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



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### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH

# TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF BEDWORTH URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL

Mrs. Ward(Chairman) and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting to you my Annual Report on the health of the inhabitants, and the sanitary and environmental conditions of the Urban District of Bedworth for 1969 together with the report of the Chief Public Health Inspector.

The mid year estimate obtained from the office of the Registrar General gave the population for the year as 40,700 an increase of 530 compared with 1968.

During the year 829 births were notified, an increase of 6 compared with the previous year, giving a birth rate of 18.2. This rate was higher than the County and National averages of 16.3 and 16.7.

The Infant Mortality rate was 16 being lower than the figure of 18.2 for England and Wales.

130 cases of infectious disease were notified which included 95 notifications of infective hepatitis.

The number of cases on the Tuberculosis Register decreased by 1 to 383 and the number of new cases notified was 9 compared with 12 in 1968.

The Public Health Inspectorate continued to operate with their usual efficiency. Due to the growth of the district, with the resulting increase in the work load, the Council agreed to the appointment of an Additional Inspector.

Progress continued in the field of environmental hygiene.

The declaration of the third smoke control area ensured that more than a quarter of the Urban District is now benefiting from the decrease in atmospheric pollution from the domestic fire.

The remainder of the report is self explanatory.

I wish to thank the Chairman and Members of the Public Health Committee for their interest and support. Appreciation must also be expressed for the co-operation and assistance received from Mr. Burriss and members of the Public Health Inspectorate and colleagues in other Departments.

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### LABORATORY FACILITIES

The Public Health Laboratory situated at the Coventry and Warwick Hospital, Coventry, undertakes the bacteriological examination of samples of water, ice cream and food, also in the investigation of infectious diseases.

The services of the Analyst to the City of Coventry are also utilised for chemical analysis.

### THE GENERAL PROVISIONS OF THE HEALTH SERVICE

The General Practitioner service is administered by the Warwickshire and Solihull Executive Council. There are several Medical Practitioners living in the district and others residing outside practise on the periphery.

There are no general hospital services directly available in the district but adequate out and in patient facilities are provided at the Nuneaton and Coventry Hospitals which are administered by No. 20 Group Hospital Management Committee of the Birmingham Regional Hospital Board. Cases of infectious disease are admitted to Whitley Isolation Hospital, Coventry. Out patient clinics for tuberculosis are held at Riversley Park Clinic, Coton Road, Nuneaton.

Warwickshire County Council are responsible for the administration of the School Health Service and arrangements for Domiciliary Nursing and Midwifery Services, Domestic Helps, Vaccination and Immunisation, Care of Mothers and Young Children, Care and After Care and the Ambulance Service as laid down in Part III of the National Health Service Act, 1946.

With the exception of the Ambulance Service the day by day administration of these Services is under the control of the Area Medical Officer, Area Health Department, Council Offices, Bedworth.

The Ambulance Depot is adjacent to the Infant Welfare Clinic, Newtown Road, Bedworth.

# TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF BEDWORTH URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL

Mrs. Word (Chairman) and Gentlemen,

1969 was a year in which further advance was made in environmental health, a big step forward being the coming into operation of the Bedworth No. 3 Smoke Control Area containing an area of 963 acres and 1668 houses (which included the mining village of Keresley). This means that over one quarter of the Urban District has been covered by Smoke Control Orders within the last three years.

Housing Improvement work has been vigorously pursuedthroughout the year, a further 58 improvement grant applications being approved and a total of £9,752 paid in grant aid. Also a further 12 houses were made subject of Demolition or Closing Orders.

Attention has also been given during the year to testing of Petroleum Tanks, a number of which were found to be leaking and their use discontinued.

In addition to the above matters all food premises and factory canteens were inspected during the year and 100% inspection of all animals slaughtered was obtained.

In conclusion I would like to thank the Chairman and Vice Chairman of the Health Committee and the Medical Officer of Health for their help and the additional inspectors for their wholehearted efforts in achieving the above.

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### ATMOSPHERIC POLLUTION-CLEAN AIR ACT, 1956.

The Bedworth No. 3 Smoke Control Area came into operation on the 1st November, 1969, the area covers 963 acres 1,668 houses including the whole of the mining village of Keresley. This means that within 3 years of the commencement of the Clean Air Programme a quarter of the whole of the Bedworth Urban is now made subject to Smoke Control Orders.

### MEAT INSPECTION.

There are three licenced slaughterhouses in the area, inspections being carried out on a rota basis by the Deputy and two District Inspectors.

### CONDEMNED FOOD.

Routine inspection of food shops and notification by retailers resulted in the voluntary surrender of a large variety of food as being unfit for human consumption.

### INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD PREMISES. INCLUDING PUBLIC HOUSES.

The inspections are carried out to ascertain compliance with the Food Hygiene (General) Regulations 1960 and Section 89 of the Public Health Act, 1936.

Certain infringements were found during the above inspections, all such defects were remedied and in certain cases improvements to premises were made.

### RODENT CONTROL.

Owing to frequent illness on the part of the Rodent Control Officer and additional duties being given to the Fublic Health Department, the work of rodent control was contracted out to Messrs. Rentokil Limited.

Service has been found to be both cheaper and more satisfactory and in addition treatment of sewers carried out in a more expedient way, altogether a much better service is being provided to the public.

### OFFENSIVE TRADES.

There are no premises in the District where offensive trades are carried out.

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### SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

### WATER SUPPLY

The Water Supply of Bedworth is constant, and is obtained as follows:-

- (a) Two sources at the Newdigate Colliery, in the West Ward of the district.
  - (1) From an adit in the Frank Shaft, 270ft below ground surfaces.
  - (2) From a 12" borehole, 220ft deep.
- (b) 20" borehole, Bedworth Waterworks. The borehole is 20" in diameter and 275 ft deep.
- (c) Exhall Deep Well.

  The Well is 9ft in diameter, and approximately 260-300ft deep.
- (d) Coventry Corporation, for certain districts in Exhall.
- (e) Birmingham.

  This is used as a supplementary supply, being piped via Nuneaton.

All this water is pumped into a storage reservoir at the Waterworks. The reservoir has a storage capacity of 750,000 galls. The water is pumped from the reservoir and boosted direct to the town. The water Tower is now only used for night duty.

As a result of the above it is considered that the Water Supply of the area has been reasonably satisfactory in quantity.
