2... MEAT AND OTHER FOODS

1,053 visits have been made to the Slaughterhouse and other Food Premises during the year, and 8,307 carcases have been inspected. In all, 5 tons. 5 cwts. 13¼ lbs. of food have been condemned as unfit for human consumption. This weight does not include canned and packeted foods. During the year visits were made to certain Food Premises and special attention was directed to washing facilities, sanitary accommodation and general cleanliness. As a result many improvements were effected, especially with regard to the provision of hot water.



4...COMPLAINTS

350 Complaints have been received and dealt with.

5...RODENT CONTROL

The duties in connection with Rodent Control are carried out by the Additional Sanitary Inspector (part-time) and 1 Rodent Operative, under the supervision of the Senior Sanitary Inspector. During the year 127 complaints were received and 2,138 visits made in connection with baiting and poisoning at Rat and Mouse infested premises; 2 maintenance treatments of Sewers were also carried out during the year, with satisfactory results. 2,081 poisoned baits were laid (including 108 in Sewers), with 127 complete takes, and 1,342 partial takes; therefore it can be assumed that considerable numbers of Rats and Mice were destroyed. Whilst it is not possible to effect the complete eradication of Rats and Mice, it is by continued visits to infested premises, &c. with subsequent baiting and poisoning, that their increase can be checked. Treatment of business and commercial premises is chargeable, the inclusive charge locally being at the rate of 5/- per hour, with a minimum of 5/-, whilst private dwellings are treated free of cost.




