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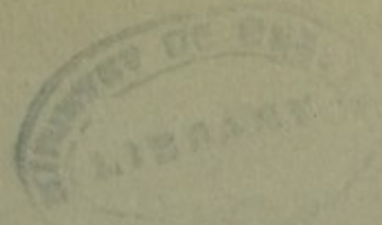

ANNUAL REPORT

To the Rural District Council of Basford.

MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present to you my twelfth Annual Report on the sanitary circumstances, health and vital statistics of your District throughout the year 1947.

The Report is again an Ordinary Report, and is written in conformity with the suggestions contained in the Ministry of Health Circular No. 170/47, dated 31st December, 1947, dealing with Annual Reports. Owing to the prevailing conditions the report has been abbreviated. The essential statistics necessary for maintaining continuity of records have been preserved.

The year 1947 is a memorable year in the experience and annals of this Rural District.

The year opened mildly and continued so until the last week in January when the weather became colder and more wintry. By the end of the month the most severe spell of arctic weather within living memory had commenced and during the next six weeks new meteorological records in the severity of cold and the depth of snow were set up. The frost continued unbroken and unrelenting and it snowed almost daily until in the aggregate five feet of snow had fallen. Snow drifts between fifteen and twenty feet deep were common and villages were cut off and isolated. Bull-dozers, snowploughs and other mechanical contrivances were in constant use in an endeavour to keep clear and maintain a road for traffic to free the isolated. For four weeks the mercury never rose above freezing point and during one night 28 degrees of frost were recorded. The hardship of so severe a winter was increased by the breakdown of the transport system causing a shortage of coal, the electricity cuts, the reduction of the gas pressure and the monotony of a rationed diet seriously deficient in fats.

In the middle of March the thaw came and rapidly released the frozen waters so that the rivers, streams and ditches, were unable to carry away the rush of water and flooding occurred to a hitherto unknown depth and extent. A record of the parishes affected is contained in this report. The Council, through the agency of the Health Department staff, took steps to alleviate the distress and assist the victims of this disaster. Following an uncertain spring the summer became the finest recorded for 100 years. Days of unbroken sunshine followed each other from mid-July until the beginning of October. The pastures were burned and the milk yield fell off. Springs dried up for the first time in living memory and many wells failed. The harvest was gathered in record time but the potato yield was so poor that the Government had to introduce potato rationing. The rainfall in the autumn was below normal and, consequently, it was necessary

to cart water to the parishes of Costock and Willoughby-on-the-Wolds which were hardest hit by the drought.

1947, the year of the great "freeze-up," the national flood disaster, the brilliant summer, the deficiency of the autumn rains, the failure of the potato crop and for the first time in our history "Potato rationing," will be remembered for the excellence of the health of the inhabitants which was due in no small way to the foundations upon which the health services had been built in previous years. The Birth Rate of 20.54 per 1,000 was only exceeded by the rate for 1944 which was the highest recorded since 1921. The Infantile Mortality Rate of 29.63 per 1,000 births was the lowest ever recorded in the history of this district and the general Death Rate of 11.11 per 1,000 of the population was below the Death Rate for England and Wales. The Basford Sanatorium admitted 47 cases of Infectious diseases from the District which was the smallest number admitted for many years. During the year in other fields steady progress was maintained particularly is this noteworthy in Housing in spite of the lack of materials although the labour position was improving. In all, 100 houses were completed and of these 36 were built by the Council. These figures indicate the substantial progress which will be made in 1948 as a result of the careful planning and progressive policy adopted. A continuance of the restrictions on the permitted amount of repairs hindered the work of reconditioning old and unfit property. During the year it was a constant disappointment that it was not possible to obtain ministerial permission to commence some of the Drainage and Water Supply schemes which have been in abeyance for too many years. These great public health works are urgently required. Surely, official sanction cannot be withheld much longer.

I desire to thank my colleagues in the other departments for their advice and expert opinion which has proved so valuable during the year, and to the Council for its ever ready assistance and untiring interest in the work of the Health Department. To all the members of the Public Health Staff I record and tender my gratitude.

I am indebted to Dr. A. C. Tibbits, County Medical Officer of Health, Mr. J. J. G. Ellis, Engineer, Surveyor and Housing Architect, and Mr. G. T. Belton, Rating and Valuation Officer, for information and assistance in compiling the statistics in the preparation of this report.

These ambulances are supplemented by the ambulances of the Colliery Companies which are reserved for the transport of victims of Colliery accidents. Poor Law Cases are removed in the Poor Law Ambulances of the Nottinghamshire County Council.

Insulin.

Under the provisions of Section 177 of the Public Health Act, 1936, and the Ministry of Health Circular 2634 of 1943, 12,000 units of Insulin were supplied free of charge to a diabetic person resident in your district.

