I beg to present my report for the year 1937 :-

The District is entirely residential and agricultural, and the amount of unemployment is very small.

There were no deaths from Measles, one from Whooping Cough and none from Diarrhoea.

As usual, heart and arterial diseases provided the principle causes of death (42). Cancer caused 23 deaths, influenza 8, tuberculosis 3. There were 3 suicides and 6 other deaths due to violence.

B PUBLIC HEALTH OFFICERS OF THE COUNCIL.

(a) The Medical Officer of Health is also Assistant County Medical Officer, and Medical Officer of Health of the adjoining Rural District of Hartley Wintney. He does not engage in private practice.

(b) The Sanitary Inspector is a whole time officer. He holds the certificate of the Royal Sanitary Institute and Sanitary Inspectors' Joint Board, the Royal Sanitary Institute's certificate for Meat and Other Foods and Building Construction certificates.



SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

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(1) <u>Water</u>. The Mid-Wessex Water Company are beginning to extend their mains in the northern and eastern parts of the District. In time, their mains will cover the whole north eastern half of the District.

In the Parish of Basing, new houses on the Byfleet Estate are, in nearly all cases, supplied from Company's mains.

Analysis of water in Sherborne St.John show that serious pollution exists. The provision of an alternative supply is under consideration.

(2) <u>Sewers</u>. In view of the extension of the Water Company's mains in the Parish of Basing, and the fact that an alternative supply for the village of Sherborne St.John (probably by the Mid-Wessex Water Co.) has become necessary, the problem of sewage disposal in both these villages is bound to become acute sconer or later. Conditions in these two villages are very similar, and difficult on account of their low lying situation.

A firm of engineers are investigating the matter, and schemes of sewerage and sewage disposal are in course of preparation.

(3) <u>Scavenging</u>. The collection of indestructible house refuse is carried out in the Parishes of Basing, Newnham, Bramley, Sherfield, Wootton St.Lawrence, Sherborne St.John, North Waltham, Monk Sherborne, Mortimer West End, Stratfield Turgis, Pamber, Dummer and Steventon. The work is done by contract & the refuse is disposed of by controlled tipping. The scheme meets a real need & is appreciated by householders. The provision of proper dustbins is becoming general, although not yet unniversal.

Swimming Baths. There is one privately owned swimming bath, open to the public, at Basing. It is fed by the River Loddon, is open to the air, and the water is untreated.

<u>Schools</u>. The sanitary conditions and water supply of the schools in the area is for the most part satisfactory. My position as Assistant School Medical Officer facilitates dealing with outbreaks of infectious disease.

From the above figures it will be seen that the amount of infectious disease was considerably less than the average of recent years.

An epidemic of diphtheria at Park Prewett involved 13 female nurses and 6 female patients. One elderly female patient died from a superadded streptococcal infection. The source of infection was traced to a patient who was admitted 9 days before the first case occured, and proved to be a persistant carrier. Her condition was cured by tonsilectomy. Active immunisation was applied to all contacts.

Diphtheria Immunisation. During the year the number of infants who received treatment was 32; approximately 17% of the one-year old children.
