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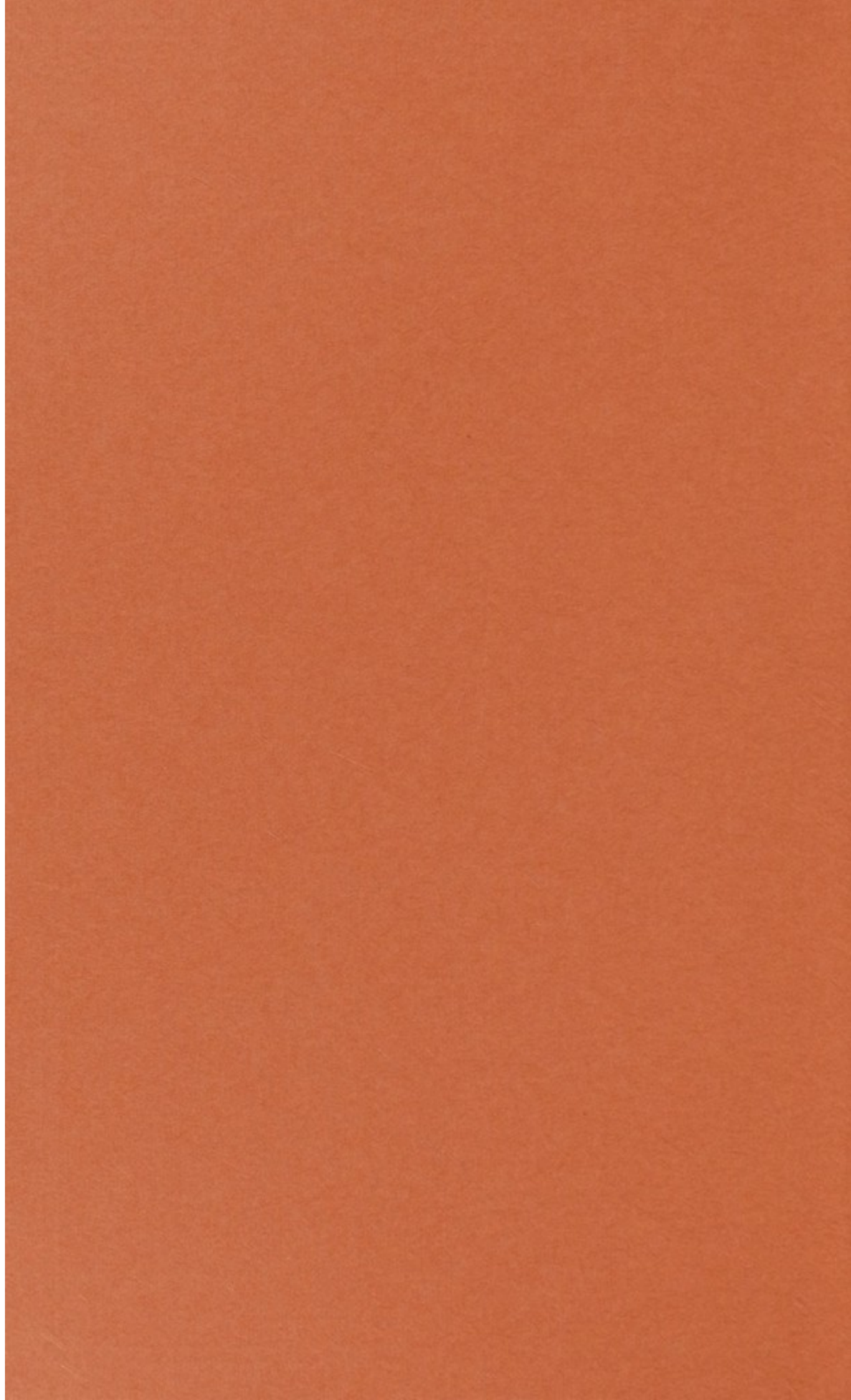

YOUR WORSHIP, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I have much pleasure in presenting my Annual Report on the health of your Borough for the year 1970.

Vital Statistics

For the third successive year, the number of registered births exceeded one thousand. The figure of 1,090 was the highest ever recorded for the Borough. The birthrate per 1,000 population rose from 23.4 in 1969 to 24.6.

