SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

The District is approximately 92 square miles in area and is divided into 26 parishes with a population of 8,240. Agriculture is the basic industry, mostly dairy farming. There is a Milk Factory and a Plastics' Factory in Beaminster Town, and a Saw Mill in the west of the District.

Water Supplies.

The West Dorset Water Board took over direct responsibility of public water supplies in the District on 1st. April, 1959. The Council's responsibility ceased in respect of public water supplies to Beaminster Town, Netherbury village, Thorncombe village, Corscombe and Halstock.

The Council still retain responsibility for water supplies to their own housing estates in the parishes other than the above.

West Dorset Water Board. Regional Scheme Phase 1

In April, the Ministry approved Phase 1 of the Board's Regional scheme without prejudice to any decision that might ultimately be taken on the draft order for Litton Cheney. On 14th. September, a Public Enquiry was held regarding the proposed development at Litton Cheney.

Phase 1 included statistics relating to the Litton Cheney boreholes together with details of the Hooke pumping station, the construction of five reservoirs and the laying of approximately 19 miles of trunk mains from Hooke westwards via Toller Down, Beaminster Down (with a spur to Langdon reservoir) to Broadwindsor, Salway Ash and Dottery from where a connection would be made to the Bridport supply at Bradpole.

Good progress was made during 1961 on capital works contracts of Phase 1, and by the end of the year :-

(a) Reservoir on North Warren Hill was completed.

(b) Head Works etc at Hook were 90% completed.

Detailed foundation drawings for the pumps had been received and the permanent high voltage line to the site erected.

(c) The Contractors had built a temporary access road and were

excavating the site for the Toller Down reservoir.

(d) Approximately 15,300 yards of 10", 8" and 6" main between Hooke and the site reservoir at Stoke Knapp was completed.

(e) 7,500 yards of 6" main was laid from North Warren Hill reservoir via Salway Ash to Dottery with an extension to Bradpole. This main was connected to the existing mains in Netherbury. Thus water from the present source supplying Beaminster would augment, during part of 1962, the supply from Litton Cheney to Bridport and Bradpole.

By early 1962 it was hoped to let the following contracts which would complete Phase 1.

(a) Reservoir at Stoke Knapp.(b) Reservoir at North Bowood.

(c) Main laying Furleigh Cross to Broadwindsor.

The Board's Engineer felt reasonably confident that it would be possible to lift the ban on water supply to new building development in the Bridport area by December, 1962, and also to supply Broadwindsor by that date.

Puncknowle Swyre and West Bexington.

At the end of April, water was laid on from Litton Cheney to West Bexington via Puncknowle and Swyre through a new mains system of 8,212 yards in length.

Re-grouping of Water Undertakings.

In May, the Minister informed the West Dorset Water Board that he had communicated with the Dorchester Borough and Rural District Councils, Weymouth Borough, Portland Urban District Council and the Weymouth Water Works Company, foreshadowing moves regarding re-grouping at a not too distant date, and in September, on the suggestion of the Minister, a Working Party was formed to prepare an agreed body of information from which a more accurate assessment than at present existed, could be made of the likely burden which re-grouping would impose on the consumers of water within the four adjacent authorities. At its first meeting on 25/9/61 it agreed on a form of questionnaire to be completed by all the authorities concerned, the figures from which would be consolidated by the Deputy County Treasurer. The Working Party then proposed to prepare an agreed report showing the financial implication of forming a Board to serve both Central and West Dorset. The Report would show, first, the financial position of the proposed Board if formed in the near future and, secondly, the long term position after all major capital works had been completed and any preferential rates, special contributions, eto, had ceased to operate.

I am grateful to the West Dorset Water Board's Engineer for his co-operation.

Analyses.

Approximately 3,600 persons take supplies from public mains, 2,800 from private piped supplies and 1,800 depend on individual sources, e.g. wells and springs, which are mostly of doubtful quality and insufficient quantity.

The following table shows the results of bacteriological analyses carried out by the Public Health Laboratory, Dorchester, during the year from various supplies taken by the Local Authority, and the West Dorset Water Board.

Sewerage and Sewage Disposal. Beaminster and Netherbury.

There are 626 properties within the area to be served by the proposed new sewerage system at Beaminster. 576 of these have water sanitation and the remaining 50 have pail closets or vaults.