Nursing in the Home.

The general nursing of the sick in their houses is undertaken by district nurses provided by voluntary organisations. This Council does not pay or subsidise these nurses or associations. These nurses do not undertake the home nursing of notifiable infectious disease as provision for the treatment of these cases has been made at the Infectious Diseases Hospital of this Council.

Hospitals.

The facilities in the District remain the same as in 1946. Facilities are offered at your own Infectious Hospital for the isolation and treatment of all cases of scarlet fever, diphtheria and enteric fever occurring in the District, and agreements exist with most of the surrounding Districts for the reception of cases of these diseases, when accommodation is available.

One hundred and ten cases were admitted into your Infectious Hospital during 1947, as compared with 125 last year, and 218, 223, 245, 237 and 318 in the preceding five years. These were made up as follows:—

There are 39 parishes in the District and of these, 8 parishes, viz., Costock, Kingston-on-Soar, Ratcliffe-on-Soar, Rempstone, West Leake, Wysall, Thorpe-in-the-Glebe and Willoughby-on-the-Wolds, have not a main water supply and depend entirely upon shallow wells. At Costock, Rempstone and Willoughby-on-the-Wolds, the water supply is most inadequate and at Wysall, although water is abundant, some of the wells are contaminated. In all 870 houses are dependent on wells.

In the parishes with a piped water supply the Nottingham Corporation supplies 26 parishes. Loughborough Corporation supplies 4 parishes, and the remaining parish is supplied in part by the Nottingham Corporation and private water suppliers. In all of these parishes the water supply was adequate in quantity and satisfactory in quality throughout the year. There are 12,592 houses supplied with piped water supply and except for the 213 houses supplied by stand-pipes all have water supplied by a tap over the sink. The following table shows the distribution throughout the District of the houses supplied by stand-pipes.

The eight parishes which have not piped water supplies have been included in the Nottingham Corporation Act, 1938, and the Minister of Health has approved a scheme for these parishes with the exception of Willoughby-on-the-Wolds.

There have been no extensions to mains or other water supplies during the year.

Flooding of Houses.

During the month of March, 1947, a rapid and abnormal rise in the level of the Rivers Erewash, Soar and Trent, resulted in widespread floods in the Parishes through which these rivers normally flow. The extent of the involvement of houses, farms, schools and roads was as follows:—

Disinfectant, soap and coal were distributed to the affected houses. Where necessary, the tenants were advised to boil all water used for household purposes.

Sewerage and Sewage Disposal.

The two following sewer extensions were completed during the year :—

Approx. 250 yds, 6" sewer together with all necessary manholes, etc. at Plain Spot, Selston.

Approx. 1,750 yds, 9" sewer together with all necessary manholes, etc. at Gotham Lane, East Leake.

Rivers and Streams.

The Nottinghamshire County Council carry out the duties under the Rivers, Prevention of Pollution Acts, and for this purpose retain the services of a special Rivers Inspector.

All the sewers in the District were tested, and those found to be infested received two maintenance treatments in accordance with the requirements of the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries. 71 dead rats were recovered with an estimated kill of 231.

Public Cleansing and Salvage.

This work is carried out with the Council's own staff with nine low-loading refuse collection vehicles, each vehicle being properly constructed and adequately covered for its purpose.

One 30 cwt. lorry is used and did work for other Departments on Sewage Works, Shortwood Camp, carting water, etc., Depots are situated at Selston, Nuthall and Ruddington. In November, 1947, premises were purchased at Kimberley to house all the vehicles north of the Trent which are now garaged at Selston and Nuthall.

Dustbin trucks are supplied to each vehicle in the colliery districts, the workmen still preferring to shoulder the bins in the residential and agricultural areas.

Most of the District is now having a weekly collection of refuse and this will be extended to all the Council's area as soon as labour is available.

Seventy eight infected premises were disinfected and disinfectants were supplied to infected households. In co-operation with the School Medical Service of the Nottinghamshire County Council, the contacts of school age were rigidly excluded.

Food Poisoning.

During the year 21 cases were notified. All were investigated. All presented the same symptom of abdominal colic, profuse diarrhoea and prostration. In 17 cases it was established that the illness was caused by eating pig's chitterlings purchased in Nottingham. The Medical Officer of Health of Nottingham and his Staff co-operated actively in tracing the source and preventing further spread. In the other four cases no source of infection was definitely established. No children were involved and there were no fatalities.

Scarlet Fever.

Forty-two cases were notified during the year, as compared with 76, 162, 215, 90 and 55 in the five years immediately preceding.

Pneumonia.

Twenty-one cases of Pneumonia were notified during the year, as compared with 16, 18, 32, 47 and 48 in the preceding five years.

