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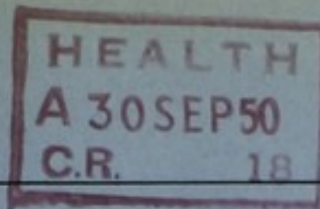

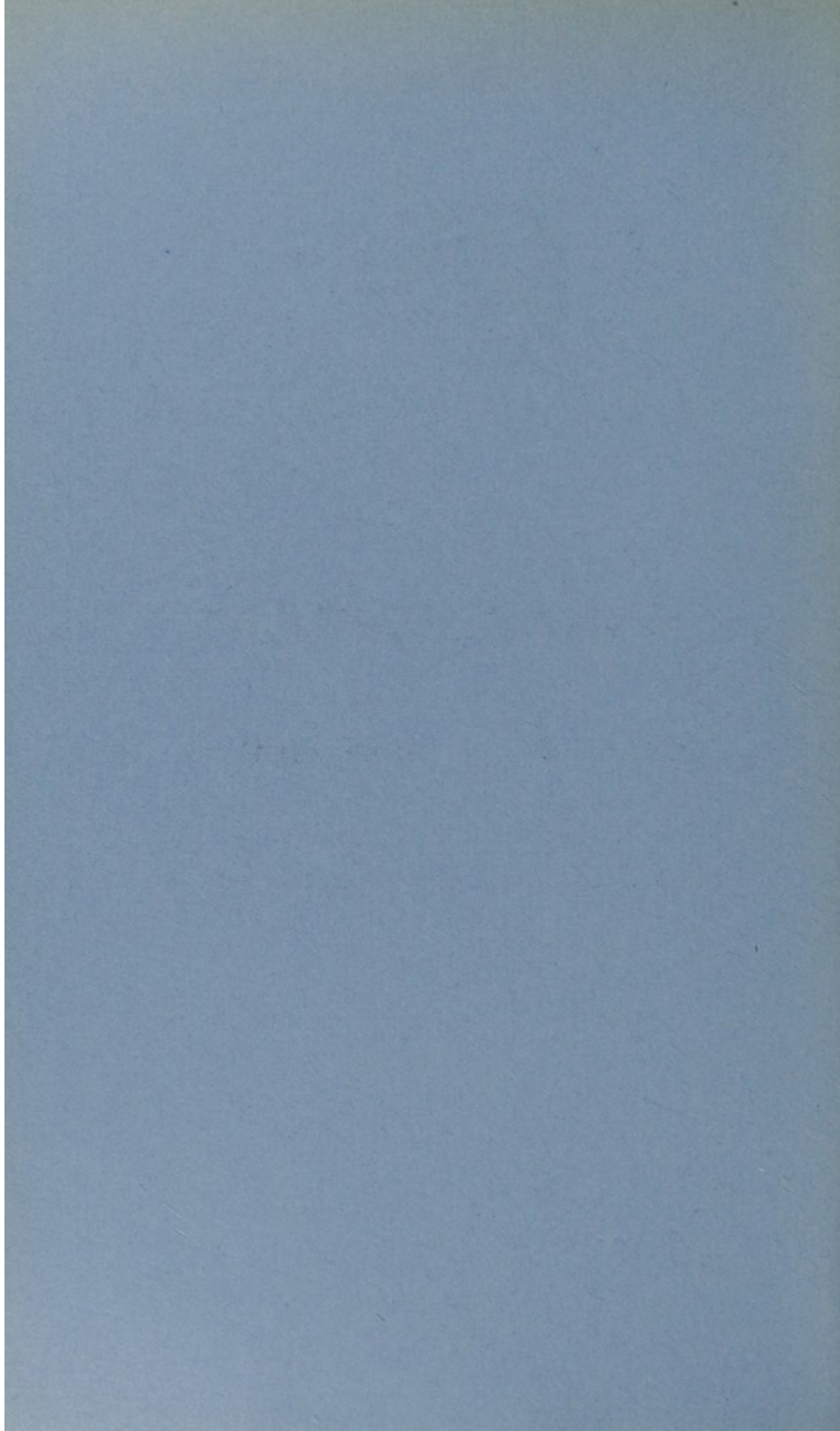

**To the Worshipful the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the  
Borough of Banbury**

MR. MAYOR, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,—

I beg to submit the Annual Report on the Health Services of the Borough during 1949. The report is prepared in accordance with Circular 2/50 of the Ministry of Health issued on 26th January, 1950.

