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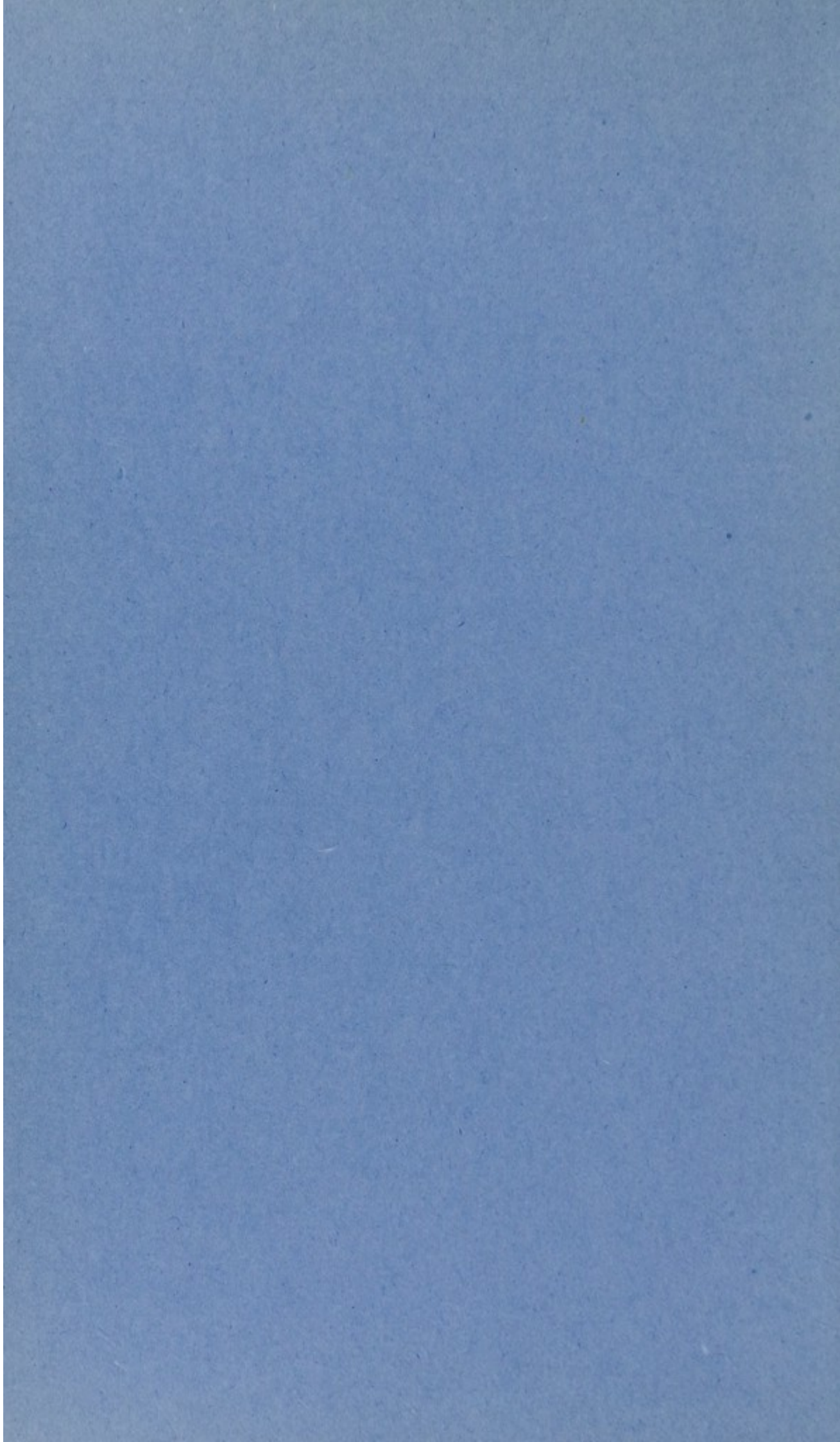

To the Chairman and Members of the Council

Mr. Chairman, Gentlemen,

It is with pleasure to submit to you the Annual Report on the health of the Urban District for 1968. It was my first full year as your Medical Officer of Health and was a year in which I gained a more intimate knowledge of the district and its problems.

The beginning of the year was marked by the departure of Mrs. Wright, the Chief Clerk in the Public Health Department, who had served the Council in a most efficient way for more than 20 years. We also lost an old friend and consultant paediatrician, Dr. Cedric Harvey who died suddenly.

