My Lord, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting the Annual Report on the health and sanitary conditions of the District for the year ending 31st December 1971.

The mid-year population was estimated by the Registrar General to have been 6710 a decrease of 770 over the previous year.

There were 177 live births during the year and the crude birth rate was 26.4 per 1,000 of the population. This is a high rate as compared with 16 which is the rate for England and Wales and is due to there being many young married people living in the area.

There were 2 illegitimate live births, which means that approximately 1% of the births were illegitimate. Nationally 8% were illegitimate.

One infant death occurred during the year and this was during the first week of its life. There were no still-births.

There were 35 deaths during the year 21 males and 14 females. The crude death rate was 5.2 per 1,000 of the population, but when adjusted to allow for our young population it became 11.6 per 1,000 which is exactly the same as the rate for England and Wales.

I have pleasure in presenting the Annual Report on the health and sanitary conditions of the District for the year ending 31st December 1974.

The mid-year population was estimated by the Registrar General to have been 6710 a decrease of 710 over the previous year.

There were 177 live births during the year and the crude birth rate was 26.4 per 1,000 of the population. This is a high rate as compared with the rate for England and Wales and is due to there being many young married people living in the area.

There were 1 illegitimate live births, which means that approximately 1% of the births were illegitimate. Nationally 3% were illegitimate.

One infant death occurred during the year and this was during the first week of the life. There were no still-births.

There were 15 deaths during the year 13 males and 2 females. The crude death rate was 2.2 per 1,000 of the population. This was adjusted to allow for our young population it became 11.5 per 1,000 which is exactly the same as the rate for England and Wales.



There was one new case of Pulmonary Tuberculosis notified during the year, but there were no deaths from tuberculosis either pulmonary or non pulmonary.

Little infectious disease was notified to me during the period, the relevant table follows these notes.

I wish to express my thanks to the members of the Council and their Officers and Staff for all the help which they have given me during the year.

IMPROVEMENT GRANTS

2 applications for Discretionary Grant were approved for 2 units, to the value of £2,000.

6 applications for Standard Grants involving 9 dwellings were approved to the value of £3,120.

R&G FLOCK ACT

No such premises in the District.



ANIMAL BOARDING ESTABLISHMENTS ACT, 1963.

There are 2 such establishments registered in the District and both comply with the provisions of the Act.

PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS ACT, 1949

A free service of disinfection which is available for any domestic property affected is still not fully realised by rate-payers in the District. Industrial and trade premises can also be inspected and treated, either by Council labour on a re-chargeable basis, or by specialised firms.

Free treatment of domestic premises was given on 68 occasions, such treatment being carried out in some cases on the day following date of complaint. Once again very little work of inspection and treatment was given to farm premises and local farmers are advised to employ specialist firms for this work. It was again proved that mice were resistant to the popular Warfarin treatment and I had to resort to the use of zinc phosphide and alpha-chloralose.

I was able again during the year under review to arrange for inspection of manholes and treatment of any lengths of infested public sewers, together with disinfection as necessary of the various sewage treatment works.

SLAUGHTERHOUSES AND KNACKERS YARDS

No such premises in the District.

POULTRY PROCESSING PREMISES

There is one establishment in the District. About 2,200 turkeys were killed and plucked in the period middle of October to Christmas, about 100 being slaughtered each day for approximately a 3 day week.

Once again sick birds (approximately 3%) were culled out and disposed of by incineration.

FOOD HYGIENE REGULATIONS AND REGISTERED FOOD PREMISES.

There are 17 registered premises. All ice cream retailed in the district was sold in pre-packed containers.

During the year certain contraventions were found in a Butcher's van, but on this occasion as it was a first offence, no legal action was taken except for a strong warning to the firm concerned.

OFFICES, SHOPS AND RAILWAY PREMISES ACT.

21 premises were registered under the Act and there is nothing special to report regarding inspections made.

SHOPS ACTS

The number of shops registered was 15, the standard of hygiene being generally satisfactory.

FACTORIES AND WORKSHOPS

The number of factories registered was 22 the majority being one-man businesses and building operations in respect of which section 7 of the Act is enforced by the Council (see Appendix 1).



## INFECTIOUS DISEASES

Of the 3 cases of scarlet fever, and one of pulmonary T.B. no terminal disinfections were necessary, the latter case being an R.A.F. service man treated by the R.A.F. Authority.

A further case of bacillary dysentery occurred in a boy whose father was serving in the R.A.F. and here again the case was treated by the R.A.F. Authority.

## DRAINAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL.

(a) Pilsgate, Barnack, Bainton and Ufford. These Parishes discharge after pumping, to a Sewage Treatment Works at Tallington Road, Bainton, with the final effluent discharging to the River Welland in Summer months, and to the nearby stream in Winter months when the flow of water therein gives sufficient dilution.

It was again obvious during the year that the sewage treatment works at Tallington Road, were overloaded by approximately 25%.

A letter was received in August from the Welland and Nene River Authority advising the Council that representation had been made to the County Planning Authority to discourage any new development proposals in the area drained into Bainton Treatment Works, until the samples of effluents complied with the prescribed conditions.

At the end of the year the Council's Consulting Engineers were still considering ways and means of remedial methods to be adopted.

(b) St. Martins Without, and Wothorpe. The drainage from these 2 Parishes is pumped into the Stamford Borough's Sewerage System. During the year further correspondence took place with British Rail regarding the disused railway bridge over the River Welland, and at the end of the year the matter was still under consideration.

