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

SECTION "B"

General Provision of Health Services for the Area

Bacteriological examinations of samples taken from producers and manufacturers, and all chemical examinations of food, milk and water are carried out by the Worcestershire County Council Laboratory. Bacteriological examinations of consumer samples of milk, water and ice-cream are undertaken by the Public Health Laboratory of the Worcester Royal Infirmary, in addition to the routine clinical pathology.

Ambulance Service

This is provided by the Worcestershire County Council as Local Health Authority, and is based on Kidderminster.

Home Nursing and Health Visiting

There are two District Nurses available in the Borough, one each for Bewdley and Wribbenhall. There is also one whole-time Health Visitor.

Clinics

An Infant Welfare Clinic is also held fortnightly, with a doctor in attendance monthly, when Diphtheria immunisation and vaccination are carried out.

Hospitals

The following hospitals administered by the Midland Regional Hospital Board are available:

 The Kidderminster General Hospital for general medical and surgical cases.

2. The Blakebrook Hospital.

3. The Hayley Green Isolation Hospital for Infectious Diseases.

4. The Lucy Baldwin Maternity Hospital at Stourport.

5. The Croft Maternity Home.

Tuberculosis

- Treatment.—A dispensary is held twice weekly at the Kidderminster General Hospital, and there are Sanatoria at Knightwick and St. Wulstans, Malvern.
- (2) Prevention and After-Care.—Preventive measures of this disease are the responsibility of the County Council and are carried out under the direction of the County Medical Officer.

An After-care Sub-Committee administers this service in this district in conjunction with the other districts in the Kidderminster Divisional Area.

Venereal Disease

A treatment centre is operated at the Kidderminster General Hospital by the Regional Hospital Board.

Domestic Help Service

Under arrangements made by the Local Health Authority, Home Help Service has been established in the district and is administered locally by the Women's Voluntary Service. At the end of the year, 4 full-time, 20 part-time and 2 occasional home helps were employed, and 55 Chronic, 30 General and 8 Maternity cases received attention. This has proved a most valuable service to the community in cases of need in the various types of domestic emergency.

Section 47, National Assistance Act, 1948

No action has been taken by the Council under this section during the year.

SECTION "C"

Sanitary Circumstances of the Area

Water Supply

- 1. The water supply has been satisfactory both in quality and quantity.
- 2. Samples of water for bacteriological analysis are taken monthly and for complete chemical analysis twice yearly.
- 3. The water is not plumbo-solvent.
- No action was necessary for any form of contamination of the piped water supply.
- 5a. The number of houses supplied from the public water mains direct to houses is 1,545. Population served approximately 5,051.
- 5b. 41 houses are supplied from standpipes; population served approximately 134. 17 houses obtain water from private supplies; population served approximately 56.

Extension of Supply

A new 20" x 361' borehole, delivering 60,000 gallons per hour, came into operation in October, 1955. This additional source adds to the security of the Undertaking by ensuring an adequate supply, in case of a breakdown of either pump, to meet the needs of the Borough and Stourport U.D.C. Supply mains are now being extended to parts of Droitwich R.D.C., and the Council is capable of supplying other areas if desired.

Drainage and Sewerage

The greater part of the district has a sewer available. Sewage flows partly by gravitation and partly by pumping from three compressed air ejectors to the Sewage Pumping Station, where, after screening, it is pumped to the Kidderminster Joint Outfall Works for treatment. No serious nuisance has occurred during the year concerning the drainage system in general.

Negotiations concerning mains sewerage facilities to properties in the Bark Hill area proceeded satisfactorily, but it did not prove possible to include all dwellings originally intended. A 4" drain was extended approximately 100 yards up the Racks Steps and two houses were connected. There is every probability that a third house will also be connected in the near future.

SECTION "D"
Housing

Sixty new houses were completed by the Corporation during the year. Seven new houses were completed and one large old house

was converted into three flats by private enterprise.

The preliminary survey of all sub-standard property within the district was completed during the year and resulted in a total number of 108 dwellings being shown on the Ministry return as requiring clearance within the first five years. The Council has been unable to decide upon the number of unfit properties to be dealt with under the Housing Acts in the first and subsequent years of the five year period. The difficulty appears to be the method of financing the building of suitable type dwellings for the persons displaced by the Slum Clearance programme. Further action by the Health Department must await resolution of this difficulty by the Council. Considerable delay seems inevitable before any such accommodation is, in fact, available.

Caravan Sites

There are now four sites authorised under The Town & Country Planning Act, 1947. These are at:—

(1) The Brant Farm, Upper Blackstone;

(2) Hursts Meadow, Northwood Lane; (3) Council Hill Camp, Cleobury Road;

(4) Riverside Caravan Park, Dowles Road; and allow a combined total of 360 Caravans.

