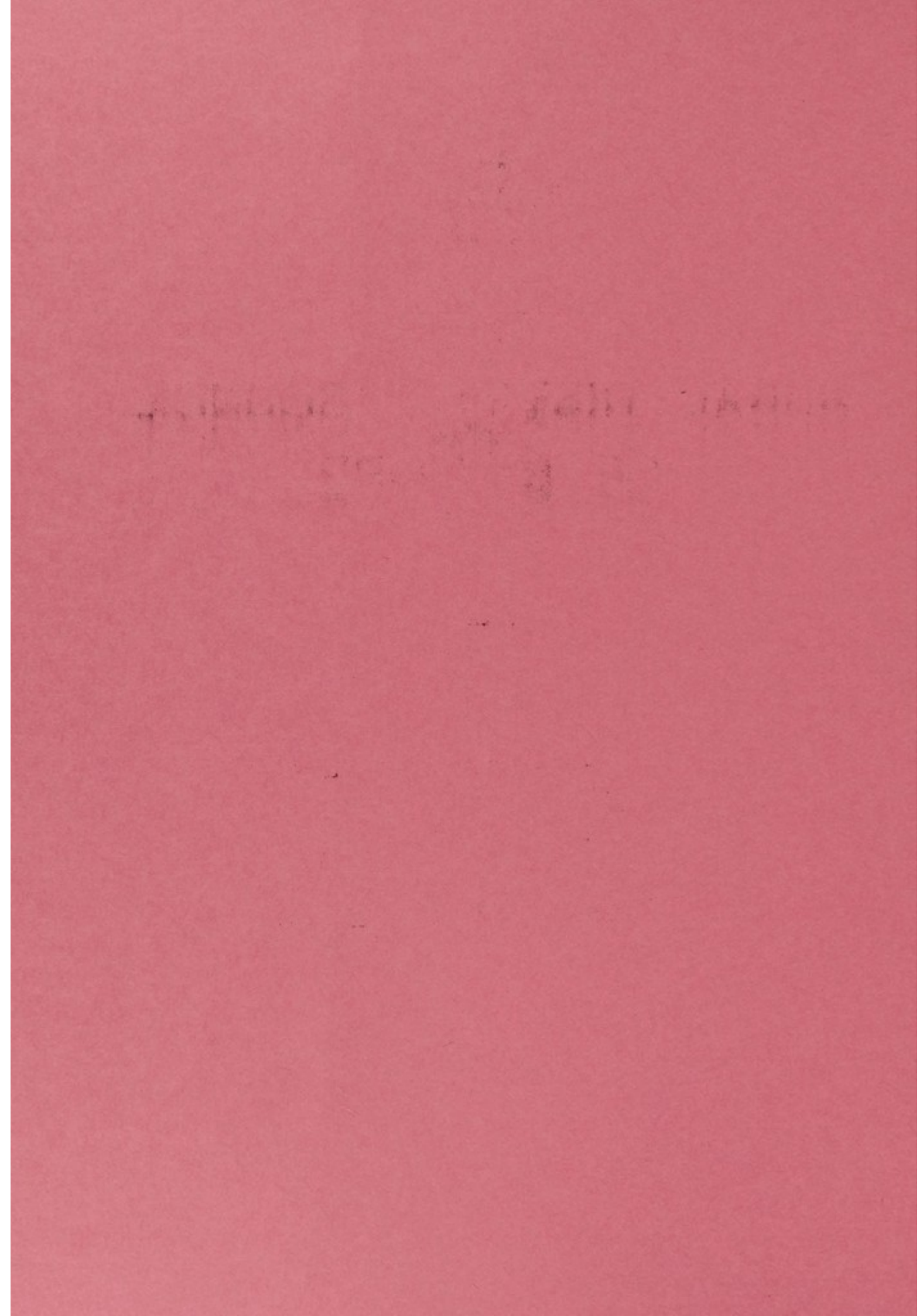

Report of the Medical Officer of Health

I present herewith the Annual Report on the health and environmental circumstances of the District, compiled in accordance with the requirements of the Department of Health.

The mid-year population again increased and was estimated by the Registrar General to be 71,050.

The Vital Statistics were satisfactory in relation to those for England and Wales.

The excess of Births over Deaths was 475: of the total births 4.3% were illegitimate compared with 7.04% in the administrative County and 8.4% for England and Wales.

In August, 1971 vaccinations against Smallpox ceased to be offered as a routine procedure in young children. This change of a long established policy was brought about as a result of the success of the World Health Organisation's Smallpox eradication programme throughout the world. It is now considered that the risk of an importation of the disease into this country is small and decreasing, and no longer justifies routine vaccination of the population with its consequent quota of complications.

A feature of particular significance in 1971 was the dramatic fall in the notifications of Measles. It can be claimed with increasing confidence that this is attributable to the programme of infant vaccination against Measles.

There is contained within this Annual Report an account of the important work carried out by the Health Inspectors in environmental health matters. I should like to commend the Chief Public Health Inspector and the District Inspectors for their conscientious and efficient work.

May I thank the Chairman and members of the committee for their understanding and the officers of the Council for their friendly assistance given at all times.

Report of the Chief Public Health Inspector

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

It is with pleasure that I submit for your consideration my sixteenth report as your Chief Public Health Inspector.

The year 1971, like its predecessors, was one of increasing duties and responsibilities, due mainly to the implementation of new legislation.

The rural area still proves an attraction for numerous itinerant caravanners and a great deal of time was spent on complaints from local residents.

It is obvious that a proper permanent site is necessary to which these people could be directed.

