Mr. Chairman, and Gentlemen,

I have the honour, once again, to present the Annual Report on the Health and Sanitary Conditions, and the Vital Statistics relating to the Rural District for 1958. The Report is submitted in accordance with the Circular issued by the Ministry of Health.

I wish to tender my thanks to the Members of the Council for their helpful consideration and co-operation in all matters affecting Public Health; and also the Officers of the Council for their help in all matters appertaining to the duties of the Health Department.

The Council continued with its post-war building programme. The number of post-war houses erected in the area to the end of 1958 is 673; of these 33 were erected during the year. The number under construction at the end of 1958 being 6.

The factories and coal-mines of the adjoining County of Glamorgan absorb the majority of our work-people, but a number are employed in factories or work-places within the boundaries of this Rural District. The work-people in the more agricultural part of the District are mainly employed in farming, forestry or quarrying.

The health of the District during the year, has, on the whole, been good. No outbreaks of food poisoning have been notified and there has also been an absence of any serious outbreaks of infectious diseases. The majority of deaths during the year were again in the higher age groups.

The Council continued with its post-war building programme. The number of post-war houses erected in the area to the end of 1958 is 677; of these 55 were erected during the year. The number under construction at the end of 1958 being 4.

The factories and coal-mines of the adjoining County of Glamorgan should be a source of our work-people, but a number are engaged in factories or workshops within the boundaries of this Rural District. The work-people in the more agricultural part of the District are mainly engaged in farming, forestry or gardening.

The health of the District during the year has, on the whole, been good. No outbreaks of food poisoning have been notified and there has also been no instance of any serious outbreak of infectious diseases. The mortality of deaths during the year was again in the higher age groups.

The incidence of Pulmonary Tuberculosis has again been low and infectious cases have promptly been isolated by the Chest Physicians of the Welsh Regional Hospital Board, chiefly at the Mardy Isolation Hospital and and Cimla Sanatorium.

BOUNDARIES.

PARISH OF VAYNOR - East Side. The Taf Fechan River from its junction with the Taf Fawr River as far as the junction with the Car Brook.

North Side. From the Car Brook to the junction of the Llysiog Brook with the Taf Fawr River.

West Side. The Taf Fawr River from its junction with the Taf Fechan River to the junction of the Llysiog Brook and the Taf Fawr River.

PARISH OF PENDERYN. - East Side. The Taf Fawr River from the Ffrwd Brook to Nantygourgan.

North Side. From Nantygourgan, where it joins the River Hepste, to the junction of the Rivers Hepste and Mellte, and from the River Mellte to Dinas Rock.

South Side. From Dinas Rock, following Cwmnant Brook to the Cynon River near Lletty Rhys, and the Cynon River as far as the junction of Nant Hir at Cwm Ynys Mwn Tan, and following Nant Hir Brook to Nant Ffrwd Brook to its junction with the Taf Fawr River.

PARISH OF YSTRADFELLTE - North Side. From Carn-yr-Onen to Nant-yr-Eira.

South Side. From Heol-las to Scwd Eira, and along the Afon Mellte to the Bridge at Pontneathvaughan.

East Side. From Nant-yr-Eira to Blaen Hepste and along the River Hepste to Heol-las.

West Side. Afon Nedd at Pontneathvaughan Bridge to Nant-y-Bryn and Nant-y-Bryn to Carn-yr-Onen.

TOPOGRAPHY.

The Rural District comprises the three parishes of Vaynor, Penderyn and Ystradfellte, in the County of Brecon. The Parish of Ystradfellte, which had been administered by the Neath Rural District Council, was added to this Rural Authority by a Review Order of April 1st., 1934.

BOUNDARIES

PARTIAL OF VAYNOR - East Side. The Tal Peonah River from the junction with the Tal River to the junction with the Car Brook.

North Side. From the Car Brook to the junction of the Lysolok Brook with the Tal River.

West Side. The Tal River from the junction with the Tal Peonah River to the junction of the Lysolok Brook and the Tal River.

PARTIAL OF KENDRICK - East Side. The Tal River from the Tal Brook to the junction.

North Side. From the junction of the Tal River with the Lysolok Brook, to the junction of the Tal River with the Lysolok Brook.

South Side. From the junction of the Tal River with the Lysolok Brook, to the junction of the Tal River with the Lysolok Brook.

PARTIAL OF KENDRICK - North Side. From the junction of the Tal River with the Lysolok Brook, to the junction of the Tal River with the Lysolok Brook.

South Side. From the junction of the Tal River with the Lysolok Brook, to the junction of the Tal River with the Lysolok Brook.

