To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Beverley
Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting my Annual Report for the year 1972.

The Registrar General's figures for the year 1972 indicates a mid-year population of 17,050 a decrease of 80 compared with

last year.

During the year there were 275 live births and 213 deaths compared with 304 live births and 171 deaths last year. The adjusted birth rate for the Borough of 16.3 compares with the national birth rate of 14.8 per 1,000 population and an adjusted death rate for the Borough of 12.3 compares with a national death rate of 12.1 per 1000 population.

Diseases of the heart and circulatory system and malignant neoplasms continued to be the major causes of death. Ischaemic heart disease remained the greatest single cause, and of the deaths due to cancer, the lung and bronchus were the commonest site of

origin.

There were two deaths of infants under one year of age,

both due to congenital anomalies.

There was an increase during the year in the infectious diseases notified which was almost entirely due to an increased incidence of measles.

Few changes occurred in the sanitary circumstances during the year. Water continued to be supplied by Hull Corporation and 29 samples of the Towns water supply taken by the Public Health Inspector proved satisfactory. Thirteen samples were taken from 3 private bores and all but one were satisfactory. This one proved satisfactory when repeated.

Routine work continued on housing, as did routine inspection of food premises and inspection of 100% of meat killed in the

Borough.

In presenting this report, may I express my thanks to the staff of the Department for their work during the year and to the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee for their constant interest and support.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA

Hospital Services

Hospitals in the Borough are under the East Riding Hospital Management Committee and are as follows:—

Westwood Hospital

This hospital has 235 beds and provides facilities for general medical, surgical, orthopaedic, paediatric and maternity cases.

Beverley Cottage Hospital

This hospital has 20 beds for gynaecological cases.

Miniature Mass Radiography Manual & 1884 and points

The Miniature Mass Radiography Unit of the Leeds Regional Hospital Board visited the Borough once a fortnight and held public and private sessions.

NURSING HOMES

There are no Nursing Homes registered under the Public Health Act 1936 within the Borough.

NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948

Part III Accommodation

Accommodation is provided by the County Council at Minster Towers and Langholme. These homes together have beds for 66 elderly persons.

Section 47

One patient was moved to hospital under the National Assistance (Amendment) Act, 1951.

LOCAL HEALTH AUTHORITY SERVICES

The following services are provided in the Borough by the East Riding County Council as the Local Health Authority.

Infant Welfare Clinics

Infant Welfare Clinics are held at the Lord Roberts Road Clinic and Coltman Avenue Clinic. At Lord Roberts Road, General Practitioners held closed sessions on Tuesday afternoons and open sessions were held on Thursday afternoons, while at the Infant Welfare Clinic, Coltman Avenue, General Practitioners held closed sessions on Thursday afternoons, and open sessions were held on Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday afternoons.

Home Nursing Service

This service is run in conjunction with the Domiciliary Midwifery Service and 7 Nurses (5 of whom are also Midwives) work in the Borough.

Ambulance Service

The County Council's Ambulance Station is situated in Grovehill Road (Telephone number 881198).

Domestic Help

Home Help service rendered in the Borough is administered at County Hall, Beverley, and all applications for the service are dealt with by the Home Help Organiser (telephone number 881281).