The annual increase in population as reported by the Registrar General in his mid-year estimate was only 730. An administrative error in the requested returns was discovered too late in the year to allow his figure to be rectified.

The annual end of year estimate of population undertaken by the Public Health Department was 52,020. In view of the preliminary findings of the Census reported four months later, this figure must be considered a true picture of the population increase.

The age pattern of confined mothers followed the pattern started during the previous year.

The mortality pattern does not highlight any specific problem which differs from the national picture. As in the previous year, 64% of all deaths occurred in the over 65's. Diseases of the heart and circulation accounted for nearly 50% of all deaths.

The young age of the population is reflected in the uncorrected death rate for the Borough being 7.6 per thousand, 4.1 less than the average for England and Wales.

Social and Environmental Circumstances

Although there has been some disagreement on the need to vaccinate whole communities against Influenza, it is generally conceded that certain groups of the population, e.g., the elderly, should be offered this protection.

Through the very good offices of the Basingstoke Old People's Welfare Committee and the co-operation of the Local General Practitioners and Hampshire Executive Council, teams of Nurses visited five Old People's Centres during one week in October. Over 1,000 persons were vaccinated. The procedure was such an administrative

success, due in the main to the voluntary assistance that was forthcoming, that it is now possible to organise this campaign each year.

A matter of disturbing importance occurred during the year when a report was received that a number of open metal containers were unearthed during excavations for road development. Investigations showed the canisters to contain deposits of cyanide buried some years ago by a factory and in an area situated near to the town water supply.

It was apparent that a hazardous situation had arisen and immediate contact was made with the Police, Government Departments, County Council, the Water Board and other public utilities.

Immediate steps were taken to test the soil in the vicinity of the Water Board's Pumping Station and four-hourly checks were instituted by the Water Board on the town water supply. Samples were also taken from a nearby water course. It is apparent that no traces of cyanide were found in any of the water samples taken by the Water Board and only small traces of cyanide were found in the water course samples which were submitted to the laboratory at the Water Pollution Control Works. Discussions with the Department of Health and Social Security, Ministry of Housing and Local Government and the Hampshire County Council resulted in all the contaminated soil (some 4,000 cubic yards) being removed to a site for safe disposal.

Once again it is a pleasure to pay tribute to the help I have received from the Public Health Inspectorate and the Administrative Staff of my Department. This, with the understanding of the General Purposes Committee and the co-operation of the General Practitioners and Voluntary Services in the town, not only lightens my task, but makes its execution much more pleasant.

For the first time the location of children of Borough resident mothers born outside the Borough, are now sub-divided into Mini Hospital, Royal Hampshire County Hospital and Other.

Ninety five per cent of all 1st births and ninety seven per cent of 5th and over births occurred in hospital. When the location of all births are considered, it is noted that at least eighty nine per cent of births took place in hospital.

This Annual Report will be the last one to cover a complete year of the activities of the Mobile Mass X-ray. A diminishing incidence of Tuberculosis is one of the main reasons for this decision.

Routine X-raying of factories has already ceased and in future return visits will only be undertaken if there has been discovered an active case of Pulmonary Tuberculosis and it is considered impracticable to X-ray the contacts in the Hospital Department. The X-raying of doctors' referrals and Chest Clinic contacts will be undertaken by the Hospital.

Considerable investigations were undertaken to find a suitable tip site for the final ash from the incinerator and other items which cannot be dealt with at this plant.

Public Water Supply

The sources supplying the Borough are all underground in the chalk formation. All are subject to treatment, and frequent and regular examination has shown that the processes are continually effective in producing a water suitable for public supply purposes. During 1970 no restrictions were imposed regarding quantity.

Samples of raw and treated waters are examined bacteriologically weekly. The number of bacteriological examinations applicable to the Borough (although not solely) are as follows:

Service Reservoirs are also examined, and taps in distribution, and lengths of new main are subject to chlorination and bacteriological examination, before being passed for supply purposes.

The raw waters are virtually constant in composition, but chemical analyses are undertaken regularly, with full mineral examination at selected intervals.

HEALTH EDUCATION

(1) Food Hygiene

A further course of lectures leading to the Royal Institute of Public Health and Hygiene's "Certificate in Food Handling" was given at the Technical College. Members of the Department were also asked to give individual talks to interested organisations.