The birth rate in 1949 was 18.01, which is somewhat lower than in 1948. The Death Rate was 9.98, also slightly lower than 1948. The Infant Mortality was 14.66 per 1,000 births. This is the lowest figure which has been recorded in Banbury during the last 30 years. The Tuberculosis Death Rate .38 per 1,000 is practically the same as last year, but below the average for England and Wales.

With regard to Infectious Disease, the number of notifications received by the Health Department was 240 as compared with 418 in 1948. This reduction is largely due to a smaller number of cases of Measles notified—also the number of cases of Scarlet Fever was less than half that of 1948. One case of Diphtheria occurred in an adult. There were two cases of Poliomyelitis, both of whom recovered without paralysis.

Housing still continues to be the most acute public health problem in the Borough, and the need for re-housing overcrowded families and tenants of unfit houses is most urgent. As is pointed out elsewhere in the report, an accurate survey of the housing situation in the Borough in this respect is most necessary.

In conclusion, I should like to thank the staff of the Health Department, and in particular the Chief Sanitary Inspector for valuable co-operation during the year.

#### **Illegitimate Children.**

There were 9 illegitimate births during the year. Of these none died before reaching the age of one year. This represents an Infant Mortality Rate of 0.0 per 1,000 as against 15.06 for legitimate children.

## **SECTION C**

### **SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.**

#### **1. Water Supply.**

Water for the Borough was, up to the end of 1946, supplied by the Banbury Water Company but, during that year, a Bill was passed by Parliament under which the Town Council acquired the undertaking as from the 1st January, 1947. (Banbury Corporation Act, 1946).

The water supply is from the River Cherwell at Grimsbury and the Sor Brook at Adderbury; it is treated by sand and mechanical filters and is also chlorinated. During 1949 the supply was constant and sufficient.

During the year, 62 samples of water were taken for chemical and bacteriological examination. All were reported to be satisfactory and suitable for a public supply.

With the exception of a few houses on the outskirts of the town (about 30 separate premises), all are on the public supply. During the last four years, town's water has been laid on at 18 premises hitherto supplied from wells or springs and the supplies

have been improved at 5 premises by the provision of a filtration plant in one case; the cleaning out of wells in three cases; and the provision of an alternative satisfactory well supply at the other house. Seven cases of unsatisfactory well water supplies were under consideration at the close of the year and steps were being taken to improve these supplies.

During the year all the waterworks employees—30 in number—had blood examinations for Vi antibodies with a view to detecting possible Typhoid carriers. All the specimens gave satisfactory results.

During 1949, 17 specimens of water were examined from wells and other private supplies in the Borough, with results as follows:

## 3. Rivers and Streams.

The Thames Conservancy Board exercise general supervision over the rivers and streams in the Borough. The water-courses conveying storm water received attention from the Sanitary Inspector during the year and a large amount of cleansing of watercourses was carried out.

## 4. Closet Accommodation.

Practically all the dwelling-houses in the Borough are provided with water closets except a few on the extreme outskirts of the town where the water carriage system is not available. Improvements to closet accommodation carried out as a result of

## **SECTION D**

### **HOUSING.**

#### **1. Unfit Houses.**

As mentioned in previous reports, the housing conditions in the Borough still leave much to be desired and, as soon as conditions permit, it will be necessary to deal with several areas as Clearance Areas and with many individual unfit houses by demolition order procedure.

During 1949 a considerable amount of housing repair work was carried out, and 658 houses were dealt with under the provisions of the Public Health Act, 1936, and the Housing Act, 1936. Five unfit houses were demolished as a result of informal action during the year and four further unfit houses were closed following similar action.

Although there is no doubt that the general housing conditions in the Borough are far from satisfactory it is true to say that the full extent of the problem has not yet been fully ascertained and I am of the opinion that a full survey of housing conditions is desirable. It would appear that such a survey, on a national basis, is envisaged by the Ministry of Health, and it is to be hoped that conditions will soon permit of this being carried out.

## 2. Overcrowding.

Although no precise details are available it is certain that a considerable amount of overcrowding still exists in the Borough although the post-war housing work of the Corporation has relieved some of the worst cases. In this connection, too, a national housing survey would enable local authorities to obtain precise data with regard to the problem of overcrowding in their respective areas.

The re-housing of overcrowded families will also form a substantial part of the Corporation's future housing programme and this fact should be borne in mind when the long-term housing policy is under consideration.

