Water. It is estimated that 30% of the dwelling houses in the District are connected to a water main: standpipes are not numerous.

...

The Council are at present engaged on schemes for extensions which will make piped supplies available generally over the District.

Samples of the private piped supplies have given satisfactory results on analysis. The water of the Mid-Wessex Company has not been sampled in this District.

Sewerage. The increased provision and use of water creates the problem of sewage disposal. Sewers are needed in the more closely built up villages, especially Old Basing and Sherfield.
