SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

The District is approximately 92 square miles in area and is divided into 26 parishes with a population of 8,080. Agriculture is the basic industry, mostly dairy farming. There is a Milk Factory and a Plastics' Factory in Beaminster Town, and a Saw Mill in the west of the District.

Water Supplies.

The West Dorset Water Board took over direct responsibility of the public water supplies in the District on 1st. April, 1959. The Council's responsibility ceased in respect of public water supplies to Beaminster Town, Netherbury village, Thorncombe village, Corscombe and Halstock.

The Council still retain responsibility for water supplies to their own housing estates in the parishes other than the above.

Water Shortage.

Water shortage occurred in Broadwindsor, Salway Ash, Mosterton, and Marshwood Vale. These places are subject to shortage every summer, and the Milk Factory supplies water in churns to farmers in the Marshwood Vale. Stage 1 of the Board's scheme will include Salway Ash and Dottery, and this stage is expected to be completed by the end of 1961.

Approximately 3,600 persons take supplies from public mains, 2,800 from private piped supplies and 1,800 depend on individual sources, e.g. wells and springs, which are mostly of doubtful quality and insufficient quantity.

Analyses.

The following table shows the results of bacteriological analyses carried out during the year from various supplies, taken by the Local Authority and the West Dorset Water Board.

Sowage.

Beaminster and Notherbury Sewerage and Sewage Disposal Scheme.

In July, the Consultant Engineers submitted plans and details of the scheme in outline at an estimated cost of £146,200, and the Council agreed to approach the Ministry for approval in principle. The District Valuer reported agreement for the goquisition of the works' site at Clenham Mill, and the Council accepted his report.

Powerstock and Nottlecombe Sowerage and Sewage Disposal Scheme.

After considering the Surveyor's report of the detailed schome, the Council agreed to submit it to the Ministry, and in October, work commenced on the scheme.

Halstock Sewerage Scheme.

In September, the Surveyor submitted a report on the provision of a sewerage and sewage disposal scheme for the village of Halstock. This report was divided into three parts (1) a main scheme comprising 37 proporties to be served by gravity sewer and disposal works, and (2) extension No. 1 comprising 12 proporties to be served by gravity sewer and pumping main and (3) extension No. 2 comprising 3 proporties to be served by gravity sewer. The Council agreed that in view of the present adequate drainage facilities to the majority of the properties which would be served by the extension, that details of the main scheme only, be prepared, to include disposal works designed to provide for the whole village.

Public Cleansing.

All household refuse and salvage is collected weekly from Beaminster parish, while in the remaining parishes, salvage and indestructible household refuse only, is collected monthly, the work being carried out by two men and a covered refuse collecting lorry. The refuse is tipped on the Council's dump a mile north of Beaminster Town. From 4th. December, the Surveyor took over responsibility for this service from the Public Health Inspector.

Smoke Abatement.

No Nuisances were reported regarding smoke or grit omissions.

Camping Sites.

There is no wide-spread camping in the District. Licences were granted for a few single sites on which to keep a caravan.

Schools.

The 16 schools in the area have been inspected regularly; 10 have water supplies from mains, 5 from wells and 1 has no water on the premises. 16 samples were taken for analyses by the County Council's staff, 15 being satisfactory and 1 suspicious. 13 schools have water closets and 3 vault or bucket closets. All schools have Tuberculin Tested or Heat Treated milk supplied to the children.

Knackers Yard.

There is one licensed Knackers Yard which is sited about three miles north of Beaminster Town.

6 visits were paid to this. The premises comply reasonably with the Regulations.

HOUSING.

10 new houses were completed by the Local Authority during the year, 5 at Broadwindsor, 1 at Beaminster and 4 at Thorncombe. 7 were in course of construction at the end of the year, all at Broadwindsor.

In November, the Council decided that consideration of any further building be deferred for six months.

The Council have built 44 bungalows 2 bedroom type, for elderly people, and have commenced building 6 flats in Fleet Street, Beaminster, with full structural welfare facilities for elderly people.

PREVALENCE OF, AND CONTROL OVER INFECTIOUS AND OTHER DISEASES.

Apart from Measles, the incidence of notifiable Infectious Diseases was low. Of the 352 cases notified, 308 were Measles which occurred during the first quarter of the year, and were widely scattered throughout the District. The Disease was of a fairly mild type. There were 22 cases of Scarlet Fever, widely scattered, and this disease was also of a mild type.

No cases of Food Poisoning were notified.

Close co-operation was maintained with the Head Teachers and School Nurses regarding control of Infectious Diseases in schools.

Immunisation.

This is the responsibility of the Dorset County Council. When not performed by the child's own doctor, immunisation is given at the schools and Child Welfare Centres, and for older persons, special evening clinics were opened for Poliomyelitis Vaccination.
