



ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH.

Public Health Department Council Offices, Bedworth.

To the Chairman and Members of the Urban District Council.

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting to you the Annual Report on the state of health of the inhabitants of the Urban District of Bedworth for the year 1966, together with the report of the Chief Public Health Inspector.

The mid year estimate obtained from the Registrar General's Department gave the population of the Urban District for 1966 as 37,100 compared with 34,820 for the previous year.

During the year 814 live births were registered giving a birth rate of 19.5 which was higher than the national average of 17.7.

The natural increase, that is, the excess of births over deaths was 412. As in previous years the causes of death did not adversely reflect the environmental circumstances of the district.

The number of infant deaths, that is deaths occurring in the first year of life was 18 giving a mortality rate of 22.11. Although this rate is higher than the national average it should not give rise to undue alarm as the relatively small numbers involved over a period of one year are likely to give an exaggerated impression. A more accurate estimate can be obtained by a study of the trend over a period of years. If the above figures are compared with those of 20 years ago when the mortality rate was 54.3 it can be seen that there has been a vast improvement in infant care. Once again the causes of death were prematurity, congenital defects and other causes which in our present state of medical knowledge it is impossible to prevent.

It is gratifying to report that not a single death took place as the result of pregnancy, childbirth or abortion, which reflects the excellence of the maternity services provided by the Hospitals, General Practitioners and Local Authority Maternity Services.

The notifications of infectious diseases numbered 211 compared with 348 the previous year when there was a greater number of cases of measles. Only 6 cases of dysentery and food poisoning were notified which is an improvement on previous years.

The standard of food hygiene in food shops and catering establishments in the District is good and your inspectors continue to visit all premises at regular intervals. Similarly the hundered per cent inspection of meat slaughtered in the District has been maintained and all slaughterhouses have been found to be in a satisfactory state.

The water supply to the District was satisfactory. Samples of mains water submitted by the North East Warwickshire Water Board and your Chief Public Health Inspector to the Public Health Laboratory were found to be bacteriologically satisfactory.

In general the standard of health and hygiene in the Urban District for 1966 was satisfactory and progress continues.

In conclusion I wish to thank the Chairman and members of the Public Health Committee for their interest and support. Appreciation must also be expressed to colleagues in the Public Health and other Departments of the Council for their co-operation and assistance.



LABORATORY FACILITIES

The Public Health Laboratory situated at the Coventry and Warwick Hospital, Coventry, undertakes the bacteriological examination of samples of water, ice cream and food, also in the investigation of infectious diseases.

The services of the Analyst to the City of Coventry are also utilised for chemical analysis.

THE GENERAL PROVISIONS OF THE HEALTH SERVICE

The General Practitioner service is administered by the Warwickshire and Solihull Executive Gouncil. There are several Medical Practitioners living in the district and others residing outside practise on the periphery.

There are no general hospital services directly available in the district but adequate out and in patient facilities are provided at the Nuneaton and Coventry Hospitals which are administered by No.20 Group Hospital Management Committee of the Birmingham Regional Hospital Board. Cases of infectious disease are admitted to Whitley Isolation Hospital, Coventry. Out patient clinics for tuberculosis are held at Riversley Park Clinic, Coton Road, Nuneaton.

Warwickshire County Council are responsible for the administration of the School Health Services and arrangements for Domiciliary Nursing and Midwifery Services, Domestic Helps, Vaccination and Immunisation, care of mothers and young children, Care and After Care and the Ambulance Service as laid down in Part 111 of the National Health Service Act, 1946.

With the exception of the Ambulance Service the day by day administration of these Services is under the control of the Area Medical Officer, Area Health Department, Council Offices, Bedworth.

The Ambulance Depot is adjacent to the Infant Welfare Clinic, Newtown Road, Bedworth.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

WATER SUPPLY

The Water Supply of Bedworth is constant, and is abtained as follows:-

- (a) Two sources at the Newdigate Colliery, in the West Ward of the district.
 (i) From an adit in the Frank Shaft, 270 ft. below ground surface.
 (ii) From a 12 in. borehole, 220 ft. deep.
- (b) 20 in. Borehold, Bedworth Waterworks. The borehole is 20 ins. in diameter and 275 ft. deep.
- (c) Exhall Deep Well. The well is 9 ft. in diameter, and approximately 260 - 300 ft. deep.
- (d) Coventry Corporation. This is used as a Supplementary supply, and is only drawn upon when necessary.
- (e) Birmingham. This is used as a sup-lementary supply, being piped via Nuneaton.

All this water is pumped into a storage reservoir at the Waterworks. The reservoir has a storage capacity of 750,000 galls. The water is pumped from the reservoir and boosted direct to the town. The Water Tower is now only used for night duty.

As a result of the above it is considered that the Water Supply of the area has been reasonably satisfactory in quantity.




