My Lord, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health for the year 1959.

The general health of the District was good.

The live birth rate of 13.8 per thousand is a little below that of 1958 and below the national rate of 16.5 of the country as a whole.

There was one death in infants under one year of age, but no maternal deaths.

Once again the death rate is extremely low compared with the country as a whole. The rate for the District was 4.6 compared with 11.6 for England and Wales.

There were no epidemics of infectious diseases during the year. 8 cases of measles were notified and 3 scarlet fever. There were 3 new cases of Tuberculosis, all occurring on the R.A.F. Station at Wittering. Investigation follow-up of these cases is carried out by the R.A.F. Medical Authorities.

1958 and below the national rate of 11.8 of the country as a whole.

There was one death in infancy after one year of age, but no infant
deaths.

Once again the death rate is extremely low compared with the country
as a whole. The rate for the District was 4.4 compared with 11.5 for England
and Wales.

There were no epidemics of infectious diseases during the year.
A number of deaths were reported and 1 case of leprosy. There were 2 new
cases of tuberculosis, all reported on the 2 A.V. Station at Birmingham.
Investigation and follow-up of these cases is carried out by the A.V.
Medical Department.

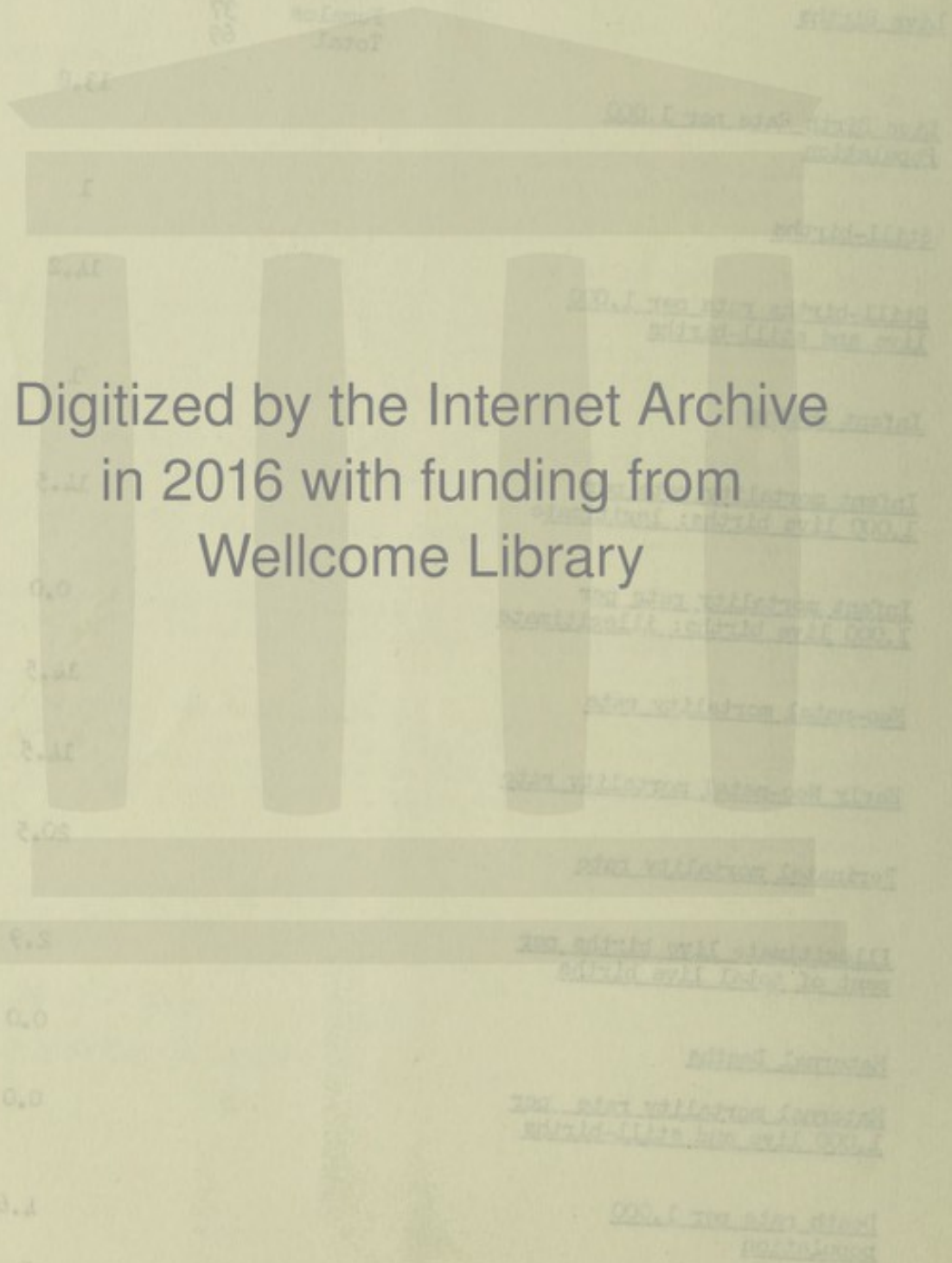

A further 10 water towers were reported to Council during the year and recommendations from the Council and the Council of Health were made that the Council were required to respect of 2 of them.

Following a report to Council, evidence was given before a Housing Inquiry on the 12th October, 1959 conducted by an Inspector appointed by the Ministry of Public Health (the Inspector) regarding the St. Martin's Street Housing Scheme. A Housing Order was subsequently confirmed by the Minister of Housing and Local Government.

14 houses were required during the year (14 last year) as a result of informal action.

IMPROVEMENTS

6 applications (involving 7 properties) for Miscellaneous Improvement Grants were approved during the year to the value of £2,300 one of which (£100) had not been provided with at the end of the year. A further 2 applications for Housing Improvement Grants were approved to the value of £220 (£155 cash).

HOUSING AND PUBLIC HEALTH ACTS