The year was one of steady progress for we saw a change in the school health service which is hoped will provide a better service in the schools from which both the teachers and pupils will benefit, and the introduction of a new vaccine against measles as a routine procedure. The names of children born after 1st July in the division, will be place in the computer and they will be automatically called for immunisation and vaccination. We also saw in the clinics the first steps away from the routine weighing of babies to the noting of their development and deviations from normal development. This subject of the closer study of the developing child will expand in 1969 and I feel sure it will play a large part in the future work of the health visitor who is not like her colleague the district nurse, attached to general practices yet. The attachment of local authority health staff will be easier if the ideas put forward for Health Centres in Bentley bear fruit. The Pavilion is really unsuitable as a clinic, being far too public and offering poor facilities compared with the modern health centres in the West Riding.

The vital statistics are, once again, interesting though the figures are small and there could be wide fluctuations in them without any statistical significance. It is worth noting, however, that the number of domiciliary confinements have decreased and as this is a common feature all over the West Riding, it raises the question of the future of the domiciliary midwifery service.

I would like to thank Mr. Hay, the Chief Public Health Inspector, and Mrs. Sanderson, the Chief Clerk in the Health Department, as well as Mr. Vallance, the Chief Clerk in the Divisional Health Office, for their guidance and hard work during the year and finally I would like to thank you, Mr. Chairman, and members of the Council for the manner in which you have received my reports throughout the year.

The birth rate in 1968 followed the national trend and decreased from the previous year, though it still remains slightly higher than the national rate but not significantly so. The infant mortality, neo-natal mortality and early neo-natal mortality rates are all higher than the national figures but as we are dealing with a small population we are likely to get wide fluctuation with these rates for the district and the 1968 figures are not significantly different statistically.

It is, however, pleasing to note in the following table that there were again no maternal deaths in 1968.

DEATHS FROM ROAD ACCIDENTS AND OTHER VIOLENT CAUSES

There were six fatal road traffic accidents in the area, four suicide, and four people lost their lives through other accidents.

The death rate remained much the same in 1968 as in the previous year, and was again slightly more than the national figure. The major causes of death remain the same as in the previous years, Coronary artery disease, Cancer, Disease of the cerebral arteries and Bronchitis and Emphysema. There were no deaths from Tuberculosis in 1968.

COMMENTS ON VITAL STATISTICS

Population and Birth Rate

The steady increase in the population of the district was again maintained, the figure for 1968 being 23,860 as compared with 23,650 for 1967.

The illegitimate Live Births increased to 58, as compared with the figure of 57 in the previous year. The Moral Welfare Committee of the Archdeaconry of Doncaster and Rotherham continued to be most helpful in these cases, and arranged with financial assistance from the West Riding County Council, accommodation for unmarried mothers in homes, when requested.

Approximately every eighth child in the district is illegitimate.

(c) Maternity Home Accommodation

During 1968 the trend towards institutional confinement continued and whereas in 1967 one baby in seven was born at home in 1968 this had dropped to one in ten. There was also an increase in the number of women delivered in hospital and sent home between the second and fifth days after confinement. With the opening of the new Maternity Hospital in Doncaster in 1969 this trend will probably continue leaving the domiciliary midwifery service to do ante-natal and post-natal work with only a few deliveries.

Co-operation with General Practitioners

At the end of 1968 attachment of District Nurses to general practices was more or less complete and the closer co-operation has given an increase in the amount of work done with more patients seen and more visits carried out. As in previous years persons over 65 received more than 50 per cent of the visits. There was, however, no attachment of other local authority staff. Both general practitioners and District Nurses approved of attachment which seems to work well for the patients' benefit.

4. Home Helps

The equivalent of 87 full time Home Helps were employed in the Division, working a total of 181,873 hours and attending cases of whom 1,203 were over 65 years of age.

It is hoped that during 1969 a Home Help Organiser will be appointed to the division for there appears to be several anomalies in the service and I would like to see more help given to those in need and less to others for whom one or two hours weekly are largely wasted.

The Chiropody service is a valuable service and much appreciated by the elderly though I would say that six free treatments annually is in some cases quite inadequate, particularly the elderly where skilled care of the feet which have a restricted blood supply is important.

(2) **Meals Service**

The meals service by home helps cooking a subsidised meal for the elderly continued during 1968, but it is anticipated that as the Meals-on-Wheels service, organised by the Old People's Welfare Committee, develops it will take over this service and so permit the home help to give the elderly more assistance in keeping their homes clean and comfortable. I am sure that many of the elderly will miss the individual touch associated with this service if it goes.

(3) **Laundry Service**

- (a) The Homestead
- (b) Queen's View

Both these centres are equipped with washing machines, and in the case of Queen's View, a drying machine, for dealing with the washing of incontinent persons and in certain cases for the washing of persons unable to cope or make other satisfactory arrangements.

