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

BEVERLEY MUNICIPAL BOROUGH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH FOR 1965

To the Chairman and Members of the Beverley Borough Council.

I have the honour to submit my Annual Report on the state of the Public Health for 1965.

Vital Statistics

The principal causes of death remain the same as in recent years, namely heart disease, various forms of cancer and vascular lesions of the nervous system. Coronary disease and angina are the largest single cause of death accounting for more than 25% of the total deaths in the Borough. The corrected death rate for the town is 12.99 per 1,000 residents compared with a rate of 11.5 for England and Wales as a whole.

The infant mortality rate has risen to 25.16, but as the total numbers concerned are relatively small, no specific conclusions can be drawn from this increase.

Infectious Diseases

There were no serious outbreaks of infectious diseases in the town.

The biennial increase in the number of cases of measles has accounted for 207 out of the total of 216 infectious diseases notified during the year.

Vaccination against measles is now available, but it is not yet recommended that this vaccine should be generally used as a routine for all children. Parents wishing to have their children vaccinated against measles can obtain this through their family Doctor.

Seven new cases of Pulmonary Tuberculosis were notified, four males and three females. All possible contacts in such cases are followed up and are persuaded to attend the Chest Clinic for examination and X-Ray.

The Mass Radiography Unit visits the town each year in the early summer, and open sessions are held at which any member of the public may attend.

Water and Sewage Disposal

The town obtains its water supply from the Hull Corporation. The quality and quantity of this has been satisfactory in all respects. Samples of water are taken at regular intervals for bacteriological and chemical analysis, details of which are given in the Public Health Inspector's section of this report.

A considerable amount of work and consultation has been carried out in connection with the proposed new sewerage scheme for the town. The facilities at the present works for the disposal of sludge have been extended to the maximum during the last twelve months, and emergency arrangements had to be made to cope with this problem. In connection with this new sewerage scheme, investigations have been made into the possibility of de-hydrating the sludge so that it can be more easily and hygienically disposed of, and this is a practical proposition which will be fully considered by the Council.

Common Lodging Houses

There is one common lodging house in the town which accommodates up to 37 residents. This establishment has always been maintained in a satisfactory manner and serves a useful purpose as a temporary residence for certain itinerant members of the community and for other more permanent residents who have no alternative accommodation.

Factories Act, 1961

The detailed particulars under Part I, and Part VIII of the Factories Act which are administered by the Council are set out on page 13 of the report.

I should like to express my thanks to the Chairman, the Chief Public Health Inspector and all Members and Officials of the Council for their continued help and assistance during the year.

BEVERLEY BOROUGH VITAL STATISTICS

Population. The Registrar General's estimate of the population at mid-1965 was 16,730, an increase of 200 over the previous year.

Births. Of the 318 live births during the year 167 were males and 151 females, and the birth rate was 19.2 compared with 18.76 in 1964. There were 11 illegitimate births, 4 boys and 7 girls, 4 fewer than in the previous year.

Still Births. There were 5 still births, a decrease of one.

Deaths. The total number of deaths was 211 (98 males and 113 females), an increase of 27 and the death rate was 12.99, 1.41 higher than in 1964.

Infant Mortality. Eight children died before the age of one year and the rate per 1,000 live births was 25.16 compared with 9.77 in 1964.

Tuberculosis deaths. There were no deaths from tuberculosis during the year.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA

Laboratory Facilities. Specimens for pathological examination were sent to the Laboratory at the Westwood Hospital, Beverley, and the Public Health Laboratory in Hull.

Bacteriological and biological examination of milk, water and icecream were carried out by the Public Laboratory in Hull.

Ambulance Facilities. The conveyance of all cases (including infectious diseases) is the responsibility of the County Council as the Local Health Authority.

Clinics. Tuberculosis: A Clinic was held each Thursday at the Chest Clinic, Westwood Hospital, Beverley.

Venereal Disease: Clinics were held daily at the Clinic, Mill Street, Hull.

TUBERCULOSIS

Seven new cases of pulmonary tuberculosis were notified during the year. Four were males aged 2, 30, 33 and 64 years, and three were females aged 7, 31 and 38 years.

One new case of non-pulmonary tuberculosis came to notice, a 59 year-old man.

PUBLIC HEALTH ACT 1936

Water Supply

26 samples of the town's water were taken for bacteriological examination during the year. Three samples showed small bacteriological counts, but subsequent sampling showed the contamination to be local and temporary.

Of the 5,538 inhabited houses in the town, an estimated number of 130 still had no internal water supply.

Common Lodging Houses

The registered common lodging-house in the Borough was visited 13 times during the year and was found to be satisfactorily conducted.

The Council continued to charge for the inspection of meat intended for food where inspection had to be carried out outside normal working hours. The maximum charges allowed by the Regulations were imposed and receipts over the year amounted to £54 10s. 6d.

4 samples of water lollies were submitted for bacteriological examination, all of which were satisfactory.

Prevention of Damage by Pests Act, 1949

Routine work under this Act was carried out systematically during the year by the Rodent Operator. Treatments were given to 37 Business premises, I Local Authority premises and 132 dwelling-houses in the town, and at all these premises an estimated number of 770 rats were killed.

The number of visits made to the various premises for carrying out these treatments was 943, but in addition to this, further time was spent in survey work in the town generally.

Petroleum Acts and Orders

At the end of the year, 37 premises were licensed to store petroleum spirit and I to store carbide of calcium.

Offices, Shops and Railway Premises Act, 1963

Work under this Act occupied quite a substantial part of the Department's activities during the year and by the end of it the initial inspections were substantially completed, 235 premises receiving their first inspection. In only 21 cases were premises considered to be seriously deficient. By the end of the year the necessary alterations or improvements had been carried out, or the necessary orders placed, in respect of 139 premises.

HOUSING ACT, 1961

Houses in Multiple Occupation

During the year the Council adopted standards of occupation and amenity to be applied to Houses in Multiple Occupation under the above Act and 9 premises received a first inspection.
