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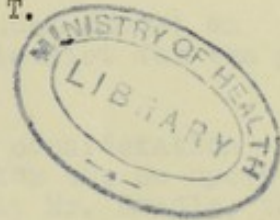

Note. Comparability Factor. This is worked out for each District by the Registrar General. Its object is to level out differences in the age and sex constitution of the populations of the various districts and its use enables us to obtain standardised birth and death rates which are more fairly comparable and more accurate than the crude rates.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

Water Supplies.

(a) There are three places in the District which are supplied with piped water by the Council, namely, Beaminster Town, Thorncombe Village, and Netherbury Village, while a Council scheme to supply Corscombe and Halstock is in progress of construction.

(b) The following places have private piped supplies which are mostly small schemes restricted in quantity; the greater parts of the parishes of Bettiscombe, Burstock, Chedington, East & West Chelborough, Evershot, Hooke, Mapperton, Melbury Osmond, Melbury Sampford, Netherbury (Melplash only), Pilsdon, South Perrott (small part), Powerstock (village and Nettlecombe) North Poorton, Rampisham, Seaborough, and Wraxall.

(c) The following parishes are mainly without piped supplies; Broadwindsor, Marshwood, Mosterton, Salway Ash, and Bowood (in the parish of Netherbury), South Perrott (greater part) West Milton (in the parish of Powerstock), Stoke Abbott.

As far back as 1944 reports were obtained and submitted to the Council from Geologists and from the Consulting Engineers on a Regional Water Supply Scheme, based principally on the Hooke springs. Negotiations with the owner of the springs for the purchase of part of the watercress beds have been in progress for a long time, but it was not until September, 1952, that the District Valuer reported that his negotiations had proved abortive. The Council after careful consideration, finally resolved in January, 1953 in favour of a Regional Scheme based on the Hooke river source and to approve in principle the making of a Compulsory Purchase Order for the acquisition of the land and water rights required at Hooke and to submit to the Ministry as soon as the details were prepared, (a) the Compulsory Purchase Order for confirmation, (b) the Regional Scheme outline as prepared by the Consulting Engineers with estimate of costs for approval in principle, (c) application for consent to loan to cover the total cost of the scheme, and (d) application for grant. It was also decided to open discussions with riparian interests on the river Hooke before a Local Enquiry is held.

Corscombe and Halstock Scheme.

The mass concrete reservoir was commenced in May, but two months later owing to the base being on greensand it was decided that the floor should be reinforced, that the site be moved a short distance and that the capacity be reduced from 150,000 to 85,000 gallons. The laying of mains commenced in July, and by the end of the year the 5" main had been laid through Corscombe Village and was continued as a 4" main to Halstock Village.

Netherbury Scheme.

The Ministry awarded 1st. February, 1953 as the starting date for the extension of the main to Whitecross.

Sewerage.

Beaminster and Netherbury.

Very little progress was made during the year regarding the site at Olenham Mill which the Council had approved and which they were prepared to purchase together with the Old Mill and adjoining cottage. In December, the Surveyor submitted drawings showing sections along the proposed line of outfall, sewers, sewage works, and effluent drain, and a copy of same had been forwarded to the Consulting Engineers for further consideration by them.

The Council decided that after Beaminster Town, sewerage schemes would be installed in the undermentioned Villages in the following priority - 2. Nettlescombe, 3. Netherbury, 4. Thorncombe, 5. Powerstock, 6. Halstock, 7. Evershot, 8. Melbury.

Public Cleansing.

All household refuse and salvage is collected weekly from Beaminster parish. In the remaining parishes, salvage and indestructible household refuse only, is collected monthly, the work being carried out with a 2/3 ton 28 H.P. lorry. Two men are employed in the collection. The refuse is tipped on the Council's dump a mile north of Beaminster Town. This dump is kept in a satisfactory condition.

There is no wide spread camping in the District. Licences were granted for a few single sites on which to keep a caravan.

Schools.

The 16 schools in the area have been inspected regularly, 9 have piped water supplies, 6 have wells, and 1 has no water on the premises. 5 have water closets and the rest bucket or vault closets. 34 samples of water were taken for analyses, 23 of these from well sources which are chlorinated. 2 samples were unsatisfactory. 14 schools have Tuberculin Tested Milk, 1 Pasteurised, and 1 Accredited. No school was permanently closed during the year.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

Meat Inspection.

All the slaughtering for West Dorset takes place at a Slaughter House situated in the Bridport Rural District. The Council shares the cost along with the other three West Dorset Authorities for the services of a Veterinary Surgeon who is responsible for the inspection of carcasses on every day that slaughtering takes place.

The 26 houses completed by the Local Authority during 1952 were sited as follows - Beaminster 12, Salway Ash 4, Melplash 2, Drimpton 4, South Perrott 4.

17 houses are in course of construction in the following places - Beaminster 11, Drimpton 6.

The 162 post war houses have been built in the following parishes - Beaminster 54 (Fairfield 32, Hogshill Mead 22) Broadwindsor 18 (Village 14, Drimpton 4,) Durstock 4, Evershot 4, Halstock 4, Marshwood 8, Melbury Osmond 4, Mosterton 6, Netherbury 28 (Village 4, North Bowood 2, Salway Ash 14, Melplash 8), South Perrott 4, Poortsock (West Milton) 4, Rampisham 4, Stoke Abbott 4, Thorncombe 16.

At the end of the year there were 164 applicants for housing accommodation in the district.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

There was no serious outbreak of Infectious Disease during the year. Measles notifications were the lowest since the disease became notifiable in 1940.

There were no cases of Food Poisoning.

Close co-operation was maintained between the Head Teacher, the School Nurse, and the Medical Officer of Health regarding the control of Infectious Disease. The following cases were notified from the schools:- Chicken Pox 21, German Measles 9, Measles 1, Mumps 41, Ringworm 4, Impetigo 12, Whooping Cough 4.

During the year, the Regional Hospital Board decided, after consulting the Local Authorities concerned, to use the West Dorset Isolation Hospital for Tuberculosis only, and as far as possible to admit West Dorset cases, while other notifiable cases requiring hospital treatment would be admitted to Weymouth Isolation Hospital.

Diphtheria Immunisation.

This is the responsibility of the County Council. When not performed by the child's own Doctor, immunisation is given at the schools and Child Welfare Centres; the following table shows the number of children who have been immunised up to 31.12.52.
