SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

Water Supplies.

Regional Water Supply - Hooke Springs. Beaminster Water Order 1955.

On 17th. February, the Council agreed to apply to the Minister of Housing and Local Government for an Order under the Water Acts 1945 and 1948 in respect of the proposals for the compulsory acquisition of 10.1 acres of land, and construction of works at Hooke, and the abstraction of 4,500,000 gallons of water per week from the River Hooke.

Bridport R. D. C .- Bulk Supply.

The Council were prepared to offer a bulk supply at the district boundary, subject to certain conditions, to the Bridport R.D.C. who had asked if this supply could be given when the Beaminster Regional Scheme was completed.

The rest of the year was occupied in preparation for the Public Enquiry on the Hooke Scheme.

Corscombe and Halstock Scheme.

The extension to Clarkham Cross was completed and was in service by 1/3/55, connections having been afforded to 21 out of the 22 potential consumers.

Beaminster - Netherbury Water Supply - Duplicate Main.

The Council in September, received tenders for the Head Works and Main-laying and submitted same to the Ministry for approval, and in November, the Ministry requested further information regarding the tenders and certain technical details. The Consulting Engineers were requested to discuss these with the Ministry.

Water Supplies in West Dorset.

At the end of the year, the Council were invited to send representatives to a meeting called by the Bridport R.D.C. and to which representatives from the other Local Authorities in West Dorset, The County Council, Ministry of Housing and Local Government, The Bridport Water Works Company and Lyme Regis Water Works Company were also invited. This meeting was suggested by the Ministry after meeting a deputation from the Bridport R.D.C. in connection with the proposed water supply scheme in the Bridport Rural District, and the object of the meeting was to discuss water supply schemes present and future in West Dorset and how best to co-ordinate these.

It is estimated that 2,800 persons or 34.2% of the population are served by public piped supplies, 2,816 persons or 34.4% by private piped supplies, and 2,570 persons or 31.4% depend on individual sources e.g. wells and springs.

Sewerage.

Beaminster and Netherbury Sewerage and Sewage Disposal Scheme.

In December, the Consultants reported that they had taken detail levels on the Clenham Mill site and also necessary samples of trade wastes for analyses and it was hoped that the design of the disposal works would soon be ready.

Thorncombe Sewerage.

The Surveyor submitted an outline sewerage scheme with approximate estimate of cost, and the Dorset County Council agreed for the District Council to take over the existing drain as a public sewer subject to the right of the County Council to drain road surface water into it and to make a contribution of one half the cost of additional works found necessary to deal with storm water overflow.

The priorities for sewerage schemes after Beaminster Town and Thorncombe, are Nettlecombe, Netherbury, Powerstock, Halstock, Evershot and Melbury.

Public Cleansing.

All household refuse and salvage is collected weekly from Beaminster parish. In the remaining parishes, salvage and indestructible household refuse only, is collected monthly, the work being carried out by two men and a 2/3 ton lorry. The refuse is tipped on the Council's dump a mile north of Beaminster Town. No tipping has so far been made on the site earmarked for the new refuse tip.

Camping Sites.

There is no wide-spread camping in the District. Licences were granted for a few single sites on which to keep a caravan.

Schools.

The 16 schools in the area have been inspected regularly; 10 have water supplies from the mains, 5 have wells and one has no water on the premises; 33 samples were taken for analyses by the County Council and all were satisfactory. 5 have water closets and the remainder vault or bucket closets. 12 schools have Tuberculin Tested milk, 3, Pasteurised and 1, Non-Designated.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

Meat Inspection.

There are two private Slaughter Houses licenced in the district, one in Broadwindsor and the other in Beaminster the latter being used on a very small scale. Inspection is made by the Sanitary Inspector who possesses the necessary qualifications.

There are no Pasteurising Plants in the District. The Milk Factory in Beaminster Town manufactures dried milk powder, and despatches by tanker liquid milk for sale by wholesale, and also supplies a small amount to retailers in the District.

33 new houses were completed by the Local Authority during the year in the following parishes; Beaminster 18, Halstock 6, Thorncombe 4, South Perrott 2, and Corscombe 3.

8 houses were in course of construction at the end of the year by the Local Authority in the following parishes; Beaminster 6, South Perrott 2.

Since the war 274 houses have been built by the Local Authority in the following parishes; Beaminster 117 (Fairfield 32, Hogshill Mead 32, Gerrards Green 53), Broadwindsor 34, (Village 24, Drimpton 10), Burstock 4, Corscombe 7, Evershot 4, Halstock 10, Marshwood 8, Melbury Osmond 4, Mosterton 6, Netherbury 38, (Village 14, North Bowood 2, Salway Ash 14, Melplash 8), South Perrott 10, Poorstock (West Milton) 4, Rampisham 4, Stoke Abbott 4, Thorncombe 20.

Under Section 1 of the Housing Repairs and Rents Act, 1954, a survey was made which showed that an estimated total of 105 houses were unfit for human habitation within the meaning of Section 9 of the above Act, and suitable for action under Section 11 or 25 of the Housing Act, 1936, but as owners may wish to put forward proposals, this total may be reduced to approximately 80.	

PREVALENCE OF, AND CONTROL OVER, INFECTIOUS AND OTHER DISEASES.

Measles and Whooping Cough became rather prevalent towards the end of the year. 8 cases of Pulmonary Tuberculosis were notified.

There were no cases of Food Poisoning nor Poliomyelitis notified.

Close co-operation was maintained with the Head Teachers and School Nurses regarding the control of Infectious Diseases in schools. The following cases were notified by the Head Teachers; Chicken Pox 93, Mumps 8, Influenza 82, Impetigo 22, Ringworm 7,

Diphtheria and Whooping Cough Immunisation.

This is the responsibility of the Dorset County Council. When not performed by the child's own Doctor, immunisation is given in the schools and Child Welfare Centres. The following table shows the number of children who have been immunised up to 31.12.55.