# SECTION E

## INSPECTION OF MEAT AND OTHER FOODS.

### (a) Milk Supply.

The supervision of the town's milk supply has been given much attention by the Sanitary Inspectors during the year. 76 visits of inspection were made to cowsheds and dairies and five premises were improved during the year—5 defects and contraventions being remedied on request. There were, up to the end of September, on the register :

**Scarlet Fever.**

24 cases occurred during 1949. 15 were admitted to hospital and 9 isolated at home. 16 occurred in school children, 4 in children under school age and 4 in adults.

**Puerperal Pyrexia.**

One case of Puerperal Pyrexia occurred at the Maternity Hospital. A Haemolytic Streptococcus was isolated; the patient was removed to Oxford for treatment. No definite source of infection was found.

**Measles.**

139 cases occurred, mainly during the months of June, July and August. There were few complications and no deaths.

**Poliomyelitis.**

Two cases occurred; both in children under 5. Both were removed to Oxford City Isolation Hospital. In neither was there any permanent paralysis.

**Diphtheria Immunisation.**

This is carried out at the School Clinic, Warwick Road, by the Oxfordshire County Council, under National Health Service Act 1946.

**CHIEF SANITARY INSPECTOR'S ANNUAL  
REPORT, 1949.**

I have pleasure in submitting herewith my fourth annual report, which records the work of your Sanitary Inspectors for the year 1949, and, in doing so, I am able to record good progress in all phases of the Department's work.

During the year under review, special attention has been given to work under the Housing Act, the supervision of the town's food and milk supplies and to the administration of the Shops Acts, the Factories Act and the Infestation Order.

Records of the various inspections made, notices served and complied with, and the improvements effected thereby are set out in the tables in the report and various comments on the activities of the Department follow.

It is again pleasing for me to be able to record further progress in the work of improving the conditions under which food is sold, prepared for sale and stored in the Borough and, in general, it can be said that a more satisfactory standard of food hygiene is now being obtained in the area.

The year 1949 saw the loss of the Corporation's powers with respect to some aspects of milk production and control and, whilst this loss of powers is to be deplored, it is of interest to record the great strides which have been made during the last few years towards ensuring for the people of this town, a safe and clean milk supply.

The maintenance and improvement of housing conditions still remains one of the most important duties of the Department and, as mentioned in previous reports, I am still far from satisfied with the general housing conditions of the Borough.

Some staff changes occurred during the year. Mr. G. Richards (Additional Sanitary Inspector) and Miss M. E. Oxley (Shorthand Typist) resigned their appointments on taking up positions elsewhere and they were succeeded by Mr. T. H. Cutler and Miss R. Harris respectively.

In submitting this report, I must express my thanks to the Chairman and Members of the Public Health Committee for their support during the year and to the Medical Officer of Health, the Town Clerk and the other Chief Officers of the Corporation for their ready help at all times.

Finally, my thanks are especially due to the two Additional

Sanitary Inspectors, the Chief Clerk and the Shorthand Typist for their work throughout the year. The work recorded by this report is largely due to the team spirit and loyalty which obtains in the Department.

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### WATER SUPPLIES.

During 1949, interior water supplies from the town's mains were supplied to 9 premises which had hitherto been supplied from external stand pipes or from other sources than the public mains. In addition, at 22 other premises repairs were effected to burst water pipes or defective water fittings following requests from the Department.

The work of sampling the water supplies of all premises not connected to the public mains was continued during the year, 20 samples being taken and these were submitted for bacteriological examination. 14 of the samples showed evidence of pollution and the owners of the 7 premises concerned were requested to lay on town's water where possible or otherwise to improve the quality of the supply. At 2 premises town's water was provided; at 1 house a proper filtration plant was installed and at 3 premises the wells were cleaned out with subsequent satisfactory results after sampling.

### DRAINAGE AND WATER CLOSETS.

During the year, 34 choked drains were dealt with by the Department and, in addition, at 31 premises drains were re-constructed or repaired under our supervision—this work including the provision of 5 new inspection chambers. In addition, several

choked sewers were referred to the Borough Engineer's Department, all of which were promptly dealt with.

Complaints were also received during the year from residents in various parts of the town with respect to flooding of basements following surcharge of the sewers in times of heavy rain. This matter is receiving the attention of the Corporation's Consulting Engineers who are preparing schemes with a view to remedying the trouble.

Sixteen additional water closets were provided at various premises in the Borough during 1949; 82 water closet compartments were repaired; 43 new pedestal pans fixed and 32 cisterns repaired or renewed. In addition, proper flushing facilities were provided to 3 water closets which had hitherto been flushed by hand.