The site of the Riverside Caravan Park was acquired by the County Council during the previous year, and, after having planned the site and provided modern conveniences, sub-let the Park to Messrs. Becketts of Bromsgrove.

An excellent water carriage system of toilet accommodation was provided at the Brant Farm Caravan Site during the year. It is to be hoped that the only site now without this type of accommodation (at Hursts Meadow) will be so provided within the near future.

It is considered desirable that all sites should operate under Public Health Act licences, in addition to any planning permission that may obtain.

County Council action has continued, whenever possible, to

secure the removal of unsuitable structures.

SECTION "E" Inspection and Supervision of Food

Food Hygiene Regulations, 1955

These Regulations were issued during the last few days of the year, and came into force less than a week later. Such short notice, unfortunately, did not allow time for personal visits to those concerned, but every encouragement is now being given to the proprietors of these establishments to comply with the Regulations. Meat Inspection

Three slaughterhouses were re-licensed in July, though two only are in regular use. Meat Inspection Services and general supervision of Food Premises were carried out by the Sanitary Inspector

during the year. See Sanitary Inspector's Report.

No action was necessary, or taken, with regard to Tuberculous Employees in the milk trade.

Conclusion

The services provided in the Borough are generally satisfactory. However, the collection of refuse by means of an open lorry is considered to be most unhygienic. The Council should consider, at an early date, the provision of a suitable type of closed vehicle for this important and expanding service, as it would now appear necessary for such a vehicle to be employed full-time on this work.

SANITARY INSPECTOR'S REPORT For the year ending 31st December, 1955

HOUSING

As reported by the Medical Officer of Health, the preliminary survey of sub-standard property was completed during the year. The figures thus provided were submitted to, and approved by, the Minister of Heusing and Local Government in July as required under Section 1 of the Housing Repairs and Rents Act, 1954.

Summary of Work of the department.

Squatters Camps

Regular maintenance work is still necessary to keep the Dog Lane Camp in a habitable condition, in spite of the fact that several families were re-housed during the year. It is hoped that the present rate of re-housing will be continued and the whole site vacated and cleared in the near future.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD

A total number of 236 visits were made to food premises during the year. This included 170 visits made for the purpose of meat inspection at slaughterhouses, etc. These inspections are carried out at the time of slaughtering whenever possible or as soon practicable afterwards. A detailed register is kept of all animals slaughtered and inspected within the Borough, together with details of meat condemned and the reasons therefor.

The table set out below indicates the number of carcases inspected as against the number slaughtered.

The high percentage of cattle as shown affected with disease other than tuberculosis was due mainly to the high incidence of distornatosis.

The total quantity of meat and offal condemned at slaughter-houses during the year ended 31st December, 1955, was 9cwt. 8½lbs.

Method of disposal of condemned food is by incineration, except in the cast of meat and offal at slaughterhouses. This is stained green, as recommended, and collection made by authorised dealers.

The defect causing the failure to pass the Phosphatase Test was a faulty gasket in the separating mechanism. The County Sampling Officer agreed that, though regrettable, it was almost unavoidable. Subsequent tests proved satisfactory.

Milk and Dairies Regulations, 1949

No action was necessary regarding cessation of supplies from infected premises (Reg. 20). In this connection, the Borough is now a Specified Area in accordance with the Milk (Special Designation) (Specified Areas) (No. 2 Order) 1954.

Ice-Cream

No applications have been received during the year for registration of premises for the manufacture of Ice-cream, and only one dealer remains on the register as such. Twenty-four retailers are registered for the sale of Ice-cream, many of whom deal only in pre-packed products.

Four samples were taken during the year and submitted for Bacteriological Analysis, and these proved satisfactory.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND SALVAGE

House refuse is collected weekly in the town and fortnightly in the more outlying areas. The present method of disposal is by controlled tipping, the site used being approximately $1\frac{1}{4}$ miles from the town centre. A dual purpose is served here, in that valuable agricultural land is being reclaimed by the infilling of a deep ravine, and it is estimated that approximately 2,000 square yards of this land will be handed back to the owner in the near future after the necessary soil coverage, etc., has been completed.

In addition to house refuse, trade refuse is collected and disposed of, the average collection amounting to approximately 2 tons per week. A limited amount of trade refuse is retained for salvage (cartons, containers, etc.) and a total quantity of 15 tons 2 cwt. was collected and sold during the year.

The issue of municipal ashbins commenced in April, and by the end of the year 98 of these bins had been distributed. It was particularly unfortunate that the Government decided to apply Purchase Tax to these goods as, owing to the fixed amount being allotted for this service, the number of bins available is thereby reduced by one third.