A new replacement starter mechanism was provided at the Wothorpe Ejecter Station.

(c) Wittering. This sewage treatment works incorporates comminutors, settlement tanks, primary and secondary tanks, surface aerating tanks with tertiary treatment in the form of upward flow clarifiers with novel features such as a system of sludge straw composting (primary sludge) and disposal of final activated sludge over adjoining land through a rain gun irrigation system.

In April the screw pump used for the continuous re-circulation of activated sludge vital to the process broke down. There was a delay in obtaining replacement bearings from Holland but when these were obtained the pump was quickly repaired by a local engineer.

The efficiency of this particular scheme depends to a large extent on a plentiful supply of straw being available which was provided by a local farmer, the Council paying for the cost of baling.

(d) Wansford and Thornhaugh. This scheme incorporates 2 ejecter stations, 2 lengths of pumping mains with gravity sewers, the final effluent being pumped to an "Oxigest" unit with tertiary grass plot treatment in an area on the Peterborough Road.

As reported in my last annual report people are unaware that this prominent site encloses a sewage treatment works, either because of landscaping and the planting of trees or because they speed by in their vehicles, or perhaps because the site is generally free of malodour which unfortunately is usually associated with sewage treatment processes.



The troubles mentioned in my last annual report with magnetic clutches of the electric motors in the pumphouse had still not been resolved and at the end of the year the Consulting Engineers were considering an improved system.

Septicity again occurred in certain lengths of sewers, but this was soon remedied by operating an automatic flushing tank at the head of the system in Thornhaugh.

(e) Southorpe. This is a small and straggling hamlet where the installation of mains drainage would be very expensive and uneconomical. This area is not favoured by the County Planning Authority for any development other than selective infilling, and it is extremely unlikely that a sewerage scheme will be planned in the foreseeable future.

(f) Samples. 10 samples of sewage effluent were taken during the year with the following results.

(g) General. Children are still gaining access into sewage treatment works despite warning notices being fixed in prominent positions. At each station the danger potential of a fatality is considerable, and from time to time the co-operation of the Police is sought so that they may discourage these offenders especially during weekends and school holidays.

#### REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL.

Once again the weekly scheme of refuse collection (inaugurated in 1960) worked well despite some mechanical breakdowns and holidays. One 18-24 cu.yd. refuse vehicle and 2 men, assisted by a 3rd man on one day each week, are able to manage this service despite increasing numbers of properties in the area. This is due mainly to a basic and simple incentive bonus system agreed with the operators. Such a system is possible in such a repetitive job.

The refuse is disposed of by controlled tipping on a tip on the Kingscliffe Road, Wansford, operated by the Stamford Borough Council. The annual rent of £65 p.a. was increased to £150 by Stamford Corporation from the 1st October, 1971, with a further increase to £300 from the 1st October, 1972.

All domestic refuse is collected but this does not include builders rubble and garden refuse and any bulky domestic refuse is generally removed on Saturday mornings (free of charge) necessitating overtime by your workmen. During the year another workman was trained for the HGV test and was successful in June.

Various repairs were carried out to the vehicle during the year including new pressure pipes, starter motor, tyres, clutch and centre plate, 2 new batteries etc. The body and cab were also externally painted during the year.

At the request of the R.A.F. Authority some 40 new litter receptacles were provided and fixed at various points on the R.A.F. Housing Estates.

Under the Civic Amenities Act, 8 abandoned vehicles were disposed of during the year.

#### WATER SAMPLES.

Only a few isolated properties are still not served by water mains. There are no stand pipes within the district.

Samples from the public supplies in the area are taken at regular intervals by the South Lincs. Water Board.



#### WATER SAMPLES (continued).

17 samples of well water serving a bungalow at Thornhaugh were taken for bacteriological examination; 2 proved to be satisfactory, and 15 unsatisfactory, and the owner of the property was asked to install a suitable chlorinator.

#### SWIMMING POOLS

19 samples of water were taken from swimming pools as shown:-

Barnack School - 3 satisfactory - 1 unsatisfactory - total 4.

Private Swimming Pool (used by some members of the public) 14 satisfactory, - 1 unsatisfactory, - total 15.

#### HOUSING CAPITAL SCHEMES

There was no building programme in operation, but during the year it was decided to build 14 units at Wittering and 2 at Pilsgate, and a local firm of Architects was instructed accordingly.

#### COUNCIL HOUSE MAINTENANCE

Minor repairs are carried out by Council workmen, and other repairs by local building contractors. The painting of 72 houses was approved during the year, and the scheme inaugurated last year in replacing combination ranges in Council houses with a new tiled surround and back boiler continued.

At the beginning of the year the Department of the Environment had agreed to the Council's proposals for the modernisation of a quaint cottage in Barnack. This renovation scheme commenced during the year at a contract figure of £3,270.

#### CARAVAN SITES AND CONTROL ACT, 1960.

There are no approved sites in the area.

#### BURGHLEY HORSE TRIALS

These trials were held from the 2nd - 5th September. This necessitated a period of additional work before and during the event in matters relating to sanitary accommodation, and clean food regulations, etc. In addition the safety of stands was checked under County Council Byelaws.

#### STAFF

Mr. A. Ashworth, Technical Assistant, resigned his appointment at the end of July, after  $3\frac{1}{2}$  years service with the Council. Mr. R. Brown was appointed in his place on the 15th September.

#### LOCAL GOVERNMENT MANAGEMENT COURSE

In September I attended a residential course at Keele University dealing with "Problems of People at Work".