Numerous requests for instruction in this field were received from various organisations. The Department dealt with these through visits undertaken by the Public Health Inspectorate.

(2) Home Safety

Home Safety Education is being continued within the Borough and it would appear that more people are becoming aware of the dangers in their homes.

During the past year 11 lectures have been given to Women's Organisations and 3 courses of instructions with examinations have been given to Youth Organisations.

In an effort to cut down the accidents to children, Home Safety Instruction has been given to 20 Tufty Groups for children under 5 years of age, and projects have been undertaken at some schools.

In 1972 it is planned to hold safety weeks on Fire Prevention and Home Safety.

Food Complaints

The Department dealt with 60 complaints made by members of the public concerning the sale of food. Each complaint received a full investigation, including interviews with retailers, wholesalers and manufacturers. In some instances the offending foods were referred to the Public Analyst or the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food Laboratories at Reading for further detailed examination and identification purposes. The results of this procedure have been found to be of great assistance in deciding the appropriate action which should be taken.

Legal Proceeding in connection with offences under the Food and Drugs Act 1955

A manufacturer was fined £25 0s. 0d. with £4 14s. 0d. costs for selling a pork chipolata sausage containing a piece of foreign matter.

A food retailer was fined £20 for selling a meat pie which was mouldy.

A manufacturer was fined £100 for selling two meat pies which were mouldy.

A food retailer was fined £25 for selling a piece of meat containing maggots.

Food Hygiene Regulations 1960

A food retailer was fined £400 with £25 costs for having unclean premises.

Milk

Two samples of Ice Lollies were taken and showed a pH reading less than 4.5.

I am grateful to Mr. J. S. Preston, Chief Sampling Officer for the Hampshire County Council, for the following information relating to Food and Drugs Sampling during the year 1969/70.

"During the year ended 31st March, 1970, the samples procured under the Food and Drugs Act, 1955, included 129 within the Borough of Basingstoke.

Milk Samples

32 samples of milk, including three of "Channel Islands", were obtained; all being satisfactory.

Miscellaneous Samples

97 samples of other articles were procured, three, which were related to consumer complaints, being the subject of adverse reports, as follows:

A wrapped loaf of bread was seriously affected by mould growth and was clearly old stock at the time of sale. The company responsible were not operating a code marking system but it was understood that following this incident such a system was introduced. Proceedings which were taken against the company resulted in a fine of £20 being imposed, together with an order for the payment of £15 4s.0d. costs.

Further proceedings were taken against a firm of potato crisp manufacturers concerning a packet of crisps in which a number of nylon threads were found. A fine of £20 was imposed, together with costs amounting to £14 3s. 0d.

A warning was issued in respect of liqueur chocolates which were badly out of condition, the chocolate cases having collapsed, with the result that the contents had largely evaporated. Inquiries of the packers showed the chocolates to be old stock which had been supplied out of rotation.

General

Attention was also given to the labelling and descriptions of food and drugs in connection with the Labelling of Food Order and the Pharmacy and Medicines Act. No matters of consequence occurred on this occasion."

Food Hygiene Regulations 1955

A total of 1,104 visits were made during the year to various food premises. Generally the standard of hygiene of premises was found to be satisfactory. 118 infringements of the Food Hygiene Regulations were found on inspection but these were of a minor character and were dealt with by informal action.

As will be seen, the standard of food hygiene in food shops is very high indeed. Intended occupiers being aware these days of early consultation with the Public Health Inspectors at plans stage, ensures that all necessary equipment, fittings and layout of the premises are in compliance with the Food Hygiene Regulations.

GENERAL INSPECTIONS

As a result of 867 complaints received and routine inspections, 120 notices (written and verbal) were served to remedy matters coming within the purview of the Public Health Department.

HOUSING ACTS 1957/1969

19 dwelling houses in which defects were found have been made fit as the result of informal action.

Improvement Grants

During the year the Council approved a total of 11 Standard and 12 Discretionary Improvement Grants.

Houses Outside Improvement Areas

One Statutory Notice was served on the owner of a property outside an Improvement Area.

Two properties which were the subject of a clearance area in 1969 were demolished this year.

Houses-in-Multiple-Occupation

18 inspections were made during the year of houses-in-multiple-occupation regarding excess number of persons resident and house defects.