5 unfit houses were closed during the year, the tenants of 4 of the dwellings being rehoused by the Council. A further 10 unfit houses were reported to Council during the year and undertakings from the owners not to re-let without prior permission from the Council were received in respect of 9 of them.

Following a report to Council, evidence was given before a Housing Enquiry on the 13th October, 1959 conducted by an Inspector appointed by the Ministry on 3-16 Newtown (14 properties) comprising the St. Martin Without Newtown Clearance Area. A Clearance Order was subsequently confirmed by the Minister of Housing and Local Government.

34 houses were repaired during the year (14 last year) as a result of informal action.

IMPROVEMENT GRANTS

6 applications (involving 7 properties) for Discretionary Improvement Grants were approved during the year to the value of £2,305 one of which (£400) had not been proceeded with at the end of the year. A further 2 applications for Standard Improvement Grants were approved to the value of £310 (£155 each).

REVENUE AND FINANCE STATEMENTS

2 million houses were closed during the year, the balance of 4 of the houses being retained by the Council. A further 10 million houses were retained by Council during the year and substantial sums were not to be paid without prior permission from the Council were retained in respect of 3 of them.

Following a report to Council, evidence was given before a Housing Enquiry on the 15th October, 1932 conducted by an Inspector appointed by the Ministry on 1-10 houses (14 properties) comprising the St. Martin's Housing Scheme. A Housing Order was subsequently confirmed by the Minister of Housing and Local Government.

30 houses were repaired during the year (14 last year) as a result of informal action.

REVENUE STATEMENTS

6 applications (involving 7 properties) for Discretionary Improvement Grants were approved during the year to the value of £2,305 and of which (£1,400) had not been received at the end of the year. A further 2 applications for Standard Improvement Grants were approved to the value of £210 (£155 each).

FACTORIES AND WORKSHOPS

The number of factories registered during the year was 15 (14 last year), the majority being small one-man businesses.

Certain contraventions and offences under the Factory Acts are shown on the previous report, were rectified by the persons responsible.

