PREVALENCE OF & CONTROL OVER INFECTIOUS & OTHER DISEASES DURING 1947.

During the year 82 cases of Infectious Disease were notified in the Rural District :-

No major epidemic of Infectious Disease occurred during the year in the Rural District, although 21 cases of whooping cough occurre amongst children in the Belford & Warenford areas during April, May and Juneo

The case of Measles and Scarlet Fever occurred sporadically during the year in various parts of the Rural District.

In common with most areas in the County, this Rural District was visited by Acute Poliomyelitis for the first time in over forty. years. The cases occurred as follows:-

Boy (8 yrs) Seahouses. 1st. August. Female (20 yrs) Ross Farm, Belford. 20th. August. (1) 11) (iii) Girl 1.10/12 yrs) Seahouses. 20th. August.
(iv) Girl (7 yrs) Seahouses. 5th. September.
(v) Male (19 yrs) Easington Grange. 20th. September.
(vi) Boy (14¹/₂yrs) 14th. September.
(vii) Boy (14 yrs) Easington Grange. 1st. October.

It is interesting to note that four cases occurred in Seahouses, although investigation did not reveal any contact between the patients. Seahouses is the most thickly populated part of the Rural District, and during August and September the population may easily be doubled due to summer visitors. Ross and Easington Grange are adjoining farms, but no connection betwee: the cases at these two farms could be ascertained. The two cases at Easington Grange occurred in brothers living in the sau house. The cases were all removed to Hospital in Newcastle/Tyne for treatment. There were no fatal cases, and in only one case was there severe crippling as a result, viz: the first case of the boy aged 8 yrs All of the cases occurred in that part of the Rural District adjacent to the sea coast. It is doubtful however if the location of the cases is of much significance. -3-
