SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA. WATER SUPPLY.

With the coming into operation of the Town and Country Planning Act 1947, the duties of the Engineer and Surveyor and the Sanitary Inspector have been re-allocated and the Engineer & Surveyor is responsible for the management and maintenance of the Council's Water Undertaking, the supervision of Sowage Systems and Sewage Disposal Works and work in connection with the Town Planning.

The County Council's approval to the proposed District Water Scheme was received in March and the Council has engaged Messrs Waterhouse & Rounthwaite to propare the complete Scheme for submissi: to the Ministry of Health. The Consulting Engineers were instructed to give priority to the provision of a new water supply for the Bolford area.

Agreement in principle for the purchase of the Bamburgh' Water Undertaking has been reached with Lord Armstrong's Agent.

The existing supplies in Belford have been improved by the renewal of 150 lin.yds. of 4" water main and the scraping of 280 lin.yds. of 4" pipes and 800 lin.yds. of 2" pipes in the village, and also by other incidental works and additional maintenance.

Samplos of water have been taken for both chemical analyses and bactoriological examinations from the following sources of the Belford supply viz:- Red Spring, West Spring, North Spring, Old Hespital Supply Spring and the Grass Field Spring and the reports state that the water from all of these sources is suitable for drinking and domostic use.

As the Soahouses Reserveir had been loaking badly for some years, the Council accepted a tender for re-lining with Bitumen and they have also decided to have the Scahouses Pumping Plant, which is in a unsatisfactory condition, overhauled as soon as practicable in order to maintain supplies in the Seahouses area during the holiday season.

Samples taken from private sources of supply were found in three cases to bomeontaminated. In each case work done to exclude penetration of surface water proved satisfactory. Water is supplied from public mains to houses in the

SEVERAGE AND SEVAGE DISPOSAL.

Altorations have been carried out at the Belford Savago Disposal Works to facilitate their operation and to improve the offluent but additional alterations will be necessary to improve their officioncy.

The Bamburgh Soverage System has been taken over by the Council and a Severman has been engaged to attend to this and to the maintenance of other Severage systems in the District.

The laying of a new sower and the construction of a septic tank has been carried out at Ellingham to deal with the sewage from the Council' houses, the Hostel and other premises in the village which had proviously been discharging crude sewage into an open water course.

A defective main sewer at High Pump, North Sunderland, has boon ro-laid to overcome repeated blockages and flooding of the hightey.

<u>Mhooping Cough</u> was the nest provalent infectious disease in the Eucl District during the year. It appeared in tild epidemic form in Seahouses and District in June, and again in September and October in the Lucker and Newham is eas and at the end of year there: were a few cases in Belford.

Measles occurred sporadically throughout the District during the year, and in December there were a few cases in the Seahouses, Beadnell and Swinhoe areas but not amounting to an epidemic.

The cases of <u>Searlet Fever</u> occurred sporadically throughout the year, four of them being in the Belford area.

The case of <u>Paratyphoid Fever</u> 'B' occurred in Belford. He is a man whose sister-in-law is a carrier of the disease and who had been residing in the same house. He was admitted to Berwick Isolation Hospital where he made a total recovery. The carrier of the disease now lives in her own house in Belford and is kept under continuus supervision. There has been no further spread of the disease.
