Diphtheria Immunisation was continued: 219 children under 5 years, and 59 between 5 and 14 years, received this treatment.

The amount of infectious Disease was about the average, though considerably more than in 1942: Scarlet Fever, mostly of a mild type, was prevalent in the Oakley district.

An outbreak of food poisoning occurred among the personnel of the Civil Defence Column at Steventon. Over 40 out of a strength of 200 were affected and were admitted to Park Prewett Hospital: the majority recovered in three or four days but a few were kept in for about a week. Investigation pointed to contamination of ham by a member of the Cookhouse staff and he was treated appropriatel;
