

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

To the Mayor, Alderman and Burgesses of the Borough of Bacup.

MR. MAYOR, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I beg to place before you the Annual Report on the Health Services for the year ending the 31st December, 1946.

Except for an outbreak of Whooping Cough in the Spring, the incidence of other infectious diseases was low.

General Immunisation against Diphtheria is carried on in a routine manner. The opportunity of a Booster Injection has been given to all our School Children and the response has been most satisfactory.

Out of eight cases of notified Diphtheria admitted to Hospital only in one case was the diagnosis confirmed. This case was not immunised but made a good recovery.

The general state of property is deteriorating and the amount of work falling on the Sanitary Department as a result is increasing. This deterioration is due to the age of the property, increasing costs, shortage of materials and labour difficulties.

My thanks are due to the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee for their support. I gratefully acknowledge the willing co-operation of my Staff.

MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE.

237 women made 507 attendances at the Ante-Natal Clinic during 1946. These figures are very satisfactory; showing how the services rendered are appreciated.

Dr. Rickards is available through any of the local practitioners for cases of abnormal confinement.

The Infantile Mortality Rate for the year was 48.57 deaths per 1,000 Live Births, against 30.77 for 1945. The births were 350 against 260 for 1945. There were 7 Still-Births for 1946, against 10 for 1945.

There were 17 deaths of infants under 1 year of age compared with 8 for 1945.

The Milk (Mother and Children) Order, 1939, has been carried out according to the Ministry of Health Scale.

Measles, Whooping Cough, Epidemic Diarrhoea, and Pemphigus Neonatorum are visited by the Health Visitor.

119 Mothers were confined at Moorlands Maternity Home against 107 for 1945 41 Mothers confined in other hospitals or nursing homes outside the district. 22 St. Mary's Hospital; 12 Brierfield; 4 Bury; 1 Accrington; 1 Rochdale; 1 Burnley; Total 160.

Dr. A. Callum, of Burnley is the Consultant for Puerperal Pyrexia cases, and is available through the Medical Officer of Health.

Maternal Deaths are investigated by Dr. Hall, the County Medical Officer of Health.

MILK SUPPLY.

Bacteriological Examination of Milk.

19 Samples of Undesignated Milk were submitted for examination, according to the tests prescribed for "Accredited Milk", Of these, 3 only failed to pass the Methylene Blue Test and 6 failed the B. Coli. Test.

4 Samples of "Pasteurised" Schools Milks were examined all passing the prescribed tests, including examinations for the the presence of Tubercle Bacilli.

17 Samples were examined from bulk supplies from local farms and submitted for examination for the presence of tubercle bacilli. Tubercle bacilli was not found in any sample.

Two supplementary Licences to retail " Pasteurised " Milk in the Borough have been renewed.

Food and Drugs Act, 1938.

The following Samples of Milk were taken and submitted by me to the Public Analyst for examination :—

19 samples of milk were examined, of which 1 was found to be not genuine.

The collection of domestic and trade refuse is performed by two S. & D. 7 cu. yd. Refuse Collection vehicles. A weekly collection of domestic refuse has been aimed at except in those areas selected for a fortnightly refuse collection service. As a result of the changing character of refuse over the years to a much more bulky nature; the inferior quality of domestic fuel and the gradual building of houses the Committee appreciate that additional transport will be necessary to provide a weekly refuse collection service throughout the Borough,

The collection of salvage and kitchen scraps is still maintained **Refuse Disposal**.

All refuse is disposed of by Controlled Tipping on two tips one at Change and the other known as Blackwood Tip, Stacksteads.
