HEALTH SERVICES ACT.

Two trained Nurses (also qualified in Midwifery) are provided by arrangement with the Lincolnshire Nursing Association for Midwifery and General District Work in the area.

HEALTH SERVICES ETC. CONTD.

The Lindsey County Council has a Maternity and Child Welfare Centre, a School Clinic, a Tuberculosis Clinic and Clinic V.D. at its premises at No. 50, Holydyke.

Maternity Homes provided by the County Council at Scunthorpe and Cleethorpes.

The Local Council have now procured an Ambulance which is available for the residents of Barton and the surrounding districts.

There is no hospital in the Urban District, but a scheme has been submitted for a small hospital and health centre.

Accommodation for Infectious diseases is provided by the Lindsey C.C. at Brumby and elsewhere. Cases of Smallpox are segregated in a hospital in the parish of Osgodby.

Pathological and bacteriological examinations are carried out at Lincoln.

WATER SUPPLY.

The Water Supply from the Waterworks is good, and about 76% of the houses in the Town are connected with the mains. The rest of the houses are supplied by pumps and wells which yield good water.

SANITARY ADMINISTRATION.

The Council at present, for the emergency only employs 1 full-time Surveyor and Sanitary Inspector, and one part-time Medical Officer.

The water-carriage system for disposal of excreta is being extended, and 46 Conversions have taken place during the year.

The removal of nightsoil and ashes is carried out weekly.

A Mortuary is provided and post-mortem examinations can be efficiently carried out in it.

It will be noted from the Sanitary Inspector's Report that most of the work in connection with the repair and improvement of Dwelling-Houses has been done without the serving of Formal notices.