MILK REGULATIONS

There are 5 Distributors of milk and two dealers in the District. The same number of supplementary licences (13) were again issued for the retail sale of designated milks (P.T. Sterilized and Pastuerised).

SHOPS ACT

The number of shops in the District is 12. Periodical inspections have been made and there is nothing exceptional to report except a further warning was given to one shopkeeper because of dirty premises.

The treatment involved approximately 220 visits. Various groups of people and certain lengths of public sewers were specially inspected and treated.

All complaints of rodent infestation received during the year were investigated and the necessary measures taken whenever necessary.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES AND DISINFECTION

3 cases only of Scarlet Fever were investigated during the year. No terminal disinfections of sick rooms were carried out.

DRAINAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL

(a) Pilsgate, Barnack, Bainton, Ufford.

Work on this long-awaited sewerage scheme commenced in April, the approximate cost, including sewage disposal and ancillary works at Bainton, being £90,000.

Free connections up to boundaries of properties to be drained was agreed in accordance with Council's policy.

(b) St. Martin Without and Wothorpe

A further burst on the pumping main from the Wothorpe Ejector Station near the railway bridge at St. Martin's was repaired.

(c) Wittering

At the early part of the year a new roadway giving a better gradient and access to the sewage disposal works was constructed at a cost of £172.

This roadway to some extent facilitated the removal of sewage sludge from this awkward site, but it was observed that once again the sludge drying beds failed to dry out sufficiently during the winter months.

However, experiments in sludge-straw composting carried out at these works inclines me to the view that this method of disposal of sludge may be the answer for this particular site.

It is gratifying to record that during the year, 3 samples of sewage effluent taken from the works proved to be entirely satisfactory, compared with the 3 unsatisfactory samples taken the previous year.

(d) General

The small sewerage disposal units taking discharges from groups of Council houses at Thornhaugh, Wansford, Pilsgate, Barnack and Ufford, continued to be maintained during the year and all settlement tanks were emptied periodically.

SCAVENGING

(a) Night-soil Collection

This collection was made weekly by direct labour from all parishes in the District and has again proved to be generally satisfactory.

(b) Refuse Collection and Disposal

This collection was made fortnightly by contract and has proved to be fairly satisfactory, although the Contractor has experienced difficulty in obtaining the necessary labour, with consequent occasional breakdown in the service.

WATER SUPPLY

(a) Wansford, Thornhaugh and Wittering

The water supply for these villages is derived from outcropping springs within a spring collecting area at Leicester Road, Thornhaugh. It comprises of a 20,000 gall. pumping sump and pumphouse, water being pumped through a 4" rising main to a 28,800 gall. elevated tank at Wittering with a branch connection to the 10,000 gall. tank at Thornhaugh.

HYPOSPONGE DISCHARGE AND DISTRIBUTION

3 cases only of Spontaneous Fever were investigated during the year. No terminal discharges of sick rooms were carried out.

SEWAGE AND SEWER SYSTEM

(a) General

Work on this long-continued sewerage scheme commenced in April, the approximate cost, including sewage disposal and sanitary works at Baiton, being £30,000.

Three connections up to boundaries of properties to be drained was agreed in accordance with Council's policy.

(b) Sanitary Works and Discharge

A further burst on the pumping main from the Woburn Station near the railway bridge at St. Martin's was repaired.

(c) Woburn

In the early part of the year a new roadway giving a better gradient and access to the sewage disposal works was constructed at a cost of £125.

This roadway to some extent facilitated the removal of sewage sludge from this district also, but it was observed that once again the sludge drying beds failed to dry out satisfactorily during the winter months.

However, experiments in sludge-drying composting carried out at these works indicated as to the view that this method of disposal of sludge may be the answer for this particular area.

It is gratifying to record that during the year, 3 samples of sewage effluent taken from the works proved to be entirely satisfactory, compared with the 3 months' history samples taken the previous year.

(d) General

The small sewerage disposal units taking discharges from groups of Council houses at Thornbury, Baiton, Pilsford, Baiton and Baiton, continued to be maintained during the year and all settlement tanks were applied periodically.

