

investigation for any local source of poliution proved negative and subsequent bacteriological examinations were cathefactory. As this water from the Lincolnshire limestone is very similar to that of a heighbouring bore-hole in Stamford, which also showed a temporary contamination at about the same time, it was desumed that the contamination originated at some distance.

nater is chlorinated at source; no other treatment is given.

70 - 70% of dwelling houses are supplied direct from public mains the remainder depend upon neighbouring standpipes. A surface well supplying is cottages

at Southorpe Terrace in the parish of Barneck was found to be heavily polluted by bacteriological examinstion. Cleaning and repairing of well produced unestisfactory results. Application has been made to the Ministry for permission to connect these houses to the main barnack supply.

The Villages of Thornhaugh and manaford have a piped supply obtained from a spring at Thornhaugh. nater has been satisfactory in quantity and quality. mater is chlorinated at source, no other treatment is given. 70% of dwelling houses are supplied direct from mains.
