I have the honour to submit for your consideration the Annual Report on the Health Services of the Borough for the year 1944.

During the year the Ante-Natal Clinic was placed on a Monthly instead of a two Monthly basis, reducing the Intervals between examinations at the Clinic and giving a more efficient and satisfactory Service which is being appreciated.

The Sanitary Inspector, due to the prevailing Shortage of Staff, Labour and Materials, finds great difficulties in getting carried out Repairs etc., to the ever increasing defects and dilapidations to property. The work on this account being made onerous.

The Office and Clinic Accommodation is a problem which should require a First Priority.

The Immunisation of Children against diphtheria still remains at a high level.

The General Health is still well maintained and there were no serious epidemics during the year.

I desire to thank the Chairman and Members of the Health and Maternity and Child Welfare Committee for their support. I gratefully acknowledge the willing support of all Members of my Staff.

MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE.

106 women made 189 attendances at the Ante-Natal Clinic during 1944. These figures are very satisfactory; showing how the services rendered are appreciated.

Dr. Rickards is available through any of the local practitioners for cases of abnormal confinement.

The Infantile Mortality Rate for the year was 32.36 deaths per 1,000 Live Births, against 43.47 for 1943. The births were 309 against 287 for 1943. There were 6 Still-Births for 1944, against 12 for 1943.

There were 16 deaths of infants under 1 year of age compared with 13 for 1943.

The Milk (Mother and Children) Order, 1939, has been carried out according to the Ministry of Health Scale.

Measles, Whooping Cough, Epidemic Diarrhoea, and Pemphigus Neonatorum are visited by the Health Visitor.

134 Mothers were confined at Moorlands Maternity Home against 121 for 1943. 36 Mothers confined in other hospitals or nursing homes outside the district. 12 St. Mary's Hospital; 1 Birch Hill Hospital; 10 Brierfield; 11 Bury; 1 Manchester; 1 Jericho. Total 170.

Dr. A. Callum, of Burnley is the Consultant for Puerperal Pyrexia cases, and is available through the Medical Officer of Health.

Maternal Deaths are investigated by Dr. Hall, the County Medical Officer of Health.

MILK SUPPLY.

Bacteriological Examination of Milk.

- 24 Samples of Undesignated Milk were submitted for examination, according to the tests prescribed for "Accredited Milk", 4 of these or 16.66% failing to pass the tests.
- 4 Samples of "Pasteurised" Schools Milks were examined; 1 only failed to pass the prescribed tests.
- 23 Samples were examined from bulk supplies from local farms and submitted for examination for the presence of tubercle bacilli. In only one case was a positive report received. The facts were reported to the County Council and appropriate action taken under the provisions of the Tuberculosis Order, 1938.

One Tuberclin Tested Milk Producer's Licence has been issued during the year.

Two supplementary Licences to retail "Pasteurised" Milk in the Borough have been renewed.

Food and Drugs Act, 1938.

The following Samples of Milk were taken and submitted by me to the Public Analyst for examination :—

19 samples of milk were examined of which 3 were found to be not genuine.

Refuse Collection service.

The collection of domestic and trade refuse is performed by two S. & D. 7 cu. yd. Refuse Collection vehicles. Despite labour difficulties few complaints of non-emptying of dustbins have been received. A weekly collection of domestic refuse has been aimed at except in two areas selected for a fortnightly refuse collection service. The collection of salvage and kitchen scraps is still maintained.

Refuse Disposal.

All refuse is disposed of by Controlled Tipping on two tips—one at Change and the other known as Blackwood Tip, Stacksteads.

During the year 189 dustbins have been sold and delivered by this Department.