East Side. From the junction of the Tal River with the Lysolok Brook, to the junction of the Tal River with the Lysolok Brook.

West Side. From the junction of the Tal River with the Lysolok Brook, to the junction of the Tal River with the Lysolok Brook.

TOPOGRAPHY

The rural district comprises the three parishes of Vaynor, Penryn and Fawcett, in the County of Devon. The parish of Fawcett, which had been administered by the North Rural District Council, was added to this rural authority by a Review Order of April 1st, 1934.

The three Parishes comprised in this Rural District are of considerable extent. The total area being 39,271 acres, or over 61 square miles, with an average length of 8 miles and a width of about 12 miles. They are situated on the Southern Boundary of the County of Brecon, and adjoin the districts of Neath, Aberdare and Merthyr Tydfil in the County of Glamorgan. They form four valleys in the foothills of the South Escarpment of the Brecknockshire Beacons with high table-lands between.

The PARISH OF VAYNOR comprises two valleys running northwards towards two spurs of the Brecknock Beacons, and the PARISH OF PENDERYN consists of high table-land adjoining and emerging towards the same mountainous area. These Rural Parishes are only separated by the narrow streams already mentioned, from the County of Glamorgan, and the important populous Urban Districts of Merthyr Tydfil and Aberdare on the South. The PARISH OF YSTRADFELLTE presents similar physical features extending from the rugged Van Mountains to the north, covering a rough hilly Table-land intersected by two very narrow valleys converging towards an apex at Pontneathvaughan.

ELEVATION.

The district, as a whole, is at a great elevation above sea level, varying from 263 feet to no less than 2,250 feet; it will be realised that the nearly 40,000 acres contained in the area includes a considerable amount of sparsely inhabited mountain land. In the Parish of Vaynor, the levels extend from 645 feet near Cefn Bridge to 1,612 feet at Twyn-y-Croes on the mountain above Cwm Glais. Penderyn Parish presents levels varying from 588 feet at Cynon Bridge, Hirwaun, to 1,376 feet at the top of Twyn, Cadlan, while the Parish of Ystradfellte contains such extreme variations of level as 263 feet at the Bridge at Pontneathvaughan, and 2,250 feet near the top of Fan Fawr, which is partly in the Parish.

CLIMATE.

The proximity of the well-known range of mountains known as the Brecknock Beacons, accounts for the rather heavy rainfall that prevails. Some of the largest reservoirs in Wales are partly in the Rural District.

The three parishes comprised in this Rural District are of considerable extent. The total area being 39,271 acres or over 61 square miles, with an average length of 8 miles and a width of about 18 miles. They are situated on the Southern boundary of the County of Brecon, and adjoin the Districts of Hereford, Aberystwyth and Merthyr Tydfil in the County of Glamorgan. They form four valleys in the foothills of the South West of the Breconshire Beacon with high table-lands between.

The PARISH OF VAINOR comprises two valleys running northwards towards two spurs of the Brecon Beacon, and the PARISH OF PENRYN comprises of high table-land adjoining and extending towards the same mountainous area. These two parishes are only separated by the narrow stream already mentioned, from the County of Glamorgan, and the important population Urban Districts of Merthyr Tydfil and Aberystwyth to the South. The PARISH OF KILWATER comprises a similar physical features extending from the rugged Pen Brecon to the north, covering a rough hilly table-land intersected by two very narrow valleys converging towards an apex at Kilmeston.

ELEVATION.

The district, as a whole, is at a great elevation above sea level, varying from 200 feet to no less than 2,500 feet. It will be recalled that the nearly 50,000 acres comprised in the area includes a considerable amount of open and undulating mountain land. In the Parish of Vainor, the level extends from 600 feet near Cefn Bridge to 1,500 feet at Tany-Goose on the mountain above Cefn Gwilt. Penryth Parish presents levels varying from 500 feet at Gwynn Bridge, Brecon, to 1,700 feet at the top of Tany Gwilt, while the Parish of Kilwatt contains such extreme variations of level as 200 feet at the bridge at Penryn Gwilt, and 2,500 feet near the top of Pen Tany, which is partly in the Parish.

CLIMATE.

The proximity of the well-known range of mountains known as the Brecon Beacon, accounts for the rather heavy rain-fall that prevails. None of the highest reservoirs in Wales are partly in the Rural District.

V I T A L S T A T I S T I C S .

