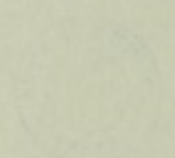



SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

The District is approximately 92 square miles in area and is divided into 26 parishes with a population of 8,080. Agriculture is the basic industry, mostly dairy farming. There is a Milk Factory and a Plastics' Factory in Beaminster Town, and a Saw Mill in the west of the District.

Water Supplies.

The West Dorset Water Board took over direct responsibility of the public water supplies in the District on 1st. April, 1959. The Council's responsibility ceased in respect of public water supplies to Beaminster Town, Netherbury village, Thorncombe village, Corscombe and Halstock.

The Council still retain responsibility for water supplies to their own housing estates in the parishes other than the above.

Water Shortage.

Water shortage occurred in Broadwindsor, Salway Ash, Mosterton, and Marshwood Vale. These places are subject to shortage every summer, and the Milk Factory supplies water in churns to farmers in the Marshwood Vale. Stage 1 of the Board's scheme will include Salway Ash and Dottery, and this stage is expected to be completed by the end of 1961.

Approximately 3,600 persons take supplies from public mains, 2,800 from private piped supplies and 1,800 depend on individual sources, e.g. wells and springs, which are mostly of doubtful quality and insufficient quantity.

Analyses.

Sewage.

Beaminster and Netherbury Sewerage and Sewage Disposal Scheme.

In July, the Consultant Engineers submitted plans and details of the scheme in outline at an estimated cost of £146,200, and the Council agreed to approach the Ministry for approval in principle. The District Valuer reported agreement for the acquisition of the works' site at Clenham Mill, and the Council accepted his report.

Powerstock and Nettlecombe Sewerage and Sewage Disposal Scheme.

After considering the Surveyor's report of the detailed scheme, the Council agreed to submit it to the Ministry, and in October, work commenced on the scheme.

Halstock Sewerage Scheme.

In September, the Surveyor submitted a report on the provision of a sewerage and sewage disposal scheme for the village of Halstock. This report was divided into three parts (1) a main scheme comprising 37 properties to be served by gravity sewer and disposal works, and (2) extension No. 1 comprising 12 properties to be served by gravity sewer and pumping main and (3) extension No. 2 comprising 3 properties to be served by gravity sewer. The Council agreed that in view of the present adequate drainage facilities to the majority of the properties which would be served by the extension, that details of the main scheme only, be prepared, to include disposal works designed to provide for the whole village.

Public Cleansing.

All household refuse and salvage is collected weekly from Beaminster parish, while in the remaining parishes, salvage and indestructible household refuse only, is collected monthly, the work being carried out by two men and a covered refuse collecting lorry. The refuse is tipped on the Council's dump a mile north of Beaminster Town. From 4th. December, the Surveyor took over responsibility for this service from the Public Health Inspector.

There is no wide-spread camping in the District. Licences were granted for a few single sites on which to keep a caravan.

Schools.

The 16 schools in the area have been inspected regularly; 10 have water supplies from mains, 5 from wells and 1 has no water on the premises. 16 samples were taken for analyses by the County Council's staff, 15 being satisfactory and 1 suspicious. 13 schools have water closets and 3 vault or bucket closets. All schools have Tuberculin Tested or Heat Treated milk supplied to the children.
