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



I beg to place before you the Annual Report on the Health Services for the year ending the 31st December, 1945.

During the year under review there was a Measles Epidemic no deaths having occurred. The number of cases of Diphtheria, was exceptionally low. A few cases of Scarlet Fever of a mild type were notified, two of which were admitted to Hospital on account of complications.

The number of parents responding to our appeal for Immunisation against Diphtheria has been most gratifying.

The Ante-Natal Clinic shows by the numbers attending that the Services of this Clinic are appreciated.

The General Health and Nutritional State of the Population has been satisfactory.

I again desire to thank the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee for their support. I gratefully acknowledge the willing co-operation of all Members of the Staff.

The number of deaths from the above were: Bronchitis 17; Pneumonia 5; other respiratory diseases 4; a total of 26, giving a Death Rate of 1.54 per 1,000 of the population against a death rate of 0.94 for 1944.

Diarrhoea and Enteritis.

There were no deaths under two years of age, giving a death rate of 0.00 per 1,000 live births. The death rate for England and Wales for 1945 was 5.6 per 1,000 Live-Births.

Cancer and Malignant disease.

The deaths from the above were Males: 13; Females: 19; total: 32. This gives a death rate of 1.89 for 1945 as against 1.77 for 1944.

MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE.

135 women made 308 attendances at the Ante-Natal Clinic during 1945. These figures are very satisfactory; showing how the services rendered are appreciated.

Dr. Rickards is available through any of the local practition-

ers for cases of abnormal confinement.

The Infantile Mortality Rate for the year was 11.54 deaths per 1,000 Live Births, against 32.36 for 1944. The births were 260 against 309 for 1944. There were 10 Still-Births for 1945, against 6 for 1944.

There were 3 deaths of infants under 1 year of age compared with 10 for 1944.

The Milk (Mother and Children) Order, 1939, has been carried out according to the Ministry of Health Scale.

Measles, Whooping Cough, Epidemic Diarrhoea, and Pemphigus

Neonatorum are visited by the Health Visitor.

107 Mothers were confined at Moorlands Maternity Home against 134 for 1944 30 Mothers confined in other hospitals or nursing homes outside the district. 14 St. Mary's Hospital; 4 Brierfield; 6 Bury; 3 Manchester; 1 Jericho; 1 Tottington 1 Acceington. Total 137.

In compliance with the directions of the 24th March, 1945 from the Ministry of Food a second treatment of the Council's Sewers has been completed. 117 Manholes were prebaited of which only 11 showed a "take." 11 Manholes were poison baited of which 7 showed a "take." From this it can be assumed that the Rat population remaining in the Sewers has been reduced to a very low level indeed.

MILK SUPPLY.

Bacteriological Examination of Milk.

- 5 Samples of Undesignated Milk were submitted for examination, according to the tests prescribed for "Accredited Milk", 1 of these failing to pass the test.
- 4 Samples of "Pasteurised" Schools Milks were examined all passing the prescribed tests.
- 14 Samples were examined from bulk supplies from local farms and submitted for examination for the presence of tubercle bacilli. Tubercle bacilli was not found in any sample.

Two supplementary Licences to retail "Pasteurised" Milk in the Borough have been renewed.

Food and Drugs Act, 1938.

The following Samples of Milk were taken and submitted by me to the Public Analyst for examination:—

19 samples of milk were examined all of which were genuine.

The average composition of Milk produced in the Borough is given below together with the standard laid down by the Board of Agriculture:—

Factories Act, 1937.

37 visits have been made under the above Act. 4 Notices were served. 2 Inspections have been made of Outworkers Premises (See Table shewing Defects found in Factories and Other Premises).

PUBLIC CLEANSING SERVICE.

The Health Committee are responsible for the Cleansing and Disposal of Contents of Ashpits, Privy middens, Dustbins, Cesspools and Pail-Closets and for the cleansing and maintenance of Public Sanitary Conveniences.

Refuse Collection service.

The collection of domestic and trade refuse is performed by two S. & D. 7 cu. yd. Refuse Collection vehicles. Despite labour difficulties few complaints of non-emptying of dustbins have been received. A weekly collection of domestic refuse has been aimed at except in those areas selected for a fortnightly refuse collection service. The collection of salvage and kitchen scraps is still maintained.

Refuse Disposal.

All refuse is disposed of by Controlled Tipping on two tips—one at Change and the other known as Blackwood Tip, Stacksteads.

During the year 386 dustbins have been sold and delivered by this Department.