During 1949, sinks were provided at 5 houses previously without such conveniences and 15 sinks or washing basins were provided at food premises in the area.

### **CANAL BOATS.**

Thirty canal boats were inspected during the year and 6 of these were found to be carrying tar. The total number of persons for which boats were registered was 99 (Aft cabins 89 Fore cabins 10) and the boats were occupied by 21 adult males, 33 adult females and 8 children—a total of 62 persons. Two boats were found to be infringing the Regulations during the year and notices were served upon the owners concerned. No cases of infectious diseases were met with on any of the boats inspected.

### **HOUSING.**

A large proportion of the time of your Sanitary Inspectors still continues to be devoted to the improvement of housing conditions in the Borough, and the year 1949 saw no diminution of this work.

As in previous post-war years, a considerable amount of work was again carried out to dwelling houses in the area following the service of notices under the provisions of both the Public Health Act, 1936 and the Housing Act, 1936, and the improvement in the position as regards labour and materials, mentioned in my last report, was maintained during 1949.

During the year under review, 643 houses were inspected under the provisions of the Public Health Act and 537 were inspected and recorded under the Housing (Consolidated) Regula-

tions. As a result of these inspections, it was found necessary to serve 527 informal notices and 390 statutory notices and, of these notices, 604 informal and 300 statutory were complied with during the year.

The number of houses repaired during 1949 was 658, of which 10 were repaired by the Corporation in default of the owners under the relevant provisions of the Housing Act, 1936.

Five unfit houses were demolished as a result of informal action during the year and 4 unfit houses were closed following similar action by the Corporation.

The general housing conditions of the Borough still remain a matter of concern and, in spite of the creditable work already achieved by the Corporation in the field of post-war housing, it is still very evident that many people in the town are having to live under overcrowded and unsatisfactory housing conditions.

The full extent of the problem facing the Corporation in this respect is not yet fully established and I am of the opinion that to place too much reliance on the number of applicants on the Council's waiting list for new houses is apt to be misleading. This list, in general, shows the number of persons who wish to be rehoused and does not really establish the number of persons who need rehousing on account of their present unsatisfactory conditions.

For this reason, therefore, I still feel that the carrying out of a national survey of housing conditions is desirable. Such a survey would be of immense value locally, and nationally, in assessing the real housing needs and would enable the local authorities to measure the true extent of the housing problem in their respective areas.

### **VERMINOUS PREMISES.**

33 rooms infested by bugs or fleas were disinfested by the Department during 1949 and 38 inspections of such premises were made by the Sanitary Inspectors. In each case, the premises were dealt with by the use of some form of D.D.T. preparation and I am again pleased to record the excellent results achieved by the use of this product. In addition to the disinfection work carried out by the Department, a quantity of D.D.T. liquid and powder was supplied to residents of the Borough and several cases of minor infestation by flies, cockroaches, ants, etc. were dealt with in this way.

### **REFUSE ACCOMMODATION.**

During the year, 79 new dustbins were provided at various premises in the Borough following the service of notices by the

Department and it was unnecessary for the Corporation to supply any dustbins in default of the owners during 1949.

### **VAN DWELLINGS.**

During the year, 166 inspections were made with respect to van dwellings, 82 of these structures being inspected during the period of the local annual Fair. The persons occupying the fair vehicles comprised 76 adult males, 104 adult females and 70 children. Generally speaking, the caravans were clean and well kept and most of the structures were provided with their own sanitary and refuse accommodation. No serious cases of overcrowding of van dwellings were discovered, and no cases of infectious diseases were met with during these visits. 4 caravans were removed from sites in Southam Road, Grimsbury, and Station Road during the year, following action by the Department and, in addition, two wooden erections in Castle Street West, used for human habitation, were closed on the instructions of the Public Health Committee. At the close of the year, there existed in the Borough 12 caravans and other erections on 2 licensed and 7 unlicensed sites, the latter being under consideration by the Corporation at the close of the year.

### **FACTORIES AND BAKEHOUSES.**

The routine inspection of factories and bakehouses was again given attention throughout the year and 169 visits of inspection were made of such premises. 15 premises were improved on our request and 46 defects or contraventions were remedied—details of this work being recorded on page 21 of this report.

### **SHOPS ACTS.**

The regular routine inspection of shops was maintained during 1949 and 143 inspections were recorded under this heading. All duties under the various Shops Acts are carried out by your Sanitary Inspectors, and as a result of the inspections made during the year, 5 premises were improved and at a further 22 shops, proper notices were exhibited and proper records kept at the request of this Department.

