Report of the Medical Officer of Health for the year 1938.

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

I again have the pleasure of presenting to you my Annual Report for last year, along with the vital statistics. This is the seventh I have placed before you.

The population of the district is estimated to be 25,630, an

increase of 190 on the previous year.

The Infantile Death Rate is 43.3 per 1000 births against 31.007 per 1000 for the previous year.

The Birth Rate is 14.31 per 1000 of the population, against

15.21 per 1000 last year.

Three hundred and six Deaths took place during the year, 141 males and 165 females, of the total number, 83 were persons between the ages of 65 and 75 and 94 were over 75 years of age. From this it will be seen that in this district the people live to a ripe old age. The Death Rate for the year is 11.19 per 1000 of the population. This is against 242 deaths which took place in the preceding year when the Death Rate was 9.51 per 1000.

39 Deaths were ascribed as due to Cancer, 14 males and 25 females. This is 8 more than occurred in 1937. The average age for the deaths occurring from this malady was males 65.73 years and

females 68.45 years.

There were three deaths ascribed as due to Zymotic causes. One Scarlet Fever and two Diphtheria, giving a Zymotic Death Rate of 0.11 per 1000 of the population. During last year there was a severe epidemic of both Scarlet Fever and Diphtheria and the cases

were of a very severe type.

The Schools of the District have been visited and inspected on several occasions and have always been found to be clean, well ventilated and in a satisfactory condition. I am pleased to say that shortly we shall be seeing the end of those unsuitable premises used as a Boys' School at Kilburn, as the new School is nearing completion at Smithy Houses, where the boys are to be transferred on completion.

The cow-byres of the district have been under our officials' constant supervision and many alterations and renewals have

taken place all over the district.

In former years I have brought to your notice the lack of sewage accommodation at Horsley, Kilburn, Denby, Shipley and Oakerthorpe. Enquiries have been held by Officials from the Ministry of Health concerning all the districts, and in every case orders have been made for the work to proceed, which is

being done with the exception of Shipley, which is held up temporarily for certain modifications.

The water supply of the District has been very much to the front. An enquiry was held at Shipley (at the same time as that for sewage) concerning the water supply and an order has come

through from the Ministry for the work to proceed.

An enquiry was held at Crich concerning the water supply to Crich, Lea and Holloway and again an order has been made for the work to proceed. A Court of Arbitration has also given its verdict in the Council's favour so that Alfreton will now have to subsidise the supply

Duffield water supply has also had consideration and something will have to be done for purifying it by Chlorination, and the matter is being gone into by your Authority, and the Ministry of Health.

Hazelwood, Shottle and Turnditch are still without water, but it is proposed soon to sink a borehole, when an ample supply will be available. I hope the Parish of Idridgehay will also be brought into the scheme.

The water scheme at Pentrich urgently requires extension to Pentrich Lane End, where they are without a proper supply except

from wells which are inadequate.

The work at the Duffield Outfall Works is proceeding along very well, and during the coming year will be finished, and this parish will then have one of the most up-to-date plants in the County.

All the clearance areas which have been brought to the notice of the Ministry of Health and approved by them for demolition have

been carried out.

There are five Camping Sites in the district, all being in the Northern Area; 2 at Whatstandwell and 3 at Alderwasley; 2 only have licences issued to them by your Authority; leave to form one at South Wingfield was refused; it is estimated that during Bank Holiday week there were 1,200 people under canvas.

I must again thank the members of the Council and the Clerk (Mr. George Pym) for their continued confidence and coutesy and also the two Sanitary Inspectors, Mr. Laycock and Mr. Cooper for

the great help and co-operation.

Tuberculosis.

At the end of the year there were 116 cases of Pulmonary Tuberculosis on the register, 64 males and 52 females. Non-Pulmonary cases on the register, 37; 20 males and 17 females.

Of the 17 cases of Tuberculosis, 3 of the Pulmonary type were admitted to the Sanatorium.

Giving an average at the end of five years of Pulmonary 117.2, and other forms of Tuberculosis 38,2. Total 155.4.

There has been no evidence whereby it has been necessary to take any action under the Public Health (Prevention of Tuberculosis) Regulations, 1925, or under Section 172 of the Public Health Act, 1936, during the year.

Scarlet Fever.

55 cases were reported during the year against 47 for the previous year, an increase of 8. Of this number 38 were removed to the Isolation Hospital, and the remainder were nursed at home. The cases were scattered all over the District. Denby headed the list with 9 cases, Allestree 8, Kilburn 7, and Smalley 6. The cases were of a mild type generally. There was one death ascribed to this malady.

Diphtheria.

During the year there were 36 cases brought to my notice, an increase of 27 over the previous year, the majority of cases coming from the Eastern portion of the Rural District, Horsley Woodhouse claiming 10 and Shipley 7. The other largest numbers were Crich 5, Dethick Lea & Holloway 4, and Duffield 3, leaving seven cases from the remaining 25 parishes. 25 cases were removed to the Isolation Hospital, and the remaining ones were nursed at home. There were 2 deaths from this malady.

Pneumonia.

During the year 24 cases were brought to my notice against 22 for the previous year, and increase of two. Only one was removed to the Hospital, the rest were nursed at home.

Erysipelas.

Nine cases were reported to me during the year, and only one was removed to Hospital.

Puerperal Pyrexia.

Four cases were reported during the year under this heading, half the number of last year, when there were 8 cases. All the 4 cases were nursed at home.

Ophthalmia Neonatorum.

Only one case was reported during the year, the same number as last year.

Polio Myelitis.

Two cases were reported during the year—one from Shipley, and the other from Duffield. The previous case was in 1935.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SANITARY INSPECTORS, Year ended, 31st December, 1938.

ADMINISTRATION. The Rural District of Belper, for health and sanitary matters, is under the supervision of Dr. Richard C. Allen, Medical Officer of Health, Belper.

The area is divided into two Districts, North and South, to each of which is appointed a Sanitary Inspector, living fairly centrally in their district, and with separate offices.

No clerical assistance is employed.

WATER SUPPLIES. No concrete progress has been made with the provision of fresh supplies to the various parishes, though the Council's Engineers have sub.nitted certain proposals for Crich, Turnditch and Shipley.

At Duffield the question is one of quality, and this will receive

attention during the coming year.

Drainage and Sewerage. The remodelling and bringing up-to-date of the plant at the Duffield Outfall Works was well in hand at the end of the year, and will be completed about August, 1939.

Enquiries have been held by the Ministry of Health into the schemes for Denby, Kilburne, Horsley, Shipley and Oakerthorpe. The Shipley scheme is held up for modification.

SCAVENGING. In some form scavenging is done in the greater part of the district, varying in character according to the parish requirements, but in no case does the work include the emptying of cesspools.

Most of the parishes are scavenged by contract, some have

Only 4 parishes have a direct labour scheme, and this requires

a rate of approximately 3\d. in the \(\ext{f} \).

During the year the refuse tips have received regular attention with gas or baits, in an endeavour to keep control of any rat infestation.