The machines were in operation for 472 hours during the year and the cases are recommended by the Home Nurses.

- (c) Blanket Service

Forty-five blankets were laundered at the local laundry during the year compared with 30 during 1967. The cost of the concessionary price of one shilling per blanket was borne by the Committee.

(4) **Visits to the Aged**

- (a) Don Valley High School
- (b) Bentley High Street, Secondary Modern School

These schemes have now been in operation for several years; the visits and assistance given by the school children are greatly appreciated by the aged of the district. The school children, I am sure, will also benefit from these visits.

(5) **Recreation Rooms for the Aged**

- (a) The Homestead
- (b) "Queen's View," Queen's Drive
- (c) "Hall Villa," Toll Bar
- (d) "Marsh Villa," Arksey

There are now four Recreation Rooms open in the area, and they all operate on similar lines — being open to any aged person residing in the area and a Committee of aged persons organising the social activities. All the events are supported with zeal, and the year's activities again reached a climax with the Christmas festivities.

All the centres are well furnished and equipped — including television sets and pianos. "Queen's View" differs from the other three centres in that there is a flat above for the resident Warden/Caretaker with an inter-communication system with the surrounding bungalows.

During 1969 we shall see the opening of the fifth recreation room at Piping Lane. This one is similar to the one at Queen's Drive in that it is beside a group of bungalows and a resident warden in the centre is linked by "inter-com" with the bungalows.

At the end of the year discussion was taking place on the provision of a workshop for retired men by the Old People's Welfare Committee, for frequently the men were sat in the television room whilst the ladies had sewing and handicraft classes in the main recreation rooms in the centres.

(7) **Warden Service for the Elderly**

Nineteen sixty eight again saw an expansion in this service, which is proving to be a valuable assistance in helping the elderly to remain in their own homes. The area is now adequately covered by a warden service, both for private and council houses.

6. MENTAL HEALTH SERVICE

During the year the staff was increased from two to three Mental Welfare Officers. Their work not only involves arranging admission of mentally ill patients to hospital but their after care and if possible, prevention of mental illness. If the mental welfare officer is to devote the time necessary for this work the establishment will need to be increased further for a division this size.

During the year 309 cases were referred and 136 were admitted to hospital.

The year 1968 saw a change in the School Health Service when the medical examinations at the age of 8, 12 and 15 were stopped and a selective medical inspection introduced at the age of 9 and a questionnaire and interview by the school doctor substituted for the school leaver's medical examination. The latter in particular proved to be valuable and appreciated by the pupils who were able to discuss health problems, particularly those associated with future employment. Hearing and vision are to be tested at 2 yearly intervals in school.

As seen from the table most of the defects discovered were hearing and visual, which are important to discover early because of the disability these cause in school.

PREVALENCE AND CONTROL OVER INFECTIOUS AND OTHER DISEASES

I am pleased to note that the number of children in the division receiving protection against Diphtheria, Whooping Cough, Tetanus, Poliomyelitis and Smallpox remains at a high level and it is hoped that by using a central computer for the West Riding that at least 90 per cent of children will receive protection against the aforementioned diseases.

No serious infectious diseases were notified during the year but this is not taken as a sign to relax vigilance, particularly in the field of food hygiene nor to reduce our efforts to seek 100 per cent protection against diseases which are endemic and where a satisfactory vaccine exists.

During 1968 the percentage of children under 16 fully protected against Diphtheria, Whooping Cough, Tetanus and Poliomyelitis remained at over 80 per cent. Children born after July had their names placed on the computer and I expect that this method of giving appointments for vaccination and immunisation will improve the already satisfactory percentage protected. Later in the year vaccination against measles was introduced which will become a routine procedure and so prevent a distressing and at times dangerous illness.

TUBERCULOSIS

During the year there were no deaths attributed to Pulmonary Tuberculosis.

Six new cases of Pulmonary Tuberculosis were notified compared with eleven cases in 1967.

The number of cases of Tuberculosis notified decreased this year and the number on the register decreased. With the modern treatment facilities available, the time when Tuberculosis will be defeated is drawing rapidly nearer.

Care and After-Care of Tuberculosis and Chest Conditions

A special Committee for this purpose has been established for several years. The Committee consists of lay members and representatives of the Medical Officers of Health in Doncaster and District. Financial assistance is given to the Committee by the West Riding County Council and the Doncaster County Borough.

It has been possible to help many cases with clothing, bedding, etc. The Committee carries out most useful work and the advice of the special Health Visitors for Tuberculosis is always available.