### **SMOKE ABATEMENT.**

The smoke problem again received attention during the period under review and 77 visits of inspection—including several timed

observations of factory chimneys were made. In the case of four premises, contraventions of the Public Health Act were recorded and, in each case, action was taken with a view to abating the nuisance. At one large dairy premises a new boiler was installed following advice given by the Department and, at another small clothing factory, the smoke nuisance was remedied by the cleansing of the flues, improved stoking methods and by the use of a better quality fuel.

The other two cases were under consideration at the close of the year. In the case of one premises, a statutory notice had been served but not expired and, in the other case, a change of ownership held up the negotiations for a time.

### INFECTIOUS DISEASES AND DISINFECTION.

During 1949, the Sanitary Inspectors made 82 visits of enquiry into notified infectious disease cases and a report on each case was submitted to the Medical Officer of Health. As a result of the occurrence of infectious diseases, 52 houses were disinfected during the year.

### RATS AND MICE DESTRUCTION.

Continued progress was made during 1949 in the work of eradicating rats and mice from premises in the area. The Corporation continued to participate in the N.S.19 scheme of the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries under which a free service is given for work carried out at private dwellings whilst a charge is made for rodent destruction services in respect of business premises.

The following summary gives details of the work done during the year with comparative figures for the three previous years :—

**(b) Sewer Infestations.**

During the four weekly periods ending 26th May and 28th November the fourth and fifth complete maintenance treatments of the Corporation's sewers were carried out. The results of this work together with the results of previous treatments are as follows:—

In addition to the above work, a test bait of a proportion of all the sewers was carried out in January, 1949. This test-baiting showed an absence of infestation in the Grimsbury, Neithrop, and Easington areas but some infestation in the Town area. All the sewers in the Town area were subsequently baited when, out of 48 manholes baited, 9 showed evidence of poison being taken.

The results of the sewer baiting done during the year show a noticeable reduction in the degree of infestation of the town's sewers—a reduction which may be assumed to be due to the constant attention given to rodent control work generally in the Borough during the last few years.

**MILK CONTROL.**

The year 1949 saw the transfer, to the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries, of the Corporation's powers of the supervision of the production of milk together with the transfer to the County Council of their powers of supervision over milk pasteurisation plants.

The supervision of milk production and milk distribution was well maintained during 1949, and 76 inspections of dairies and cowsheds were recorded whilst 5 premises were improved as a result of action by the Department.

The sampling of milk was again actively continued during the year and the following figures give the results of the samples taken during 1949 and the three previous years:—

The sampling of milk carried out during the past four years has had very valuable results—the chief of which has been to emphasise, to the milk distributors, the advantages of supplying Pasteurised, Tuberculin Tested or Heat Treated milk as against

purveying raw milk. During October, through the courtesy of the milk dealers, statistics were obtained relative to the types of milk sold in the Borough and, at that date, it was most pleasing to find that no raw milk, except Tuberculin Tested, was being retailed. The daily gallonage, at that time, was as follows:—

Since these figures were obtained, it is interesting to note that only one sample (out of 28 taken) has proved unsatisfactory—a record which suggests a considerable improvement in the quality of milk sold in the town.

During 1949, two new pasteurisation plants were licensed by the Corporation and one new bottling licence, in respect of Tuberculin Tested Milk, was granted. Owing to the amalgamation of two businesses, one somewhat unsatisfactory dairy was closed down and the whole concern transferred to the more satisfactory premises of the new owner.

Up to October 1st, the four pasteurisation plants operating in the area were kept under constant supervision and 62 samples of pasteurised milk, taken from these premises, all proved satisfactory.

Although one is bound to deplore the loss of the Corporation's powers regarding some aspects of milk production and control, one can say generally that tremendous strides have been made during the last few years towards ensuring, for the people of this town a safe and clean milk supply.

In accordance with the wishes of the Public Health Committee, the active supervision of dairies and the distribution of milk is being continued and the sampling of milk will still play a large part in our activities in this connection.

### MEAT AND FOOD INSPECTION.

During 1949 all animals intended for human food in Banbury and district were slaughtered at the Ministry of Food's Centralised Slaughterhouse in Swan Close Road, Banbury. As in previous years, I am able to record amicable working between your officers and the Ministry's officials there.

An increase in the number of animals slaughtered occurred as compared with 1948—the figures for the two years being 9934 (1949) and 8065 (1948). In every case, the carcase and offal was inspected before it reached the public and 123 carcasses and

all organs were entirely condemned whilst 3223 parts of carcasses were rejected as being unfit for human food.