BIRTHS. The Births registered in the District in 1958 numbered 114 (male 59 and female 55). The Annual Birth Rate for 1958 was 18.54 per thousand of the population, compared with 16.53 in 1957 and 17.73 in 1956. The Annual Birth Rate for England and Wales for 1958 was 16.4 compared with 16.1 for 1957 and 15.7 for 1956.

STILL BIRTHS. Two male and two female still births were registered in the area during the year. The rate per thousand of the population being 0.65 compared with 0.335 for 1957 and 0.167 for 1956. The rate for England and Wales per thousand total live and still births for 1958 was 21.6 compared with a rate of 33.9 per thousand live and still births for this area during the year.

DEATHS. There were 63 deaths assigned to this area during 1958; of these 34 were male and 29 were female. This figure takes into account 16 inward transferable and two outward transferable deaths. The death rate for 1958 was 10.24 per thousand of the population, compared with 11.4 for 1957 and 12.04 for 1956. The death rate for England and Wales for 1958 was 11.7 per thousand of the population, compared with 11.5 for 1957 and 11.7 for 1956.

DEATHS OF INFANTS UNDER ONE YEAR OF AGE. One male infant under the age of one year died in the district during 1958. The cause of death was as follows:-

Under one week. (i) 1(a) Atelectosis.

The number of deaths recorded under this heading is four less than last year and the infant mortality rate has decreased from 18.86 in 1956 and 50.00 in 1957 to 8.77 per thousand live births this year. The rate for England and Wales during 1958 was 22.5 per thousand live births compared with 23.1 during 1957.

DEATHS UNDER ONE YEAR FROM DIARRHOEA. No deaths were recorded under this heading during the year.

VITAL STATISTICS

BIRTHS. The births registered in the District in 1928 numbered 114 (male 59 and female 55). The Annual Birth Rate for 1928 was 18.74 per thousand of the population, compared with 16.25 in 1927 and 17.75 in 1926. The Annual Birth Rate for England and Wales for 1928 was 16.4 compared with 16.1 for 1927 and 15.7 for 1926.

STILL BIRTHS. Two male and two female still births were registered in the area during the year. The rate per thousand of the population being 0.65 compared with 0.332 for 1927 and 0.167 for 1926. The rate for England and Wales per thousand total live and still births for 1928 was 21.0 compared with a rate of 22.9 per thousand live and still births for this area during the year.

DEATHS. There were 67 deaths assigned to this area during 1928; of these 34 were male and 33 were female. This figure taken into account 16 deaths transmissible and two unrecorded transmissible deaths. The death rate for 1928 was 10.54 per thousand of the population, compared with 11.4 for 1927 and 12.04 for 1926. The death rate for England and Wales for 1928 was 11.7 per thousand of the population, compared with 11.5 for 1927 and 11.7 for 1926.

DEATHS OF INFANTS UNDER ONE YEAR

OF AGE. One male infant under the age of one year died in the district during 1928. The cause of death was as follows:-

Under one week. (1) (a) Atelactasia.

The number of deaths recorded under this heading in four years past year and the infant mortality rate has decreased from 18.66 in 1926 and 20.00 in 1927 to 8.77 per thousand live births this year. The rate for England and Wales during 1928 was 8.5 per thousand live births compared with 5.1 during 1927.

DEATHS UNDER ONE YEAR FROM

DIARRHOEA. No deaths were reported under this heading during the year.

DEATHS FROM PUERPERAL SEPSIS,

ETC. There were no deaths notified from a puerperal cause during the year.

DEATHS FROM CANCER. The number

of deaths from all forms of cancer decreased from 12 last year to 11 in 1958. Of these four were male and seven were female. The percentage of total deaths being 17.46 compared with 17.39 for 1957 and 19.4 for 1956. Of the 11 deaths one male died as the result of carcinoma of the lung.

DEATHS FROM TUBERCULOSIS. There

were no deaths from this disease during the year. Two deaths were recorded under this heading last year.

DEATHS FROM HEART AND ARTERIAL

DISEASES. There were 32 deaths under this heading notified during the year. Of these deaths 16 were male and 16 female. These deaths accounted for 50.79 per cent of the total deaths during 1958, compared with 42.03 for 1957 and 54.16 per cent for 1956.

DEATHS FROM BRONCHITIS. Three

male and one female deaths were recorded during the year under this heading. The percentage of total deaths being 6.35 compared with 8.7 per cent for 1957 and 5.55 for 1956.

DEATHS FROM PNEUMONIA There were no deaths notified from a pneumonial cause during the year.

