

The number of deaths registered in the Beverley Urban Sanitary District during the twelve months ending 31st December, 1894, was 214, 193 in the Borough and 21 in the Workhouse; as against a total of 312 in the previous twelve months, and an average of 244 during the past 21 years.

The annual death rate from all causes for the year under notice was equal to 16.6 per thousand taken on a population of 12,877; the average death rate of the last 21 years being 20.7 per thousand on an average population of 11.742. The death rate for the year has been the lowest for the past 21 years, the years which nearest approached it being 1887 and 1877, when the death rate was 17.7 and 18 respectively.

The health of the town continued exceptionally good till December, when an epidemic of measles and a high mortality amongst the aged, raised the death rate considerably.

The mortality at all ages was below the average. The chief causes of death amongst children under 5 years of age were convulsions, want of vitality and measles: amongst old people, senile decay and cerebral diseases; and amongst people in mid-life, heart disease and consumption. Consumption accounted for 14 deaths as against 16 in the previous year. Respiratory diseases other than consumption occasioned 30 deaths, as against 59 in the previous year; the death rate from these diseases being 2.8 per thousand of the population; that of 1893 being 4.6 per thousand.

The number of deaths caused by these diseases during the year was 17 as against 51 in the previous year; the death rate per thousand of the population being 1.3, as against 3.9 in the previous year. They were distributed through the quarters as follows:—First quarter 4; second quarter 2; third quarter 1; fourth quarter 10. The deaths caused by the zymotic diseases were as follows:—

ENTERIC FEYER.—The number of cases notified were 8, occurring in 7 households, located as follows,—Landress Lane, Sloe Lane, Union Workhouse, Beckside, Eastgate, Enfields, and Wilbert Lane. The cases occurring in the first four households were imported, and need not be treated more minutely. The three latter houses were found to be sanitary on inspection; and on the smoke test being applied, the drains were found tight.

The cases of local origin were of a sporadic nature, the causes of which are difficult to trace. One death resulted from the disease giving a death rate of 0.07 per thousand of the population; the average death rate for 21 years being 0.33; the average for England and Wales for the same period being 0.28.

DIPHTHERIA.—Under this heading 11 cases were reported, 6 of which proved fatal. This gives an average death rate of 0.47 per thousand of the population; the average death rate for the past 21 years was 0.17 and for the past 11 years 0.28. From 1875 to 1884 no death occurred from this disease, but from this latter year forward there have been an unduly great number recorded. The reason of this prevalence of the disease in the past 11 years is difficult of explanation; but it was noticed that the majority of the houses in which it occurred presented gross sanitary defects either in drainage or ashpits.

MEASLES.—This not being a notifiable disease I am unable to state the number of cases that occurred in the town during the past year; but a severe epidemic which broke out in the latter part of November, occasioned 8 deaths in December. This was the greatest mortality due to the disease in any year during the past 21 years; the average for this period being 2 deaths per annum. The advisability of making this a notifiable disease is worthy of the consideration of your Committee. Had it been a notifiable disease, you would have early become cognizant of its existence amongst us; and you would have been able to limit, if not to prevent, the severe epidemic which has raged.

WHOOPING COUGH.—Two deaths are due to this disease, giving a death rate of 0.11 per thousand of the population. The average mortality during the past 21 years is 1.7 per annum.

FOOD INSPECTION.

The markets have been regularly inspected, but no meat, fish, or fruit has been condemned during the year, as all offered for sale has been good.

SANITATION.

The two principal Sanitary Reforms during the year were the introduction of Flushing Chambers, the location of which has been given in the Inspector of Nuisance's Report and the cleaning of the Walker Beck. The flushing of the sewers, when efficiently carried out should tend materially to improve the sanitation of the town, and consequently decrease the mortality. There can be no doubt that a quick carriage of sewage to the point of outfall is absolutely necessary, and, as a result, the health of the town should be much benefited.

7 Notices were issued for "Defective Drainage." 1 Notice was issued for "Pigs being kept too near dwelling house."

With the exception of a small portion in St. John Street the Walker Beck has been thoroughly cleansed and all the drains diverted.

At an inspection of the Walker Beck where it crosses Toll Gavel, the storm water was found to be absolutely clear and did not show the slightest trace of sewage contamination.

- 21 Street Gullies which were found to be built of indifferent brick-work and-untrapped have been removed and earthenware gullies substituted.
- 5 Street Gullies in Albert Terrace which were found to be connected with the house drains have been removed and replaced with earthenware trapped gullies, the house drains being disconnected and joined to the Main Sewer.
- 6 Flushing Chambers have been introduced at the following places, viz:—Molescroft Road, York Terrace, St. Giles's Croft, Lair Gate, Slea Lane, and Cross Street, and other two will be laid down during the spring.
