The Town was again fortunate in having only a small amount of Infectious Disease.

The Polio-myelitis cases were moderately severe in character. The Scarlet Fever oases were mild and were treated at home. The virtual disappearance of Diphtheria, to which the immunisation Campaign has presumably contributed, and the greatly reduced seriousness of Scarlet Fever, are noteworthy and not entirely explicable features of today.

The rather high number of Tuberculosis notifications in recent years is largely the result of mass radiography.

2. ICE CREAM

During the year 18 Samples of Ice Cream were submitted for analysis, with the following results:-

The three Samples falling into Grade 4 are considered most unsatisfactory, but it is pleasing to report that following contact with the Producers concerned, the Grades were eventually raised to Grade 1.



3. MEAT AND OTHER FOODS

1,357 visits have been made to the Slaughterhouse and other Food Premises during the year, and 12,446 carcases have been inspected. In all, 7 tons 15 cwts. 2 qrs. 22 lbs. of food have been condemned as unfit for human consumption. This weight does not include canned and packeted foods. Much time has again been given to the inspection of Food Premises. During the year the Council adopted Byelaws made under Section 15 of the Food and Drugs Act, 1938 for securing the observance of sanitary and cleanly conditions and Practices in connection with the Handling, Wrapping and Delivery of Food and Sale of Food in the Open Air. A water supply, complete with tap, has been provided to the rear of the Town Hall for the use of Stallholders in the

5. COMPLAINTS

364 Complaints have been received and dealt with.

6. RODENT CONTROL

During the year 155 complaints were received and 2,200 visits made in connection with baiting and poisoning at Rat and Mouse infested premises; maintenance treatment of Sewers was also carried out with satisfactory results. 3,228 poisoned baits were laid, with 645 complete takes, and 962 partial takes; therefore it can be assumed that considerable numbers of Rats and Mice were destroyed. From the number of complaints received and the results of subsequent treatment carried out, Rodent Control does still appear to be a necessary and valuable service of the Public Health Department.