Qualification Certificates

The Housing Act, 1969, provides for an owner of a property, who obtains a Qualification Certificate from the Local Authority that the premises are fit, may then apply to the Rent Officer for a revision of the rent paid.

LICENSING ACT, 1964

Five visits were made to premises requiring registration under this Act. The Borough Council are required to report mainly on the grounds of hygiene and public health as to the suitability of the premises but it was not necessary for any objection to be made to the Magistrates regarding any of the applications.

NOISE ABATEMENT ACT, 1960

The number of complaints under this heading showed an increase over the previous year. Of the 14 complaints made, four concerned noise from industrial premises, six as the result of barking dogs and two concerned noise from neighbours. The two remaining complaints concerned noise from club premises, and a bird scarer.

OFFICES, SHOPS AND RAILWAY PREMISES ACT, 1963

The number of premises registered under this Act at the end of the year totalled 451, of which 58 were new registrations. There were 284 visits made to these premises, including 171 general inspections, resulting in the finding of 168 defects. These mainly consisted of redecoration; improvements to lighting and ventilation; provision of washing facilities, First Aid equipment and thermometers; all were successfully dealt with by informal action.

Many matters under this Act are of a structural nature and as a result there is close co-operation with the Borough Surveyor's Department to ensure that plans submitted in connection with the building of all new shops and offices are examined by Officers of this Department to ensure compliance with the provisions of the Act.

The large developments being undertaken in the Borough have shown the desirability of co-ordinating meetings of Architects, Heating and Ventilation Engineers, Fire Authority and H.M. Inspector of Factories, together with the Council's own Officers. Meetings of this kind are proving very successful in that they provide an efficient and informative method of dealing at one time with all the legislative matter involved with major development schemes.

PEST CONTROL

General

366 complaints were received during 1970 and 2,089 visits (including surveys) were made to various premises, including dwelling houses, schools, agricultural and business premises.

In connection with rodent control, 2,051 poisoned baits were laid, resulting in 200 "complete takes" and 1,077 "part takes".

As in the previous years, a free service treatment was given to private dwellings but a nominal charge continued to be made for treatment to business premises.

The frequent inspections made in areas where major demolition is undertaken to identify as quickly as possible any rodent infestations has resulted in no serious outbreaks occurring.

Treatment of Sewers

Of the 58 manholes treated for test purposes only 4 showed evidence of an infestation.

Further treatment of the 4 infested manholes, together with adjoining manholes, was carried out and no further infestation discovered.

The Council continued their membership of the North Hants Pest Control Committee and your representatives attended all meetings held during the year.

Miscellaneous Infestations (other than vermin)

A total of 180 infestations under this heading, including 117 wasps nests, were dealt with during the year. In addition, 76 feral pigeons were trapped in the town centre. One roof space was fumigated for bats.

PET ANIMALS ACT, 1951

There are four premises licensed in accordance with this Act in the Borough. Two of these premises trade in a variety of pets; the remaining two trade in tropical fish only.

PETROLEUM (CONSOLIDATION) ACT, 1928

66 premises are licensed to store petroleum spirit and petroleum mixtures. 266 visits were made to these premises during the year to ensure compliance with the conditions of the licence with special regard to the safe storage and handling of these dangerous liquids. The total quantity of petroleum spirit and mixtures stored is 254,565 gallons.

THE GAME ACT, 1831

There are 6 premises from which persons are licensed to deal in game within the Borough.

Water Samples

3 samples of mains water were submitted to the Public Health Laboratory for bacteriological examination and three samples were submitted to the Public Analyst for chemical analysis and all were reported as satisfactory. In addition, five samples were submitted for bacteriological examination from private water supplies.

Swimming Pools

13 samples of water taken from the West Ham Swimming Pool were submitted for bacteriological examination. Six samples were

reported as containing a slight unsatisfactory bacterial content which was corrected, the remaining samples being reported as satisfactory.

16 samples of water taken from the Swimming Pool, Sports Centre, in the new Town Centre, were sent for bacteriological examination and all were reported as satisfactory.

In addition, 23 water samples were taken from other Swimming Pools in the Borough, 12 of which were reported as having an unsatisfactory bacterial count, the remaining samples being reported as satisfactory.