DEATHS FROM CANCER The number of deaths from all forms of cancer decreased from 15 last year to 11 in 1936. Of these four were male and seven were female. The percentage of total deaths being 17.46 compared with 12.39 for 1935 and 19.4 for 1934. Of the 11 deaths one was died as the result of carcinoma of the lung.

DEATHS FROM TUBERCULOSIS There were no deaths from this disease during the year. Two deaths were recorded under this heading last year.

DEATHS FROM HEART AND ARTERIAL DISEASES There were 32 deaths under this heading notified during the year. Of these deaths 16 were male and 16 female. These deaths accounted for 30.79 per cent of the total deaths during 1936, compared with 25.03 for 1935 and 24.16 per cent for 1934.

DEATHS FROM BRONCHITIS There were one male and one female deaths were recorded during the year under this heading. The percentage of total deaths being 0.95 compared with 8.7 per cent for 1935 and 2.35 for 1934.

HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA.

AMBULANCE FACILITIES. The Brecon County Council administer the ambulance services of the area under the National Health Act, 1946. The Health Department of the County Council have made arrangements with neighbouring authorities to provide ambulance facilities for our area as follows :-

Parish of Vaynor - County Borough of Merthyr Tydfil.

Hirwaun, Penderyn,
Ystradfellte and - Glamorgan County Council.
Pontneathvaughan.

Infectious disease cases in our area utilise the services of the Mardy Isolation Hospital, Merthyr Tydfil and the Cimla Hospital, Neath.

NURSING AT HOME. This work, which was undertaken by Voluntary Nursing Associations until 5th July, 1948, is now carried out by the County Council.

CLINICS. Clinics are still administered by the County Council, and clinics for expectant mothers and Infant Welfare are held at Cefn Coed and Hirwaun.

HOSPITALS. There are no hospitals in the Council's area, but we are fortunate in having hospital facilities in the adjoining urban areas of Merthyr Tydfil, Aberdare and Neath.

LABORATORY SERVICES. Arrangements have been made for the services of the Public Health Laboratories of the Institute of Preventative Medicine, The Parade, Cardiff, to be utilised for all chemical and bacteriological analyses and examinations required by this Authority.

WATER SUPPLY. The districe, which has several supplies of piped water, has on the whole, been satisfactorily supplied with water. Cefn Coed, in the Vaynor Parish, is supplied from the mains of the Taf Fechan Water Supply Board, as is the geater part of the Vaynor Parish.

HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA

AMBULANCE FACILITIES - The Green County Council administers the ambulance services of the area under the National Health Act, 1946. The Health Department of the County Council have made arrangements with neighbouring authorities to provide ambulance facilities for the area as follows:-

- Town of Veynor - County Borough of Merthyr Tydfil.
- Hirwaun, Penarth, Porthcawl and - Neath Port Talbot Council.
- Swansea.

Emergency ambulance services are provided by the services of the Merthyr Tydfil Hospital, Merthyr Tydfil and the Glamorgan Hospital, Cardiff.

AMBULANCE SERVICE - This service which was undertaken by Voluntary Nursing Associations until 31st July 1955, is now carried out by the County Council.

CLINIC - Clinics are held at the County Council, and clinics for specialist services and infant welfare are held at Cain Road and Hirwaun.

HOSPITALS - There are no hospitals in the Council's area, but we are fortunate in having hospital facilities in the adjoining urban areas of Merthyr Tydfil, Aberdare and Cardiff.

LABORATORY SERVICES - Arrangements have been made for the services of the Public Health Laboratories of the Institute of Preventative Medicine, The Parade, Cardiff, to be utilized for all chemical and bacteriological analyses and examinations required by this Authority.

WATER SUPPLY - The district, which has several supplies of piped water, has on the whole, been satisfactorily supplied with water. Cain Road, in the Veynor Parish, is supplied from the works of the Taff Fechan Water Supply Board, as is the greater part of the Veynor Parish.

In the Parish of Penderyn, Hirwaun is supplied by the mains of the Aberdare Urban District Council. At Penderyn, the water is pumped from the Cadlan and Ogof Fawr regions. This supply is chlorinated at the Cadlan Pump-house by means of a semi-automatic apparatus installed in 1944.

During the year 1951, an alternative supply from the Llygad Cynon Borehole was connected up to the existing mains at Penderyn, thus ensuring a clean and wholesome supply of water during periods of drought.

Pontneathvaughan, in the Parish of Ystradfellte, is supplied by the mains of the Neath Rural District Council. Unfortunately, However, the upper portion of the Parish, which includes the small hamlet of Ystradfellte, a school, and some 45 scattered farms, has no main piped water supply. A scheme has been prepared to provide subsidiary mains connected to the existing Neath Rural District Council's mains, which will provide a suitable and satisfactory supply to the farms and houses in the Ystradfellte area. An extension of the Neath mains will also provide a supply to the Colbren district of our area.

