5.—SUMMARY OF NURSING ARRANGEMENTS,

HOSPITALS, AND OTHER INSTITUTIONS AVAILABLE FOR THE DISTRICT.

1.—PROFESSIONAL NURSING IN THE HOME.

- (a) General.—The Beverley Town Nursing Association which is supported by voluntary subscriptions, maintains one Trained Nurse, and the Corporation subscribes 10 guineas a year to it.
- (b) Infectious.—The District Nurse is available for nursing cases of Measles as required.

2.—MIDWIVES.

There are three Certificated Midwives practising in the Borough. One is maintained by the Town Nursing Association, and the Corporation subscribes 25 guineas a year towards her Salary.

3.—CLINICS AND TREATMENT CENTRES.

There is a Maternity and Child Welfare Centre, and a School Clinic, both of which are maintained and managed by the Corporation, and are situated at 16, Lairgate. The Maternity Centre is open each Wednesday, at 2-30 p.m., and the average attendance was 24.

There is a Tuberculosis Dispensary provided by the East Riding County Council, and situated in Register Square.

The Centre for the treatment of Venereal Diseases is provided by the County Council at the Royal Infirmary, Hull.

4.—Hospitals Provided or Subsidised by the Local Authority or the County Council.

- 1. Tuberculosis.—The County Council Sanatorium at Raywell is available for Patients from Beverley.
 - 2. Maternity.—None available.
- 3. Children.—The Beverley Cottage Hospital takes in cases of Pneumonia, and Infantile Diarrhoea, by arrangement with the Medical Officer of Health, and the Council pays one guinea a week for such cases, if the parents are not able to afford to defray the cost.

Cases of Ophthalmia Neonatorum are also admitted, together with the mother.

- 4. Fever.—No Fever Hospital exists, but the Council have been in communication with the County Council, with a view to obtaining treatment of cases at the Driffeld Hospital.
- 5. Small Pox.—There is a Small-pox Hospital which can accommodate 8 Patients. It is the property of the Corporation, and is situated in Queensgate.

5.—AMBULANCE FACILITIES.

There is a Motor Ambulance provided by the Red Cross, and kept in the town under the care of the County Council.

6.—LABORATORY WORK.

Pathological and Bacteriological Examinations are carried out by the Clinical Research Association. During the year the following examinations were made:—Specimens of Sputum, 27; Swabs from the Throat and Nose, 60; specimens of Blood for Enteric, 2.

Anti-Diphtheric Serum is provided free in all cases.

The Dairies, Milk Shops and Cowsheds have been regularly inspected, and found to be in a satisfactory condition.

The Butchers' Shops and Slaughter Houses have been visited several times each week.

8.—PUBLIC HEALTH STAFF.

The Staff consists of one part-time Medical Officer, one part-time Veterinary Inspector, one whole-time Sanitary Inspector, and one whole-time Health Visitor, who also acts as School Nurse. The Sanitary Inspector has one man, who is engaged in inspecting Ash-pits, and in supervising the work of the Contractors.
