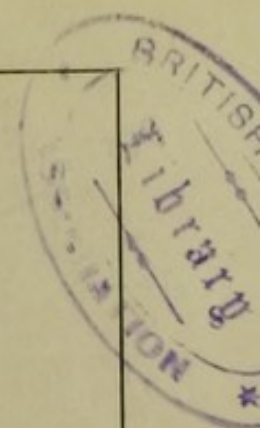

ANNUAL REPORT

ON THE HEALTH OF THE

Baildon Urban Sanitary District

For the Year 1923.



*To the Chairman and Members of the Baildon
Urban District Council.*

GENTLEMEN,

I have pleasure in presenting my Eighth Annual Report for the year 1923.

The health of the district has been good in spite of the poor summer we have had.

Two Schools have been closed for measles. There have been odd cases of scarlet fever from time to time, but no epidemic. The cases have mostly been imported. Tong Park School was closed to prevent the spread of scarlet fever.

In view of the prevalence of Small-pox in the West Riding the Council decided during the year to add Chicken-pox to the list of notifiable diseases. The sanction of the Ministry of Health to this being obtained.

Birth-Rate.—There have been 104 births registered during the year, 57 Males and 47 Females; 3 illegitimate (1 Male and 2 Females). This is at the rate of 15.5 per 1,000 births, the birth rate for England and Wales being 19.7 per 1,000.

Death-Rate.—There have been 84 deaths during the year, 45 Males and 39 Females, 67 have died in the district and 17 outside. There have been 31 over 60 years and upwards. This is a death rate of 12.6 per 1,000. The death rate for England and Wales is 11.6.

Infantile Deaths.—There have been 6 deaths of Infants under one year of age which is equal to a rate of 57.5 per 1,000. The death rate for England and Wales under one year of age is 69 per 1,000 births.

Infectious Diseases—There has been an epidemic of measles during the year, but as measles is not notifiable in the district there is no record of the numbers. There have been 6 cases of Diphtheria, 27 cases of Scarlet Fever, and 6 cases of Erysipelas.

Nursing.—The District Nurse (Miss Brown) has been very much in demand. The patients having got over the prejudice of having a stranger to attend to them, and having once had her services, do not hesitate to ask for her again. She has paid 1,764 visits and attended 12 operations during the year.

Clinics.—The Maternity and Child Welfare centre has been well attended, and an increasing number of school children have been in attendance. The Teachers at all the schools are helping by sending cases for observation.

Hospital.—The hospital accommodation is still the same as last year.

Water Supply.—There has been no shortage of water except in the West Lane district where it has been short from time to time.

Samples have been taken and sent for analysis and in all cases found to be good and free from contamination.

I submit a sample analysis of the Town's water made by F. W. Richardson, Esq., the County Analyst:—

This is water of the very highest organic purity. (Being also very soft, it is one of the purest and best waters for drinking and domestic purposes.)

I was very sorry that the voting on the water Bill was against it, as we must have a better supply if houses continue to be built.

I would again draw the attention of the Council to the need for some system of filtering the water.

Sanitary Administration.—The Bake-Houses (6), have been inspected and found to be in a satisfactory condition. The Slaughter Houses (2) have been visited and found to be clean and well kept. There are still cases of slaughtering taking place in unregistered premises. The cowsheds have been inspected and found to be clean and well kept, except in a few cases where whitewashing was not carried out systematically.

The factories and workshops (36) have been visited.

There are still some closets in Lane End district that want converting into water closets and connecting up with the sewer:

I am very pleased to report that a beginning has at last been made in converting the closets in Tong Park district into W.C.'s, and I hope that the good work will be continued during the coming year.

I am sorry to report that there are still seven houses in Tong Park without a supply of water laid into the houses, the supply having to be carried from a tap out in the street.

I am pleased to report that the number of defective spouts, gullies, fall pipes and defective roofs have been greatly reduced, but there is still room for improvement.

Fall pipes reported, 103.

Smoke.—The smoke nuisance has been worse than ever during the past year, and I am hoping that the Council will take drastic measures to abate it, as complaints are of no use.