Seventeen deaths were due to this cause; the corresponding figures for the preceding years being 13, 13, 13, 25 and 17.

Cerebro-Spinal-Meningitis.

Six cases were notified during the year.

Acute Polio-Myelitis.

Seven cases of this disease were notified during the year, three of which proved not to be Acute Polio-Myelitis. Two cases proved fatal, and two recovered.

Puerperal Pyrexia.

During the year no case of this disease was notified.

Ophthalmia Neonatorum.

Three cases of Ophthalmia Neonatorum were notified during the year.

Scabies.

All cases notified to the Health Department are visited and examined by your Medical Officer of Health, and given advice on disinfection and treatment with benzyl benzoate. Contacts are ascertained, followed up and brought under treatment. No difficulty was experienced in obtaining the co-operation of parents and patients. Arrangements have been made, if necessary, to carry out treatment at the Sanatorium.

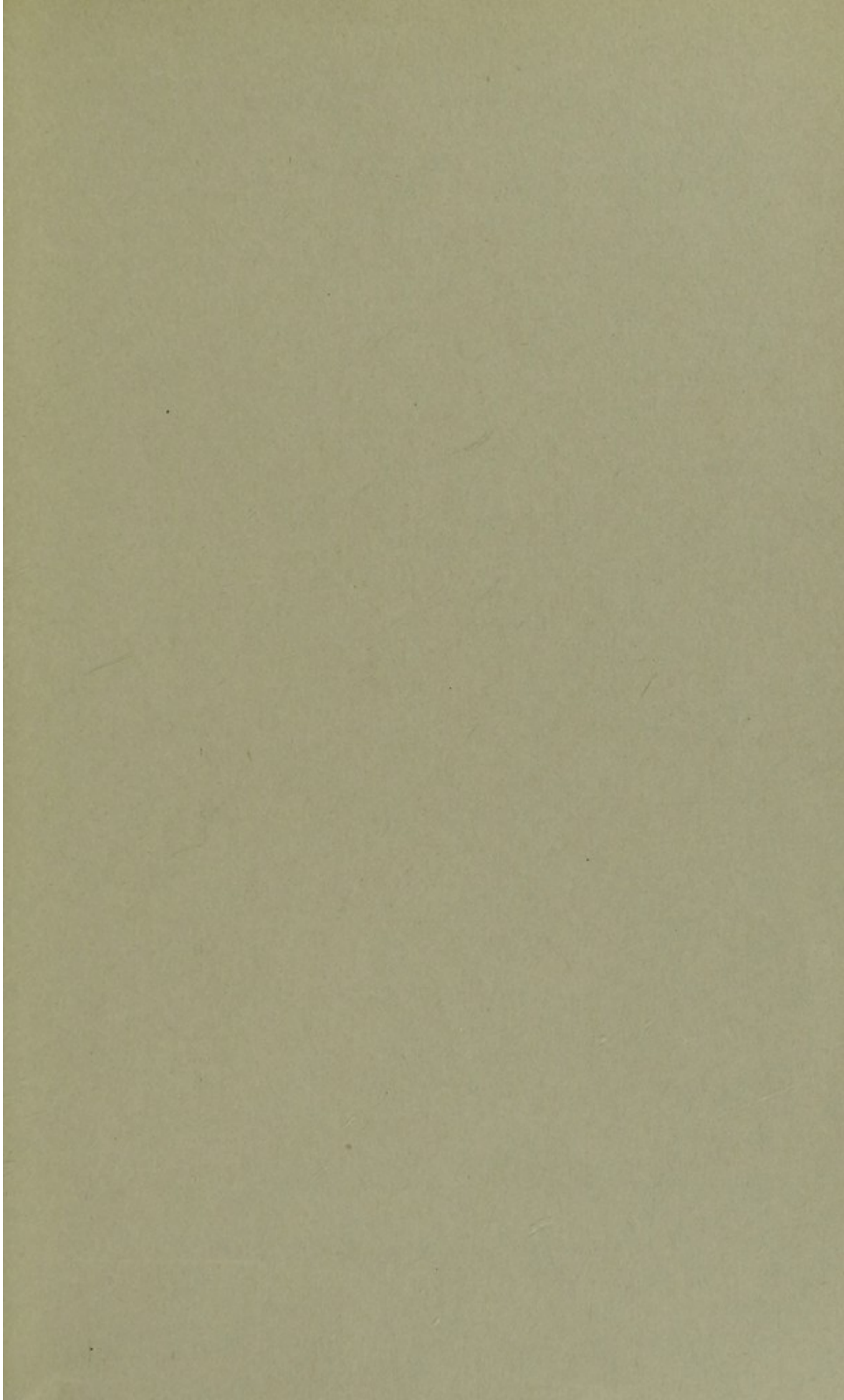
