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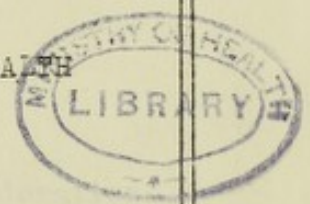

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

Water Supplies.

Beaminster Water Order, 1955.

A Local Enquiry was held in Beaminster on 22nd March, into the application to the Minister by the Council, for an Order under the Water Acts, 1945 and 1948, in respect of proposals for the compulsory acquisition of land and construction of works and abstraction of water at Hooke in connection with the proposed Regional Water Supply Scheme.

Regional Water Supply Scheme.

In October, the Council were informed that the Minister was prepared to approve the Regional Water Supply Scheme generally with certain provisos, and following the receipt of this communication, the Council agreed that a supply to the low lying area of the Marshwood Vale be substituted for one to Salway Ash in Stage 1 of the scheme, approved by the Council in December, 1953. Salway Ash would then be included in Stage 2. The Consulting Engineers were instructed to proceed with the preparation of Stage 1 in detail.

West Dorset Joint Water Committee.

In February, a joint meeting was held between representatives of the four Local Authorities in West Dorset, Dorset County Council, the Ministry of Housing and Local Government and the two Statutory Water Undertakers viz the Bridport Water Works Company and the Lyme Regis Water Works Company to discuss the question of water supplies in West Dorset and the formation of a Joint Committee or Water Board. It was recommended that the four West Dorset Local Authorities and the County Council be asked to agree to the appointment of a joint committee consisting of two members from each of these bodies, and the terms of reference to be, "to consider to what extent grouping of water undertakings in West Dorset appears to them desirable, and the means by which it may be best achieved and report upon their conclusions to the participating bodies, and to consider the advisability of obtaining a report as to the engineering works necessary to incorporate existing installations and proposed schemes in the area in a comprehensive system of supply, and that pending approval of the constitution of the joint committee and the holding of its first meeting, the Local Authorities and other Statutory Water Undertakers represented at the meeting or operating in the area be asked to furnish such financial, technical, and other information as will enable a report to be prepared for presentation to the first meeting of the joint committee as to the financial aspect of the joint operation of water undertakings in the area".

A Joint Meeting was held in December to consider a report by the County Public Health Engineer, in which he advised that a joint water scheme would be the most satisfactory way of supplying the whole of West Dorset, and that the two schemes which had been prepared on behalf of the Beaminster and Bridport Rural District Councils could be linked together, modified, and augmented, to serve West Dorset.

It is estimated that 2,800 persons or 34.2% of the population are served by public piped supplies, 2,816 persons or 34.4% by private piped supplies, and 2,570 persons or 31.4% depend on individual sources e.g. wells and springs.

### Sewerage.

#### Beaminster and Netherbury Sewerage and Sewage Disposal Scheme.

On 30th. June, the Consulting Engineers reported that they had substantially completed the work of taking levels on the Olenham Mill site and of preparing plans for the disposal works and pumping station sites. Meetings between the Council's representatives and the owners of land at Olenham Mill and Southgate took place in September, and as a result, it was decided that the Consulting Engineers should revise the layout of the proposed works at Olenham Mill.

#### Thorncombe Sewerage Scheme.

In May, the Surveyor submitted plans, details and estimates of cost of the proposed sewerage scheme for the village. In September, the Council were informed that the County Council had given approval of the scheme, and in December, an Inspector from the Ministry visited Thorncombe to see the layout.

### Priority Schemes

The priorities for sewerage schemes after Beaminster Town and Thorncombe are, Nettlecombe, Netherbury, Powerstock, Halstock, Evershot and Melbury.

### Public Cleansing.

All household refuse and salvage is collected weekly from Beaminster parish. In the remaining parishes, salvage and indestructible household refuse only is collected monthly, the work being carried out by two men and a 2/3 ton lorry. The refuse is tipped on the Council's dump a mile north of Beaminster Town. The Public Health Inspector reported in December, that providing that an access road to be constructed in connection with the proposed sewage disposal works site at Olenham Mill is used, the land situated to the west of the site would be suitable for use as a dump. The work of maintenance of the sewage disposal work and the refuse dump could be combined. The site is hidden and the distance from Beaminster is approximately the same as the dump at Stenford Lane, which is in use at the present time. If found suitable, this site would take the place of the one earmarked on Beaminster Downs for future refuse disposal.

Smoke Abatement.

Camping Sites.

There is no wide spread camping in the district, Licences were granted for a few single sites on which to keep a caravan.

Schools.

The 16 schools in the area have been inspected regularly; 10 have water supplies from mains, 5 from wells, and 1 has no water on the premises. 41 samples were taken for analyses by the County Council's staff and all, except 4, were satisfactory. 12 have water closets and the remainder, vault or bucket closets. 14 have Tuberculin Tested milk, and 2, Heat Treated milk.

It was found necessary to advise closing one school for two days in February, because of the freeze up in the water closet flushing system.

There are no Pasteurising Plants in the District. The Milk Factory in Beaminster Town manufactures dried milk powder, and despatches by tanker, liquid milk for sale by wholesale, and also supplies a small amount to retailers in the District.

HOUSING.

12 new houses were completed by the Local Authority during the year in the following parishes; Beaminster 10, and South Perrott 2.

19 houses were in course of construction at the end of the year by the Local Authority in the following parishes; Beaminster 17, and Netherbury (North Bowood) 2.

Since the war, 286 houses have been built by the Local Authority in the following parishes; Beaminster 127 (Fairfield 32, Hogshill Mead 32, Gerrards Green 63), Broadwindsor 34, (village 24, Drimpton 10), Burstock 4, Corscombe 7, Evershot 4, Halstock 10, Marshwood 8, Melbury Osmond 4, Mosterton 6, Netherbury 38 (village 14, North Bowood 2, Salway Ash 14, Melplash 8), South Perrott 12, Poorstock (West Milton) 4, Rampisham 4, Stoke Abbott 4, Thorncombe 20.

At the end of the year there were approximately 97 applicants on the waiting list for housing accommodation in the District.

PREVALENCE OF, AND CONTROL OVER, INFECTIOUS  
AND OTHER DISEASES.

The outbreak of Measles which had occurred at the end of 1955 was continued into the first half of 1956 when 95 cases were notified. The disease on the whole was mild.

There were no cases of Food Poisoning nor Poliomyelitis notified.

Close co-operation was maintained with the Head Teachers and School Nurses regarding the control of Infectious Diseases in schools. The following cases were notified by the Head Teachers; Chicken Pox 56, Measles 35, Whooping Cough 10, German Measles 4, Ringworm 2, Mumps 7.

Immunisation.

This is the responsibility of the Dorset County Council. When not performed by the child's own Doctor, immunisation is given at the schools and Child Welfare Clinics.

132 children were given their primary inoculation against Diphtheria and Whooping Cough and 108 were given reinforcing doses against Diphtheria. 89 children were vaccinated against Smallpox.

Immunisation against Poliomyelitis was commenced in May, of those children born in November 1947 - 1954 and in March 1951 - 1954 whose parents had consented and where vaccine was available children born in August 1947 - 1954 were immunised. A total of 35 children completed the course of two injections. When sufficient vaccine is forthcoming, all children whose parents agree, will be treated.

B.C.G. Vaccination against Tuberculosis.

The County Council are also responsible for this vaccination. Children aged 13 years are tested, and when necessary, are vaccinated against Tuberculosis. These children are tested and immunised at the schools which they are attending.