On the recommendation of the Consultant Physician, milk is provided free to all active Tuberculosis patients. Details of the action taken under the provisions of this scheme are given below:-

Towards the end of 1968 a much needed revision of the list of notifiable diseases came into use and one disease in particular, which has become commoner in the past few years, namely infective hepatitis, a virus infection of the liver, became notifiable.

A small outbreak of measles did occur in the late summer which is earlier than usual for it was hoped to introduce measles vaccine to prevent an outbreak later in the autumn. The vaccine did, however, help to prevent a further exacerbation early in 1969.

MASS RADIOGRAPHY

During February, the South Yorkshire Mass Radiography Unit visited the district and carried out a survey.

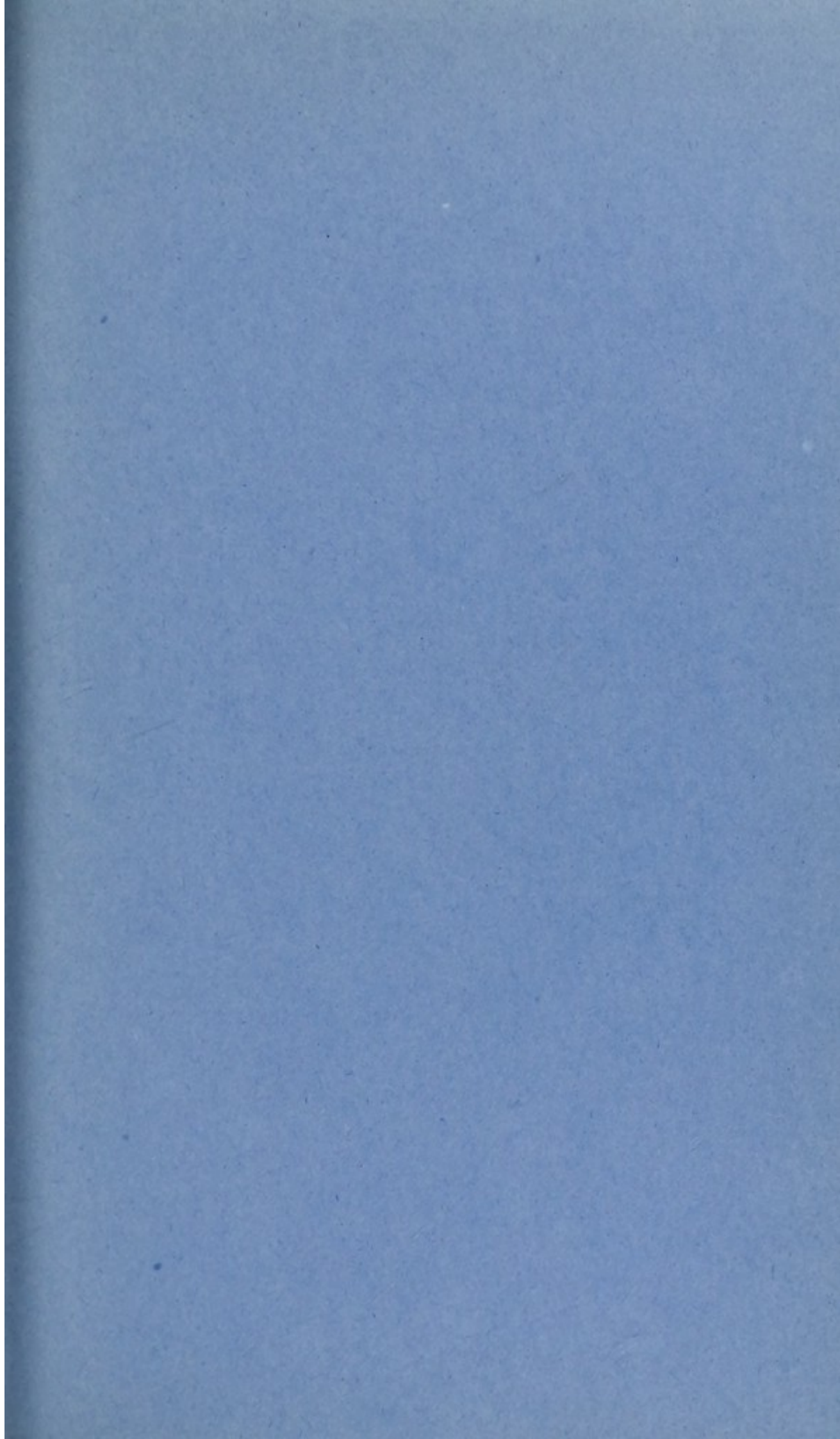