SEWAGE

(a) Woburn and Baiton

This collection was made weekly by direct labour from all premises in the district and has again proved to be generally satisfactory.

(b) Baiton Collection and Disposal

This collection was made fortnightly by contract and has proved to be fairly satisfactory, although the Contractor has experienced difficulty in obtaining the necessary labour, with consequent occasional friction in the service.

WATER SUPPLY

(a) Woburn, Thornbury and Baiton

The water supply for these villages is derived from outcropping springs within a spring collecting area at Baiton Road, Thornbury. It comprises of a 20,000 Gall. pumping pump and pump-house, water being pumped through a 4" water main to a 26,000 Gall. elevated tank at Woburn with a branch connection to the 10,000 Gall. tank at Thornbury.

A G.P.O. line connects the automatic transmitters between the pumphouse and the Wittering tank. This scheme has again worked well except that during the Summer, the supply at source was reduced and a rather prolonged electricity interruption in September necessitated my having to arrange for a few thousand gallons of water to be made available at Wittering by the Stamford Waterworks, from their Bonemill source.

During the year a total of 20,619,200 galls. were taken from the Thornhaugh source, 16,341,170 galls. being consumed at Wittering and 4,278,030 galls. at Thornhaugh and Wansford. A comparison of consumption figures with 1957-58 is given hereunder.

On the 17th January, by request, an augmentation supply was afforded to the R.A.F. Camp by utilising the subsidiary 3,000 gall. tank at Wittering, and at the end of the year, 5,803,000 galls. had been consumed by the R.A.F. authority, representing an additional income to the Water Account of over £700. This supply in the principal reason for the increase in the amount of water pumped from the Thornhaugh source and the amount consumed at Wittering during the year.

Certain alterations to the 4" distribution main and various services at Thornhaugh had to be carried out because of A.1 road improvements in the area.

(b) Barnack Water Supply

This supply involves the pumping of water from a deep bore in the Lincolnshire limestone by an electrical submersible pump to an elevated 15,000 gall. tank at Pilsgate and thence by gravity to the District.

This scheme has again worked well except for electricity failures during the year, which due to the inadequacy of storage at Pilsgate invariably affected the supply to the higher parts of the District.

As I have reported for many years past, the storage capacity for this area is totally inadequate and steps must be taken to give a storage capacity of at least 24 hour duration. This should be done before the completion of the Barnack and District Sewerage Scheme previously mentioned and to augment the Wittering supply due to further proposed development in that village.

During the year, a total of 11,619,000 galls. was consumed from this supply compared with 10,344,000 in the previous year.

Certain repairs were carried out to the hypochlorinator at Barnack pumphouse during the early part of the year.

(c) St. Martin Without and Wothorpe

Stamford Waterworks are the statutory undertakers for these parishes.

No prosecutions for any infringements of Building Byelaws were necessary.

As a matter of interest, during the year it was noticed that some roof timbers in dwellings being erected were infested with the Bark Boring Larvae (*Ernobius Mollis*). Instructions for the treatment and elimination of this condition were given to the architects and builders concerned.

COUNCIL HOUSES

The external painting of 56 houses was approved during the year. Minor repairs to Council Houses are carried out by Council workmen and other repairs and improvements by Building Contractors. At the end of the year, the scheme for the installation of modern types of solid fuel appliances in all pre-war Council Houses had been completed. Further renewals of galvanised hot water cylinders and parts of internal galvanised plumbing were made to replace those affected by eupro-solvent action. The Council approved a scheme whereby small prefabricated timber storage huts were provided, on application by tenants, at an extra rental of 1/9d. per week.

Once again, bursts occurred in out-buildings of Council Houses during the winter months, due principally to the failure of tenants to turn off the water supply and drain the systems in each out-building.

There is a complete lack of provision of garages or garage spaces for use by Council House tenants, resulting in unauthorised parking on Council Estate Roads and grass verges.
