1949 and 17.0 for 1948. The death rate for England and Wales for 1950 was 18.8 per 1,000 of the population; 17.7 for 1949 and 18.8 for 1948.

DEATHS OF INFANTS UNDER ONE YEAR OF AGE. Four only had their deaths registered under the age of one year, this being 1950, in the district. The number of deaths was as follows:-

The number of deaths under this heading were two more than last year, and the infant mortality rate has risen from 37.0 for 1949 to 65.22 per 1,000 live births for this year. The rate for England and Wales per 1,000 live births for this year was 29.8 compared with 32.0 for 1949.

DEATHS UNDER ONE YEAR FROM DIARRHOEA. No deaths were recorded from this cause.

DEATHS FROM PUERPERAL SEPSIS, ETC. There were no deaths notified from a Puerperal cause this year.

DEATHS FROM CANCER. The number of deaths from all forms of Cancer decreased from 14 last year to 8 in 1950. Of these 6 were male and 2 female. The percentage of total deaths being 9.09, compared with 17.28 for 1949 and 7.27 for 1948.

DEATHS FROM TUBERCULOSIS. Two male deaths were notified from this cause during the year. The percentage of total deaths being 2.27, compared with 7.4 for 1949 and 3.63 for 1948.

DEATHS FROM HEART AND ARTERIAL DISEASES. There were 41 notifications of death under this heading during the year; of these 22 were male and 19 female. These diseases accounted for 46.59 per cent of the total deaths during the year, compared with 29.62 for 1949 and 32.72 for 1948.

DEATHS FROM BRONCHITIS. Four male and two female deaths were recorded under this heading during the year. The percentage of total deaths being 6.82. There were no deaths recorded from this cause during 1949, but the comparative percentage for 1948 was 1.82

The number of deaths during this
month was two more than in the
previous month, and the infant mortality
rate was 37.0 for 1935 as compared with
35.0 for 1934. The rate for England was 35.0
for 1935.

DEATHS FROM MEASLES. There were
no deaths reported from this disease
during the year. The number of cases
was 1,000 as compared with 1,200
for 1934.

DEATHS FROM DIPHTHERIA. The number
of deaths from this disease was 11
for 1935 as compared with 12 for
1934. Of these 6 were male and 5
female. The percentage of total deaths
was 0.27, compared with 0.28 for
1934.

DEATHS FROM TUBERCULOSIS. Two
deaths were reported from this disease
during the year. The percentage of
total deaths was 0.27, compared with
0.28 for 1934.

DEATHS FROM POLIO AND ASTHMA.
There were 4 deaths from these
diseases during the year. Of these 2
were male and 2 female. These
deaths accounted for 0.28 per cent of the
total. The percentage of total deaths
was 0.28 for 1935, compared with
0.27 for 1934.

DEATHS FROM BROWNIAN. Four
deaths from this disease were reported
during the year. The percentage of
total deaths was 0.45, compared with
0.45 for 1934. There were no deaths
reported from this disease during 1933,
but the percentage for 1935 was 0.45.

HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA.

AMBULANCE FACILITIES. The Brocon County Council administer the ambulance services of the area under the National Health Act, 1946. The Health Department of the County Council have made arrangements with neighbouring authorities to provide ambulance facilities for our area as follows :-

Parish of Vaynor. The Merthyr Hospital Board.
Hirwaun, Penderyn & Ystradfellto. Cwmorgan Hospital Board.
Pontnoethvaughan. Neath Hospital Board.

Infectious disease cases in our area utilise the services of the Mardy Isolation Hospital, Merthyr Tydfil, and the Cimla Hospital, Neath.

NURSING AT HOME. This work, which was undertaken by Voluntary Nursing Associations until 5th July, 1948, is now carried out by the County Council.

CLINICS. Clinics are still administered by the County Council, and Clinics for expectant mothers and Infant Welfare are held at Cefn Coed and Hirwaun.

HOSPITALS. There are no hospitals in the Council's area, but we are fortunate in having hospital facilities in the adjoining urban areas of Merthyr Tydfil, Abordare and Neath.

LABORATORY SERVICES. An arrangement has been made for the services of the Public Health Laboratories of the Institute of Preventive Medicine, The Parade, Cardiff, to be utilised for all chemical and bacteriological analyses and examinations required by this Authority.

WATER SUPPLY. The district, which has several supplies of piped water, has, on the whole, been satisfactorily supplied with water. Cefn Coed, in the Vaynor Parish, is supplied from the mains of the Taf Fochan Water Supply Board, as is the greater part of the Vaynor Parish.

HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA

IMPROVED FACILITIES

Group County Council established the health services of the area under the Health Act, 1948. The health department of the County Council has made arrangements with neighbouring authorities to provide certain facilities for the area as follows:-

- Yards of refuse, the County Council
- Wastewater treatment, the County Council
- Public buildings, the County Council

Information is given in the following table of the health services provided by the County Council, the County Council, and the County Council.

WORKING AT HOME. This work, which was undertaken by voluntary workers and others until 1st July, 1948, is now carried out by the County Council.

CLINIC. Clinics are still maintained by the County Council, and clinics for expectant mothers and infant babies are held at Oak and Alder.

HEALTH. From the 1st November in the County's case, but no one has been having health facilities in the adjoining areas of the County Council, Alder and Oak.

LACERATION SERVICES. An arrangement has been made for the services of the health department of the County Council to provide laceration services. The County Council, as in relation to the County Council, has provided certain services and arrangements provided by the County Council.

WATER SUPPLY. The water supply which has several supplies of water, has been established by the County Council, as in relation to the water supply of the County Council, is supplied from the water supply of the County Council, in the County Council, in the County Council.

