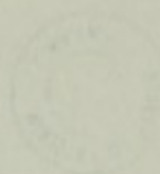

BARNACK RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL.

I took up my duties as Medical Officer of Health to the Barnack Rural District Council on April 1st, 1965, on my appointment as Assistant Medical Officer of Health to the Huntingdon and Peterborough County Council.

Prior to my appointment, Dr. George Nisbet, the County Medical Officer, had acted as District Medical Officer of Health since March, 1962. I should like to take this opportunity to express my thanks to Dr. Nisbet for his ever ready help and advice since my appointment.

Population:

The estimated population for mid-1965, according to the Registrar-General, was 6,400, an estimated increase of 250 on the previous year.

Statistics:

The live birth rate of 12.8 per 1,000 of the population is much lower than the rate for the previous year, which was 20.0, and is also lower than the rate for England and Wales as a whole, which was 18.1.

The infant mortality rate of 12.1 per 1,000 live births is also lower than the rate for the country as a whole, which was 19.0.

There were no stillbirths in 1965.

The death rate of 5.4 per 1,000 population is less than half that for England and Wales, which was 11.5.

Seven deaths were due to malignant disease; eight were due to coronary disease, and eight to vascular lesions of nervous system.

Conclusion:

As will be seen from the statistics presented, the health of the District was most satisfactory in 1965.

As a new-comer to the area, I have greatly valued the help given by my colleagues, the Clerk of the Council, by members of the Committees, by Mr. J. Dunford, and the clerical staff of the County Health Department, to all of whom I express my thanks.

A Plan was referred during the year for various conceptions of Building Schemes, one of these remains being the subject of subsequent litigation.

On the 1st April a new system was instituted relating to planning control in so much as all planning applications were first to be considered by the Council, any objections and recommendations being forwarded to the County Planning Officer. This increased the work of this Department.

During the latter part of the year further details were available of the new Building Regulations 1905 which came into operation from 1st February, 1906. By Assistant and I attended a Study Course at the end of the year dealing with the various provisions of these Regulations, the implementation of which will again cause additional work in the Department.

HOUSES IN MULTIPLE OCCUPATION.

In previous annual reports I have mentioned that one owner had still not carried out the essential work required by the Council on the advice of the County Fire Authority, under Section 16 of the Housing Act 1961, and confirmed on appeal by the County Court Judge. At the beginning of the year the owner submitted amended proposals to the Council which, if they were carried out, would go some way in complying with the provisions of the Act.

IMPROVEMENT GRANTS.

3 Applications for Discretionary Improvement Grants were approved for 3 dwellings to the value of £1172.0.0.

4 Applications for Standard Grants were approved to the value of £495.0.0.

FACTORIES AND WORKSHOPS

Factories registered during the year remain at 23, the majority being one-man businesses and building operations in respect of which Section 7 of the Act is enforced by the Council. Periodic inspections were made and once again there is nothing special to report.

SHOPS ACTS.

The number of shops registered was 15. The standard of hygiene was again found to be generally satisfactory.

FOOD HYGIENE REGULATIONS AND REGISTERED FOOD PREMISES.

There was no change in the number of registrations (11) during the year. All ice cream retailed in the district was sold in pre-packed containers. There is nothing special to report under this heading.

SLAUGHTER HOUSES AND KNACKERS YARDS.

No such premises in the district.

RAG FLOCK ACT.

No such premises in the District.

ANIMAL BOARDING ESTABLISHMENTS ACT, 1963.

There is one registered in the district, and this establishment complies with the provisions of the Act.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

There were the usual notifications of measles and whooping cough. 3 cases of scarlet fever were notified which were of a mild nature and no terminal disinfection was carried out.

The two notifications for Tuberculosis related to a son, aged 4, of a serviceman, and the wife of a serving airman at the R.A.F. Wittering, who were both removed to hospital, subsequent disinfection of premises being carried out by the R.A.F. Authority.

OFFICES, SHOPS AND RAILWAY PREMISES ACT, 1963.

