Divisional Health Office, Manor Road, Beverley July, 1971

To the Mayor, Alderman and Councillors of the Borough of Beverley

Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting my Annual Report for the year 1970.

The Registrar General's figures for the year 1970 indicates a midyear population of 17,220 a decrease of 100 compared with last year.

During the year there were 287 births and 200 deaths compared with 320 births and 215 deaths last year. The adjusted birth rate for the Borough of 16.9 compares with a national birth rate of 16.0 per 1,000 population and an adjusted death rate of 11.8 compares with the national death rate of 11.7 per 1,000 population.

Once again, diseases of the heart and circulatory system and malignant neoplasms were the major causes of death, ischaemic heart disease being the greatest single cause.

There were three infant deaths, all under the age of one week, due to the hazards of birth.

A number of infectious diseases occurred during the year, measles being outstanding. Three hundred and thirty-nine cases were notified, the majority occurring between the months of May, June, July and August and all but two being children under 10 years of age. There were two cases of pulmonary tuberculosis notified indicating that while this disease might not be so serious as in the past it is an infectious disease which is still with us.

Water continued to be supplied by the Hull Corporation and 160 samples taken for bacteriological examination by the Hull Corporation from three points in Beverley proved satisfactory. Your Public Health Inspectors took 16 water samples from private bore holes 3 of which proved unsatisfactory and 48 samples of swimming bath water, one of which proved unsatisfactory.

Procedures under the Housing Act continued during the year, 4 unfit houses being demolished and 26 houses being subject to closing orders or slum clearance procedure. During the year 44 houses were erected, or in the course of erection, by private enterprises.

One hundred per cent inspection of meat killed in the Borough continued during the year, in spite of the number of animals killed increasing to 8,250 compared with 4,220 last year.

In presenting this report, may I express my thanks to the staff of the Department for their work during the year and to the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee for their constant interest and support.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA

HOSPITAL SERVICES

Hospitals in the Borough are under the East Riding Hospital Management Committee and are as follows:

Westwood Hospital

This hospital has 235 beds and provides facilities for general medical, surgical, orthopaedic, paediatric and maternity cases.

Beverley Cottage Hospital

This hospital has 20 beds for gynaecological cases.

Miniature Mass Radiography

The Miniature Mass Radiography Unit of the Leeds Regional Hospital Board visited the Borough once a fortnight and held public and private sessions. A total of 239 persons were examined.

NURSING HOMES

There are no Nursing Homes registered under the Public Health Act 1936 within the Borough.

NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948

Part III. Accommodation

Accommodation is provided by the County Council at Minster Towers and Langholme. These homes together have beds for 66 elderly persons.

It was not necessary to take proceedings under this section during the year.

LOCAL HEALTH AUTHORITY SERVICES

The following services are provided in the Borough by the East Riding County Council as the Local Health Authority:

Infant Welfare Clinics

Infant Welfare Clinics are held at the Lord Roberts Road Clinic and Coltman Avenue Clinic. At Lord Roberts Road, General Practitioners held closed sessions on Tuesday afternoons and open sessions were held on Thursday afternoons, while at the Infant Welfare Clinic, Coltman Avenue, General Practitioners held closed sessions on

Thursday afternoons, and open sessions were held on Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday afternoons.

Domiciliary Midwifery Service

During the year 4 Nurse/Midwives working in the Borough attended 10 domiciliary births.

Health Visiting

Six Health Visitors work within the Borough having offices at the Divisional Health Office, Manor Road; the Medical Room, Longcroft School; and Coltman Avenue Clinic.

Home Nursing Service

This service is run in conjunction with the Domiciliary Midwifery Service and 6 Nurses (4 of whom are also Midwives) work in the Borough.

Ambulance Service

The County Council's Ambulance Station is situated in Grovehill Road (telephone number 881198).

Domestic Help

Home Help service rendered in the Borough is administered at County Hall, Beverley, and all applications for the service are dealt with by the Home Help Organiser (telephone number 881281).

LOCAL EDUCATION AUTHORITY SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICE

Routine medical inspections are carried out of all children attending Local Education Authorities' schools in the Borough, In addition the following facilities are provided by the County Council.

Dental Clinic Monday-Friday 9.30 a.m. to 12 noon and

Minor Ailment Clinic Daily 9 a.m. to 9.30 a.m.

Speech Therapy in Beverley on Wednesday afternoon and Friday all day at County Hall, Beverley, by arrangement by the Speech Therapist.

OTHER SERVICES

Holderness Health Division's Co-ordinating Committee

Once every two or three months this Co-ordinating Committee under the aegis of the County Council, met in Beverley to co-ordinate the work of officers in the district who were concerned with the welfare of children. The primary objects of the Committee were the prevention of cruelty to children in their own homes and the

prevention of break-up of families.

On the Committee were representatives of the County Children's Department, the County Health Department, the School Welfare Department, the County Welfare Department, the Housing Managers of the District Councils, the Ministry of Social Security, the National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children, the Women's Royal Voluntary Service, the Police Force and Probation Officers. Your Medical Officer of Health in his capacity as Divisional Medical Officer took the Chair at this Committee.

Public Health Laboratory Service

Specimens for bacteriological examination are sent to the Public Health Laboratory at the Hull Royal Infirmary, Hull.

Family Planning Association

The Family Planning Association held clinics on Friday mornings 10.30 a.m. to 11.30 a.m. and the first, second and fourth Wednesday evenings 7 p.m. to 8.30 p.m.

Cervical Cytology

East Riding County Council holds cervical cytology sessions in Beverley according to demand.

Action during the year relating to unfit houses

The occupants of 13 unfit houses were re-housed during the year and 4 houses included in Clearance Areas were demolished. 10 individual Closing Orders were made and 3 Clearance Areas, comprising 14 houses, were declared. 2 unfit houses belonging to the Council were also closed.

Houses in Multiple Occupation

A further 6 houses were brought up to standard during the year and 2 were under investigation and improvement. At the end of the year there were 51 houses in multiple occupation in the town.

Improvement Areas

The investigation of potential Improvement Areas continued during the year but eventually it had to be accepted that for the moment at least, no area in the town proved to be suitable for such treatment.

Of the 6,063 inhabited houses in the town, an estimated number of 100 still had no internal water supply.

RODENT CONTROL

Routine work under this Act was carried out systematically during the year by the Rodent Operator. Treatments were given to 45 business premises, I I local authority premises and 91 dwelling-houses in the town, and at all these premises an estimated number of 415 rats were killed.

The number of visits made to the various premises for carrying out these treatments was 600 but in addition to this, further time was

spent in survey work in the town generally.

167 sewer manholes, selected to give a comprehensive record of the town sewerage system, were tested for rats during the year. The degree of infestation was found to be low and confined to the town centre and western side of the town. In future treatments, special attention will be given to these areas.

OFFICES, SHOPS AND RAILWAY PREMISES ACT 1963

Routine work continued under this Act during the year at the end of which we had 263 registered premises in the town employing a total work force of 1,232 persons. 2 accidents were reported during the year consisting of lacerations. These were reported to the Ministry of Labour under the Accidents Recording and Investigation Service which they operate.

PETROLEUM ACTS AND ORDERS

At the end of the year 34 premises were licensed to store petroleum spirit and I to store carbide of calcium.

The importance of strict control of petroleum installations was demonstrated during the year when a potentially dangerous position developed due to a very serious leakage of petrol at one installation. The source of the trouble was traced to two defective tanks which were immediately taken out of use and later replaced.