The method of disposal of drainage from the 576 properties with water samitation is approximately as follows :-

Council Houses, with their own disposal plants (septic tank, filter and humus chamber, with effluent to river)	208

The existing sewers are nostly combined highway surface water and house drainage sewers. They are predominently old stone built sewers and discharge untreated into the rivers at various points.

Especially during the sum or months the condition of the rivers gets very bad, particularly so in the case of the river at the end of St. Mary Well Street, and to improve natters during these months parts of the rivers are cleaned periodically.

Pollution of the river is also aggravated by the discharge of drainage from the milk drying factory of Messrs Dried Milk Products Ltl., at North Street, and from the Process and Printing Works of Messrs Abbott Brown and Sons Ltd., at the end of Fleet Street.

An enquiry into the sewerage scheme for Beaminster and Netherbury was held on 31/5/61 by an inspector of the Ministry of Housing and Local Government, and as a result of this enquiry, the Minister agreed that a scheme of sewerage and sewage disposal was necessary. The Minister suggested that the Council should approach Bridport Borough and Bridport Rural District Councils with a view to exploring the possibility of joint action with them, for an alternative means of sewage disposal for Beaminster and Netherbury by the conveyance of the sewage down the River Brit valley to discharge into the sewerage system of the Bridport Borough.

The Long Sea Outfall.

In October, a Joint Meeting of the West Dorset Local Authorities took place regarding the proposed scheme for a long sea outfall at West Bay put forward by Messrs Land and Marine Contractors Ltd. It was decided to employ a firm of Consultant Engineers to make the necessary investigation and preparation of a preliminary report on the scheme as affecting the two Bridgert and Beaminster Councils. Subsequently the Councils agreed to contribute to the cost (750 guineas) of the Consultants fees in the following proportions - Beaminster R.D.C. 3/12ths. Bridgert R.D.C. 4/12ths. and Bridgert Borough 5/12ths. Any grant from the Dorset Council for this report would be apportioned among the constituent authorities on the foregoing basis.

Powerstook and Nottlecombe.

This scheme was completed at the beginning of the year.

Halstook.

Sever laying commenced in October. The tender was £6,168 and the scheme is designed to provide for the severage by gravity serving 37 properties including a licensed premise.

Corscombe.

In July, the Council agreed to send to the Minister of Mousing and Local Government for approval, an outline scheme to serve the Courcil Farm and Milton Farm areas (with provision for the inclusion of the Church area), incorporating

(1) a disposal site near Farm End with access via an existing lane from Pope's Cottage.

(2) Gravity severs from the vicinity of You Troe Farm to Milton Farm and from Pope's Cottage to Milton Farm.

(3) A Gravity sewer from Knapp Farm and another from Bankside to a pumping station opposite Corscombe Farm and themos a pumping main to the head of the gravity sewer at Yew Tree Farm.

Retinated cost £12,049.

Helplash.

It was decided to defer sewerage of this village until after mains water was laid on by the West Dorset Water Board.

Salway Ash.

As mains water was laid on to this village at the end of the year, it was decided to bring forward Salway Ash to follow Corscombe in order of priority.

Priority Schenes.

As Phase 1 of the West Dorset Water Board's Schene will be completed by the end of 1962, it means that mains water will have been laid on to Salway Ash and Dottery (completed at the end of 1961) and also to Broadwindsor by the end of 1962, so urgent consideration should be given to the sewering of these villages.

Public Cleansing.

A fortnightly collection of all household refuse for the whole of the District except Beaminster parish, which has a weekly collection, was introduced in January.

The refuse is tipped on the Council's dump a nile north of Beaminster town.

A new Austin 404 forward control chassis/cab with 3.4 litre diesel engine fitted with 12 Cu. Yrd. capacity body, was purchased and went into service in October.

Litter bins, provided by the Dorset County Council who also contribute towards the cost of collection at official laybys on trunk and classified roads, are emptied on the normal refuse collection rounds.

Rodent Control.

The North Dorset Control Scheme of which this Council is a member, is functioning satisfactorily in the District.

Disinfestation.

No action was taken during the year.

Smoke Abatement.

No Nuisances were reported regarding snoke or grit emissions.

The Caravan Sites and Control of Development Act, came into force 29th. August, 1960.

There is no widespread camping in the District. Licences were granted for a few single sites on which to keep a caravan.

Schools.

The 16 schools in the area have been inspected regularly; 11 have water supplies from mains (public and private), 4 from wells and 1 has no water on the premises. 48 samples were taken for analyses by the County Council's staff, 41 being satisfactory and 7 unsatisfactory. 13 schools have water closets and 3, vault or bucket closets. All schools have Tuberculin Tested or Heat Treated milk supplied to the children.