The total weight of meat and offal found to be unfit during 1949 was approximately  $27\frac{1}{2}$  tons as compared with  $24\frac{1}{2}$  tons for the previous year.

The following table shows the animals killed and the weight of unsound meat for the last few years :—

These figures reflect, I think, the increased efficiency of the Corporation's meat inspection service and, possibly, a deterioration in the quality of some of the animals being slaughtered.

In addition to the above unsound meat, a considerable amount of tinned foods and other unsound foods were dealt with during the year—156 visits of inspection being recorded for this purpose.

Full details of the unsound meat and food dealt with are given in the Medical Officer of Health's annual report.

### FOOD PREMISES.

Efforts to raise the standard of food hygiene in the Borough again formed an important part of the duties of your Sanitary Inspectors during 1949. The campaign directed to this end, carried on during the three previous years, was energetically continued and I am very satisfied with the progress made in this very important work.

In addition to improving the structural condition of food premises generally, good progress has been made in ensuring constant supplies of hot water; the provision of washing basins and soap and towels in food shops and food premises generally, and it is again pleasing for me to record the excellent co-operation received from the food traders in the town in this work. The bakehouses, general food shops and food preparing premises, and the cafes and restaurants received special attention during the year and ten public houses were also dealt with during the period covered by this report.

The number of premises improved, following action by the Department, during the past four years is given below :—

Three mobile fried fish vans were introduced into the area during 1949 and, in each case, the vans were supervised and the provision of a proper food preparation room in connection with each van was insisted upon.

An application for a licence to boil hams in an unsatisfactory food room was refused by the Public Health Committee during the year and a case of exposure of unsound food (mouldy sausage rolls) was dealt with by the firm concerned being severely cautioned by the Committee.

### ICE CREAM.

A good deal of attention was given throughout the year to the supervision of premises used for the manufacture and sale of ice cream having in mind the requirements of the Food and Drugs Act, 1938, and the Ice Cream (Heat Treatment) Regulations. 138 inspections of ice cream premises were made during the period under review and 40 samples of ice cream were taken and submitted for examination. The results of these samples, together with the results of those taken during the two previous years are set out below :—

Of the 12 unsatisfactory samples, i.e., those coming within grades 3 and 4, 11 of the samples were taken from one large manufacturer who, it is pleasing to report, by the reconstruction of his premises and the installation of a new plant, was successful in overcoming his difficulties and in producing a satisfactory product before the end of the year. The remaining unsatisfactory sample (Grade 3) was the only unsatisfactory result produced by the manufacturer concerned and, in this case again, amendment to the plant resulted in a satisfactory standard being maintained subsequently.

Apart from these two cases, the product of 14 other manufacturers and retailers was sampled during the year with satisfactory results in each case.

During 1949, 8 persons were added to the Corporation's register of ice cream manufacturers and retailers—three of these registrations being due to the transfer of business to new proprietors.

## **REPORT OF THE INSPECTOR UNDER THE DISEASES OF ANIMAL ACTS FOR THE YEAR 1949.**

### **(1) Anthrax and Sheep Scab.**

No outbreaks of anthrax or sheep scab were reported during the year 1949.

### **(2) Swine Fever.**

No outbreak of swine fever was reported in pigs on premises within the Borough during the year 1949.

### **(3) Foot and Mouth Disease.**

No outbreaks of Foot and Mouth Disease occurred during the year in which the Borough was included.

### **(4) Movement of Swine.**

The number of licences issued during the year, authorising the movement of swine from the Cattle Market to private premises was 1,615, involving the movement of 8,834 animals. No contraventions of the Movement of Swine Regulations took place.

### **(5) Importation of Animals.**

One licence was received during the year authorising the movement of 17 Irish cattle from the landing place to the Cattle Market. These cattle were re-licensed to private premises.

### **(6) Sheep Dipping.**

The number of Sheep dipped in the Borough during the year was 1,017 (First Dipping 590, Second Dipping 427). In addition, 407 Kent Sheep and Lambs were licensed to the Cattle Market for sale, all of which had been previously double-dipped, and the Inspectors of the districts to which these sheep were removed were notified and particulars of the dipping given.

### **(7) Transit of Animals—Cleansing and Disinfection of Vehicles.**

During the year 1949, 3,804 vehicles used for the conveyance of animals were cleansed and disinfected, an average weekly number of 73, for a 52 weeks period. The comparative figures for 1948 being 3,380, with an average of 65 weekly.
