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



This Report deals with Statistics for the year 1942 and is still abbreviated as a result of War Conditions.

In spite of the fact that Immunisation covered a big percentage of the children there was a fairly serious outbreak of Diphtheria occurred in the last quarter of the year. There were no deaths in the Immunised Groups and a large number of the cases occurred amongst adolescents. Otherwise the health of the community is being well maintained.

I again wish to thank the Staff, both of my own and other Corporation Departments for all their help and co-operation, and also Health Committee for their continued consideration.

Respiratory diseases.

The number of deaths from the above were: Bronchitis 10; Pneumonia 4; other respiratory diseases 2; a total of 16, giving a Death Rate of .89 per 1,000 of the population against a death rate of 2.41 for 1941.

Diarrhoea and Enteritis.

There were two deaths under two years of age, giving a death rate of 8.0 per 1,000 live births. The death rate for England and Wales for 1942 was 5.2 per 1,000 Live-Births.

Cancer and Malignant disease.

The deaths from the above were Males: 12; Females: 24; total: 36. This gives a death rate of 2.00 for 1942 as against 2.46 for 1941.

MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE.

122 women made 160 attendances at the Ante-Natal Clinic during 1942. These figures are very satisfactory; showing how the services rendered are appreciated.

Dr. Newton is available through any of the local practitioners for cases of abnormal confinement.

The Infantile Mortality Rate for the year was 60.4 deaths per 1,000 Live Births, against 44.9 for 1941. The births were 253 against 252 for 1941. There were 15 Still-Births for 1942, against 11 for 1941.

There were 15 deaths of infants under 1 year of age compared with 11 for 1941.

The Milk (Mother and Children) Order, 1939, has been carried out according to the Ministry of Health Scale.

Measles, Whooping Cough, Epidemic Diarrhoea, and Pemphigus Neonatorum are visited by the Health Visitor.

102 Mothers were confined at Moorlands Maternity Home against 88 for 1941. 49 Mothers confined in other hospitals or nursing homes outside the district. 39 St. Mary's Hospital; 3 Birch Hill Hospital; 1 Burnley; 6 Brierfield. Total 151

Dr. A. Callum, of Burnley is the Consultant for Puerperal Pyrexia cases, and is available through the Medical Officer of Health.

MILK SUPPLY.

Bacteriological Examination of Milk.

27 Samples of Ordinary Milk were examined by the Methylene Blue Reduction Test of which 18 passed the Test, 17 samples

passed the Coliform Test.

Compared with the Accredited Milk Standard 10 samples or 37% contained bacteria more than is permissible as compared with 62.5% for last year. Where the samples have failed to reach this reasonable standard of cleanliness your Inspector has, in each instance, endeavoured to promote, by personal contact with the producer, a keener attention and interest in the production of a purer milk supply. Arrangements are being made for the examination of samples of milk for the detection of Tubercle Bacilli.

Food and Drugs Act, 1938.

The following Samples of Milk were taken and submitted by me to the Public Analyst for examination:—

29 samples of milk were examined and with two exceptions

found to be genuine.

The farmers have maintained a good young breed of Milk Cow which has assured the quality of the milk and survived war-time feeding difficulties and is a praiseworthy achievement,

Refuse Collection service.

The collection of domestic and trade refuse is performed by two S. & D. 7 cu. yd. Refuse Collection vehicles. These waggons purchased in 1932 and 1933 still continue to give every satisfaction and have proved eminently satisfactory for this class of work locally.

Refuse Disposal.

All refuse is disposed of by Controlled Tipping on two tips—one at Change and the other known as Blackwood Tip, Stacksteads.

During the year 225 dustbins have been sold and delivered by this Department.