The publicity and contacts achieved by the use of the Department of the Environment's Mobile Information Office, together with talks to certain Parish Councils from the staff of this Department, has resulted in a great increase in Improvement Grant Applications, which it is anticipated will build up still further in the ensuing year.

Another Improvement Area at Awsworth was initiated which will result in not only more modernised properties, but also a better environment to enjoy these amenities.

Complaints received regarding the sale of unsound foods from shops on investigation nearly all result from bad rotation of stock. Different food packages have different date codes and the time seems to be fast approaching when an easily decipherable code should be readily visible to the purchaser on all pre-wrapped foods.

In conclusion, I must express my thanks to the Chairman and Members for their continued confidence and support and to the staff of the Department my appreciation of their loyalty and enthusiasm under difficult conditions without which the many duties could not have been successfully concluded.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA

AMBULANCE SERVICES (National Health Service Act, 1946, Section 27)

The Nottinghamshire County Council are responsible for the Ambulance Services for the whole administrative County Area. The service is free and all urgent calls for the accident, sudden illness or maternity are answered without question. Non-urgent calls, such as for routine hospital attendance, are only accepted if supported by a recommendation from a doctor, nurse, Midwife, dentist or other responsible person.

PREVENTION OF ILLNESS, CARE AND AFTER-CARE (National Health Service Act, 1946, Section 28)

Facilities are provided by the Nottinghamshire County Council, as the Local Health Authority under Part III of the Act, for the prevention of illness, care and after-care.

NOTTINGHAMSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL ACT, 1951

Part VII Establishments for Massage or Special Treatment

Part VII of this Act came into force on the 5th February, 1952 in the Basford Rural District and the Powers and duties applicable to this section have been delegated to the Rural District Council of Basford.

B.C.G. VACCINATION OF SCHOOLCHILDREN

Vaccination against Tuberculosis is carried out by the Medical Officer of Health. All schoolchildren of 11 years of age and over are eligible.

The procedure consists of a preliminary skin test to find out those children who would benefit from the protection which B.C.G. vaccination confers. These children are known as the negative reactors to the test. Those who have a positive reaction are not vaccinated but are referred for a full chest X-Ray, and are subsequently kept under review.

The B.C.G. procedure is thus of two-fold value. It enables those who have not been in contact with the Tuberculosis germ to be vaccinated and so protected for the future, whereas the children who have already been in contact with the germ can be examined by X-Ray and kept under supervision.

Dustbins

The Council sells dustbins to private householders and by the end of March, 1962 £1499 had been received.

One Statutory Notice under the Public Health Act, 1936, Section 75 was served on owners to provide dustbins and one was complied with during the year.

Refuse Collection

This work is carried out by the Council's staff in all parishes in the District. The latest additions to the Council's fleet are fitted with special cabs for the loaders, mechanical and gravity packing for long hauls, and diesel engined for economy. These vehicles are provided with screens and are loaded at the rear to ensure practically dustless filling.

The Council has Depots at Underwood, Kimberley and Ruddington.

Refuse Disposal

During the year, refuse was disposed of by controlled tipping on the undermentioned tips:-

Rear of Cleansing Depot, Kimberley
Gypsy Lane, East Leake
Main Road, Jacksdale

The Council has three tractors which are used solely on the tips for levelling and soiling over.

It is becoming increasingly difficult to obtain new tipping sites.

CESSPOOLS

The Council will remove two loads of 750 gallons each free of charge per year from private cesspools in the District and subsequent loads on request at the rate of £1 per load or part load. During the year ended 31st March, 1972 £1,836 was received for charges. Three cesspool emptying vehicles of maximum capacity of 750 gallons each are used on this service.

There are approximately 2,000 private houses and 150 Council houses in the district with cesspool drainage and 130 Council houses drained to small sewage works and emptied by the Council's vehicles.

CLOSET CONVERSIONS - Public Health Act, 1936, Section 47

The Council has resolved to provide an incentive to those owners who had not yet made conversions, by offering to pay one half of the expenses reasonably incurred, subject to the submission of an estimate and the final account for inspection. As a result of this resolution, four grants totalling £555.50 were made in respect of four conversions.

The recommended standard is that, over a six monthly period, 50 per cent. of a vendor's samples should fall into Grade I, 80 per cent. into Grades I or II, not more than 20 per cent. into Grade III and none into Grade IV.

Condemned Foodstuffs (other than fresh meat)

During 1971 various foodstuffs were condemned and surrendered as being unfit for human consumption, mainly due to the breakdown of refrigerators.

SLAUGHTER AND MEAT INSPECTION

During 1971 the Council's Health Inspectors maintained a 100 per cent. meat inspection service. This has involved visiting the slaughterhouses in the early mornings and in the evenings outside normal office hours and also on Saturdays and Sundays.

All cases of alleged overcrowding, brought to the notice of the Department, are investigated and where overcrowding of a house is confirmed, a report of the circumstances is sent to the Council's Housing Officer. Many cases investigated are not overcrowded as defined in Part IV of the Housing Act, 1957, although they are "socially overcrowded."

WATER

Mains water supply is provided for most of the Parishes of the Rural District by the City of Nottingham Water Department. The North West Leicestershire Water Board has taken over the supply previously afforded by the Loughborough Corporation Water Department and now supplies four parishes in the southern part of the Rural District's area. Leicester Corporation supplies the Parish of Willoughby on the Wolds.

Regular inspections were made of the two water supply systems in the Parish of Newstead and of other sources of water, such as shallow wells and springs, where these are used for domestic supplies. Bacteriological examination of these sources of supply were made and appropriate action was taken when an unsatisfactory result was obtained (see Table below.)

There are three houses in the Rural District without a piped water supply.