Further inspections were made under this Act, and a few minor infringements were rectified through informal action.

REVISION OF DRAINAGE BY FORTH ACT.

For some years past a part-time Robert Operator has been engaged in connection with the adjoining authorities, but in March the Robert Operator died. Following a meeting with the other authorities the Council decided to put out of this combined scheme due to the increased cost of operating the scheme with a full-time Robert Operator.

After considering proposals from Fort Control Contractors, the Council decided to carry out Robert work from the existing labour force. 2 of your workmen attended a Robert Operator course at Huddersfield, and during the remainder of the year 20 premises were inspected immediately on completion and the necessary treatment given to all domestic premises free of charge.

During the year under review, I was once again able to arrange for the systematic inspection and testing of all sewers within the district, and I am happy to report that the incidence of infiltration in sewers and treatment works is virtually non-existent.

Very little work could be undertaken on farm premises.

INDUSTRIAL AND DOMESTIC DRAINAGE.

a) Industrial, Domestic, Farm and Village.

These premises discharge after pumping to a sewage treatment works at Telford Road, Huddersfield, with a final effluent discharge in summer months to the River Wharfe and in winter months to the nearby stream when the flow of water therein gives sufficient dilution.

b) St. Lawrence Mill and Workshop.

The drainage from these two premises is pumped into the Huddersfield Borough's Sewerage System. A new compressor at a cost of £25,000 had to be installed in the St. Lawrence Station, and as workshop a new cable had to be installed due to the existing cable being torn out after an electrical storm.

c) Widdowson.

The system of drainage/effluent pumping again worked extremely well. About 10 tons of effluent was supplied free of charge by a local farmer, and in return he received free of charge approximately 100 tons of drainage/effluent.

Despite remedial treatment carried out in the previous year, the infiltration of sub-soil water into the system still persisted.

During the year it was apparent that the existing works would be inadequate for further air Ministry development proposed in the village. At the end of the year a scheme was being prepared to keep most of the existing plant and install a new sewage treatment plant and machinery.

d) Widdowson.

The small sewage treatment works taking the drainage from small groups of small houses at Telford and Widdowson were again maintained during the year. These works are deteriorating but during the year a scheme was prepared for submission to the Ministry for the removal of these villages which would include for an "outpost" sewage plant at Widdowson with further grass plot treatment.

e) Southorpe

This is the only parish where a proper sewerage scheme is not envisaged as it is a small straggling hamlet where the installation of main drainage would be comparatively costly. It is not favoured by the County Planning Authority for any development except selective infilling.

Towards the end of the year the Council asked their Consulting Engineers to give a report on the possibilities of a sewerage scheme for this area.

9 samples of sewage effluents were taken as follows with results as shown:-

During the year your Technical Assistant and I were able to see various treatment plants of proprietary design in another rural area, and we both attended maintenance courses of Sewage Treatment works sponsored by the Association of the Rural District Councils Surveyors.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL.

Once again the weekly scheme of refuse collection instigated in 1960 worked extremely well despite minor breakdowns of the vehicle and periodical shortages of labour. Hardly any complaints were received from ratepayers, who again took the regularity of this service for granted.

During the year the sale of paper salvage amounted to £13.0.0., most of which (£10.12.0) was repaid as bonus to the workmen.

Many repairs, some of a substantial nature had to be carried out to the vehicle during the year, and in addition, it was repainted at a cost of £85.0.0. Due to the ever increasing cost of repairs, and after demonstrations had been arranged, the Council agreed to order a new vehicle for delivery in the following year.

COUNCIL DEPOT.

Negotiations took place in the latter part of the year for the acquisition of land adjoining the Depot at Wittering for a new Depot Building.

Many repairs, some of a substantial nature had to be carried out to the vehicles during the year, and in addition, it was reported as a cost of £25,000 for the year including cost of repairs, maintenance and depreciation had been forecasted. The Council agreed to order a new vehicle for delivery in the following year.

General Notes.

Negotiations took place in the latter part of the year for the acquisition of land adjoining the depot at Abingdon for a new depot building.