It is essential that a piped supply be brought into these areas to ensure that a wholesome supply of water be available to milk producing farms, as well as to the farm houses and cottages.

During the year samples of water were taken for bacteriological and chemical examination from Council mains and also from farms.

DRAINAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL

WORKS. The Council has provided efficient drainage and sewage disposal works for the whole area with the exception of the small hamlet of Ystradfellte. The disposal of sewage from the Hirwaun district is undertaken by the Aberdare U.D.C. under a joint scheme. Five other separate systems of sewage disposal are operated by this Council throughout the area.

REFUSE COLLECTION. Refuse is collected in the Cefn Coed, Hirwaun, Trefechan, Penderyn and Pontneathvaughan districts three times a week; twice a week at Pontsticill; and once a week at Ystradfellte.

In the Parish of Penstemon, Hants
is supplied by the mains of the Alton Urban District Council.
As Penstemon, the water is pumped from the Galian and Galt Ponds
system. This supply is obtained at the Galian Pump-house
by means of a coal-motivated engine installed in 1914.

During the year 1951, an alter-
native supply from the Galian Ponds was connected up
to the existing mains at Penstemon, thus ensuring a clean and
wholesome supply of water during periods of drought.

Penstemon, in the Parish
of Tadchester, is supplied by the mains of the Health Board,
District Council. Unfortunately, however, the upper portion
of the mains, which includes the main line of Tadchester,
is a 12 inch pipe, and some 45 houses in the area are supplied
by a 6 inch pipe. A scheme has been prepared to provide an
alternative supply to the existing Health Board District Council's
mains, which will provide a suitable and satisfactory supply
to the farms and houses in the Tadchester area. An extension
of the Health Board will also provide a supply to the Galt
District of our area.

It is essential that a good supply
be brought into these areas to ensure that a wholesome supply
of water be available to all residential areas, as well as to
the farm houses and cottages.

During the year periods of water
were taken for industrial and chemical purposes from
Galt Ponds and also from Galt.

SEWERAGE AND SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL

The Council has provided efficient drainage and
sewerage disposal works for the whole area with the exception
of the main line of Tadchester. The disposal of sewage
from the stream situated in underflow by the Alton U.D.C.
under a joint scheme. Five other separate systems of sewage
disposal are operated by the Council throughout the area.

WATER COLLECTION

Water is collected in the Galt Ponds, Hants, Penstemon, Penstemon and
Penstemon Districts from a well which takes a peak
at Tadchester; and once a week at Tadchester.

REFUSE DIPOSAL. Refuse

collected in the Vaynor Parish is mainly deposited at Godre'r Coed, Cefn Coed, although some is deposited at Pontsticill. Refuse from the Penderyn Parish is deposited at Trebanog, Penderyn, whilst collections of refuse from the Ystradfelle Parish continue to be tipped at Dinas Bank, Pontneathvaughan.

Care is taken to ensure that the refuse deposited at these tips does not become a breeding ground for vermin. The tips are regularly visited and baited when necessary.

SLAUGHTER-HOUSES. There are no slaughter-houses in the Council's area. All meat for human consumption in this area is supplied from slaughter houses in adjoining areas.

FOOD AND DRUGS ACT, 1938. A close inspection is made of meat and other foods sold in retail establishments throughout the area. Two hundred and twenty visits were made to butcher shops, food retailers, fried fish shops, ice cream premises, cafes and public houses during the year.

Bye-laws under Section 15 of this Act have been adopted and brought into operation by this Council.

Condemnation certificates are issued in respect of foodstuffs condemned in our area, in accordance with the various Food Regulations issued by the Ministries concerned. The following articles of food were condemned during the year, as being unfit for consumption by humans:-

Care is taken to ensure that the refuse deposited at these tips does not become a breeding ground for vermin. The tips are regularly visited and baited when necessary.

SLAUGHTER-HOUSES. There are no slaughter-houses in the Council's area. All meat for human consumption in this area is supplied from slaughter-houses in adjoining areas.

FOOD AND DRUGS ACT, 1938. A close inspection is made of meat and other foods sold in retail establishments throughout the area. Two inspectors, twenty visits were made to butcher shops, food retailers, fish shops, ice cream premises, cafes and public houses during the year.

By-laws under Section 15 of this Act have been adopted and brought into operation by the Council.