Flooding.

No flooding occurred in the area. Discussions were still being carried on with the Dorest County Council and River Boards regarding maining parts of the rivers Brit, Parrott and Axe, and cleaning river beds.

In July the Land Drainage Act. 1961 came into operation. Councils are encouraged to undertake flood prevention work in their district other than on main rivers.

The Pollution of Rivers.

The Rivers (Prevention of Pollution) Act. 1961 came into operation on 27th. September, 1961. The principal affect is to require the River Board's consent to all discharges existing before the commencement of the Rivers (Prevention of Pollution) Act. 1951.

155 inspections of food premises were made, of which 132 were of the registered premises set out in group (2) above. The premises are considered to comply reasonably with the Food Hygiene Regulations, 1955.

Byelaws under Section 15 of the Food and Drugs Act, 1955.

No notice was served under the above Byelaws for infringement.

Condennation of Food.

Apart from neat condenned at the slaughterhouse, the following foodstuffs were condenned and disposed of by burial at the Council's refuse tip :-

44 tins of various foodstuffs. 29 Ducks.

Milk Supply.

Since the beginning of the year, the responsibility for the issue of licences for the use of special designation in connection with milk, or the registration of distributors, was transferred from the Council to the Dorset County Council under the Milk (Special Designation) Regulations, 1960. The County Council, however, have continued to inform the Council where milk samples have failed to pass the prescribed test, and during the year notified, that of 52 samples taken 47 passed and 5 failed.

In December, the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food notified the Council of the proposal to make an Order, specifying this rural district as an area within which the use of special designation in relation to milk sold by retail would become obligatory. The Council raised no objection to this proposal.

5 Dealer's licences to sell Pre-packed milk, and 2 for T.T. milk, were issued.

Meat Inspection.

There is only one licenced slaughterhouse in the District.
This is sited at Broadwindsor and is privately owned. Inspection of neat at this slaughterhouse is made by the Public Health Inspector who possesses the necessary qualifications.

82 inspections were made to the slaughterhouse during the year.

The owner of the above slaughterhouse obtained planning consent to the use of land at Common Water Lane, Broadwindsor for the erection of a new slaughterhouse, and this building was under construction at the end of 1961.

The Council were informed that the Minister had made 1st. April, 1962 as the day from which all slaughterhouses in the Rural District must comply with the construction regulations, i.e. the Slaughterhouse (Hygiene) Regulations 1958 and the Slaughter of Animals (Prevention of Cruelty) Regulations, 1958.

There is one licensed Knackers Yard which is sited about three miles north of Beaminster Town.

4 visits were paid to this. The premises comply reasonably with the Rogulations.

The Meat (Staining and Sterilisation) Regulations, 1960, came into operation, 1/11/60.

Briefly they are to the effect that, with certain exemptions, meat at slaughterhouses and other premises, which is unfit for human consumption must be sterilised before it leaves the premises, but where there are no facilities for sterilising, the neat may be removed by arrangement with an authorised officer of the Local Authority to a place where it will be sterilised or destroyed.

All neat at knackers yards nust be sterilised or stained green.

Copies of the Regulations were supplied to the appropriate traders in the district.

Housing for Elderly People.

The Council have built 51 bungalows 2 bedroom type, for elderly people, and have completed building 6 flats in Fleet Street, Beaminster, with full structural welfare facilities for elderly people.

Although there are still houses awaiting denolition, the major part of the Council's five year programme has been completed. However, a further 26 houses have been added as possibly being unfit and liable to denolition and these will be dealt with.

NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948 Section 47, Renoval of Persons in need of Care and Attention to suitable premises.

There were no cases during the year, where it was necessary to proceed under this Section of the Act.

PREVALENCE OF, AND CONTROL OVER INFECTIOUS AND OTHER DISEASES.

The incidence of notifiable Infectious Diseases was very low, apart from Measles of which 57 cases were notified. The disease was a mild type.

No cases of Food Poisoning were notified.

Close co-operation was maintained with the Head Teachers and School Nurses regarding control of Infectious Diseases in schools.

Immunisation.

This is the responsibility of the Dorset County Council. When not performed by the child's own doctor, immunisation is given at the schools and Child Welfare Centres, and for older persons, special evening clinics were opened for Polionyelitis Vaccination.