WATER SAMPLES.

Numerous samples from the public supplies in the area were taken at regular intervals by the South Lincolnshire Water Board. The Bonemills supply was found to be unsatisfactory, and on investigation the drainage system of the nearby cottage was found to be defective, and this was immediately rectified by the Board. Subsequent water samples proved to be satisfactory.

6 further samples were taken for bacteriological examination from two properties, a village well and a spring supply serving a new garage. The village well and the spring supply were found to be completely unsatisfactory, and notices were fixed stating that the water was unfit for drinking purposes.

COUNCIL HOUSE MAINTENANCE.

Minor repairs are carried out by Council workmen and other repairs by local building contractors.

Once again some electric coppers were provided to replace obsolete brick coppers. The work of improving 6 council houses in Wittering was completed at a cost of £1766. 12. 0. and similar work for a further number of council houses was commenced during the year.

30 parlour grates in the 1919 type of house at Barnack, Ashton and Ufford were installed at a cost of £766. 7. 6.

Unauthorized parking on grass verges and unauthorized vehicular accesses to some council houses made the construction of garages and hard standings more urgent on various council estates, and these were provided at a site in Wittering and 2 sites at Barnack.

During the year, land was acquired on which a block of 6 garages would be erected adjoining the Wittering flats, and the provision of an access road and hard standings at Wansford was investigated.

The external painting of 60 council houses together with the internal and external decoration of the Council Offices were approved during the year.

Some burst pipes occurred in council houses during the winter months, mainly because some tenants again failed to take sensible and adequate precautions.

NEW COUNCIL HOUSE BUILDING

The 6 houses at Orchard Road, Barnack, and the 3 bungalows at Wansford, delayed last year by the Ministry's reluctance to allow the drainage discharge of the 3 bungalows into the existing sewage treatment plant at Wansford, were commenced in December, 1964, and were completed in August (Wansford Bungalows) and December (Barnack Houses). The Barnack scheme also catered for the improvement of the existing carriageway to a standard required by the County Council.

During the year a scheme was prepared for the development of the Orchard enclosure of Orchard Road, Barnack. Subsequently it was decided that the old Hostel site at Barnack should be developed in preference to the Orchard enclosure, as the latter site was suspect due to the occasional spring out-crop.

At the end of the year the Hostel which had previously been let at a nominal rental to the Director of Excavations, Welland Valley Research Committee, was being vacated, plans and specifications having been prepared for the development of this site.

The Council's proposals for the erection of a council hall for

elderly people at Wittering was further pursued and plans prepared and estimates obtained. This was subsequently deferred due to the possibility of a road re-alignment scheme required by the Air Ministry which would perhaps affect this site.

Land belonging to the Council (extension of Boxer Road, Wittering) was fenced off at a cost of £129. 3. 0.

It was decided not to proceed for the time being with the building of bungalows at Ufford.

CARAVAN SITES.

There are no authorized caravan sites in the area. A caravan was authorized for temporary accommodation for a farm worker and another caravan was moved after informal action had been taken.

CIVIC HOUSE AMENDING SCHEME 1965.

During the year details of the Council Flat Development at Towns End Close, Wittering, and at Allington Close, Bainton, were submitted to the County Council for consideration under this scheme of which the City Architect of Norwich was appointed Assessor.

B.P. EXPLORATION CO. LTD.

As a result of trial bore holes taken in the area in the previous year which proved to be promising, this Exploration Company decided that further drilling at a greater depth would take place at Wittering.

HOUSING AND PUBLIC HEALTH ACTS.

An undertaking was received from the owner of an unfit cottage that it would not be relet without Council's approval, the tenant being rehoused by the Council.

There are now approximately some 30 properties only in the area which require demolition or closure action.

Approximately 30 houses were repaired during the year, generally by informal action.

CIVIL DEFENCE STAFF COLLEGE.

In October I was selected to attend a Health Inspector's Course at this College, as a result of which I was able to appreciate the modern day role being played by the Civil Defence generally.