In the Parish of Penderyn, Hirwaun is supplied by the mains of the Aberdare Urban District Council. At Penderyn, the water is pumped from the Cadlan and Ogaf Fawr regions. This supply is chlorinated at the Cadlan pump-house by means of a semi-automatic apparatus installed in 1944.

Pontnoathvaughan, in the Parish of Ystradfellte, is supplied by the mains of the Noath Rural District Council. Unfortunately, however, the upper portion of the parish, which includes the small hamlet of Ystradfellte, a school and some 45 scattered farms, has no main piped water supply. Noath R.D.C. have been approached on several occasions for a piped supply from their mains, but no agreement has been reached.

It is essential that a piped supply be brought to this area, in order that clean water be available on farms employed in the production of milk, as well as to farm-houses and cottages.

During the year twenty-two samples of water were taken for bacteriological examination and chemical examination. A number of these samples failed to pass the standard tests towards the end of a period of drought; which, being followed by heavy rain, caused a surcharge of the filters at Penderyn and allowed vegetable matter to enter the storage tank. The storage tank was emptied and cleansed, the sand in the filters changed, and the quality of the water was then maintained by constant changing of the chlorination plant and filters. Subsequent examination of this water showed that the water was chemically and bacteriologically pure.

DRAINAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL WORKS. The Council has provided efficient drainage and sewage disposal works for the whole of the area with the exception of the small hamlet of Ystradfellte. The disposal of sewage from the Hirwaun district is undertaken by the Aberdare U.D.C. under a joint scheme.

REFUSE COLLECTION. Refuse is collected in the Cofn Coed and Hirwaun districts three times a week; twice weekly at Pontnoathvaughan; and once a week at Ystradfellte, Penderyn and Pontsticill.

REFUSE DISPOSAL. All refuse is tipped at Godre Cood, Cofn Cood, or on the Upper Pondy, Hirwaun. These tips are dressed and cleaned regularly, and care is taken to ensure that they do not become breeding places for vermin. Because of building restrictions and constructional costs, it was not possible to re-build the existing refuse destructor, or to provide a new modern plant.

SALVAGE. The collection of salvage is carried out as a separate operation from the collection of refuse, an additional lorry being used for this purpose. Salvage is disposed of to a salvage dealer.

SLAUGHTER-HOUSES. There are no slaughter-houses in this Council's area. All meat for human consumption in this area is supplied from the Government Central Slaughter-houses situated in adjoining areas.

COTTAGE PIGS. The slaughter of cottage pigs for home consumption is still permitted under the Regulations to be carried out on owners' premises.

One hundred and six notifications of slaughter were received during the year and the majority of these carcasses were examined and all were found to be satisfactory.

FOOD AND DRUGS ACT, 1938. A close inspection is made of meat and other foods sold in retail establishments in this area. One hundred and fifty three visits were made to butcher shops, food retailers, fried fish shops, ice cream premises, cafes and public houses during the year.

LICENSED HOUSES. Visits have been paid to all the licensed premises in our area, Informal Notices have been served upon the owners of all premises which are not satisfactory, and as a result, many improvements have been made.

The provision of proper facilities for the washing and cleansing of glasses has been made through the co-operation of the Brewers and the Licensing Magistrates.

Great improvements have been made in the sanitary accommodation of these houses, and further improvements will be sought when the supply of building materials becomes less acute.

FARMS, DAIRIES & COWSHEDS. Since the 1st October, 1949, the Ministry of Agriculture & Fisheries has been responsible for Farms, Dairies and Cowsheds under the Milk & Dairies Regulations, 1949. The Local Authority therefore have no control in the inspection of these premises, other than under the Infectious Disease Regulations and the Tuberculosis Acts. The Local Authority is, however, responsible in dealing with the water supply to the farms and in this connection the County Agricultural Executive Committee has co-operated in endeavouring to supply a piped water supply to farms.

MILK SAMPLING. The milk produced in the area is mainly collected and transported to milk factories, where it is pasteurised. This milk is tested and examined on arrival at the factories by the laboratories attached.

During the year fifty samples were taken from retailers and producers for bacteriological examination and keeping qualities. Seven of these samples failed the keeping quality test. This is due, in part, to a lack of an adequate piped water supply to farms.

It is to be hoped that with the provisions of the Milk & Dairies Regulations, 1949, being enforced, that the standard of the milk supply will be raised to a higher level.

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PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS

ACT, 1949. This Act, which has superceded the Infestation Order, 1945, for the destruction of rats and mice, implements the duties and powers of the Local Authority in relation to the destruction of pests in accordance with the various methods and regulations proscribed by the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries.

Under this new Act the Local Authority is responsible for surveying all premises and lands within its area; this includes farms, dairies and cowsheds. It is also an obligation on the part of occupiers of land to notify the Local Authority of the presence of rats and mice. The duties of the Local Authority, under this Act, are extensive and increase the responsibility of the Department concerned with this work.

The County Agricultural Executive Committee is responsible for such work as is necessary on farms and farmlands in direct co-operation with the Local Authority.

The work of surveying the district has been carried out under the supervision and direction of the Sanitary Inspector. A full-time Rodent Operator is employed in the Sanitary Inspector's Department and he is assisted at certain periods of the year by temporary employees.

The sewer systems in the Council's area have been treated twice during the year, in accordance with the provisions of the regulations made by the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries. The survey and treatment of these sewers has, where possible, been carried out in conjunction with the block treatment of surface premises.

Special attention has been paid to premises where food is stored or prepared for human consumption, and occupiers of these premises have co-operated to free their premises from pests of all descriptions.

The Council's area, being of a rural character, has necessitated a close supervision being maintained on vermin infestation on river banks and culverts adjacent to villages.

Refuse tips have been dealt with at regular intervals and inspected weekly to prevent any major infestation occurring on these lands.
