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

Industry within the Borough is on a small scale, the area being mainly residential. The principal source of local employment is a factory processing Animal Feeding Stuffs, Seeds, Fertilisers, etc., where 85 persons were employed during 1963.

Other sources of employment, besides Agricultural, include a Saw Mill and, remaining from the traditional Bewdley industries, a Brass Foundry, Rope Works and Leather Works.

SECTION "B"

General Provision of Health Services for the Area

Hospitals

The following hospitals administered by the Midland Regional

Hospital Board are available:-

- The Kidderminster General Hospital for general medical and surgical cases.
- 2. The Blakebrook Hospital.
- 3. The Hayley Green Isolation Hospital for Infectious Diseases.
- 4. The Lucy Baldwin Maternity Hospital at Stourport.
- 5. The Croft Maternity Home.

Ambulance Service

This is provided by the Worcestershire County Council as Local Health Authority.

A system of radio control, based on Worcester, deals with all applications, including emergency calls. At the same time the station at Kidderminster gives a 24 hour service.

Clinics

An Infant Welfare Clinic is held fortnightly with a doctor in attendance monthly, when diphtheria immunisation and vaccination are carried out.

Separate sessions are arranged for poliomyelitis immunisation for those age groups eligible.

Tuberculois

- (1) Treatment A dispensary is held twice weekly at the Kidderminster General Hospital.
- (2) Prevention and After Care Preventive measures of this disease are the responsibility of the County Council and are carried out under the direction of the County Medical Officer.

An After-Care Sub-Committee administers this service in the district in conjunction with other districts in the Kidderminster Divisional Area.

Venereal Disease

A treatment centre is operated at the Kidderminster General Hospital by the Regional Hospital Board.

Home Nursing and Health Visiting

There are two District Nurses available in the Borough, one each for Bewdley and Wribbenhall. There is also one whole-time Health Visitor.

Section 47, National Assistance Act, 1948

No action has been taken by the Council under this section during the year.

Domestic Help Service

The Home Help Service continues to be administered by the Women's Voluntary Service. At the end of the year 1 full-time and 14 part-time home helps were employed and 72 Chronic and 1 Maternity cases received attention. The majority of Chronic cases were old persons.

SECTION "C"

Sanitary Circumstances in the Area

Water Supply

Water is supplied to the Borough by the North West Worcestershire Water Board.

My department continues to exercise supervision over the bacteriological quality of water supplies within the Borough.

The water is not plumbo-solvent and no action has been

necessary for any form of contamination in mains supply.

The number of houses supplied from the public water mains direct to the house is 1,764, and the population served is approximately 5,200. 28 houses are supplied from standpipes and the population served is approximately 70. Four houses obtain water from private sources and the population served is approximately 12.

SECTION "D" Housing

Slum Clearance

Official Representations were submitted in regard to four dwellings during the year.

Caravan Sites

Four sites are authorised under the Caravan Sites and Control of Development Act, 1960. These are at:—

- (1) The Brant Farm, Upper Blackstone.
- (2) Hursts Meadow, Northwood Lane.
- (3) Hillcroft Trailer Park, Cleobury Road.(4) Riverside Caravan Park, Dowles Road.

Permits now allow a combined total of 474 caravans.

SECTION "E"

Inspection and Supervision of Food

Bacteriological examinations of samples taken from producers and manufacturers, and all chemical examinations of food, milk and water are carried out by the Worcestershire County Council Laboratory. Bacteriological examinations of consumer samples of milk, water and ice-cream are undertaken by the Public Health Laboratory of the Worcester Royal Infirmary, in addition to the routine clinical pathology.

Food Poisoning

No cases of Food Poisoning or Suspected Food Poisoning were notified during the year.

Meat Inspection

Meat Inspection Services and general supervision of Food Premises were carried out by the Public Health Inspector during the year. (See Public Health Inspector's Report).

PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTOR'S REPORT

Year 1963

Madam Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen.

I have pleasure in submitting my Annual Report for the year ended 31st December, 1963.

HOUSING

As reported by the Medical Officer of Health, Official Representations were made in regard to 4 Sub-standard dwellings within the Borough.

Details of housing inspections are contained in the summary of work of the department.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD

There are 81 food shops and other food-preparing premises within the district. The majority of these premises were visited at least once during the year and others more frequently as required.

Meat Inspection

Four Slaughtermen's licences were renewed during the year.
Two Slaughterhouses were re-licensed in July.

A total number of 229 visits made to food premises during the year included visits made to slaughterhouses for meat inspection purposes. These inspections are carried out at the time of slaughtering whenever possible or as soon as practicable afterwards.

Slaughterhouses Report

The Slaughter of Animals (Prevention of Cruelty) Regulations (Appointed Day) (No. 2) Order, 1962 and The Slaughterhouses (Hygiene) Regulations (Appointed Day) (No. 2) Order, 1962.

The two Slaughterhouses licensed within the District complied with the requirements of these Orders and were re-licensed during the year.

Condemned Food

The total quantity of meat and offal condemned at slaughterhouses during the year amounted to 3 cwt. 1 qtr. 19 lb.

Method of disposal of condemned food is by incineration, except in the case of meat and offal at slaughterhouses. This is stained green, as recommended, and collection made by authorised dealers.

These figures are taken from the annual return as required by the Ministry and do not indicate the actual number of treatments carried out. The Corporation tip, for example, requires fortnightly attention at least, but is shown only once in this return.

Sewers

Two sewer treatments were carried out during the year in accordance with Ministry requirements.

24 manholes were prebaited in the Bewdley area and 16 in Wribbenhall. All points were twice revisited, but no "takes" were recorded.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND SALVAGE

In addition to house refuse, trade refuse is collected and disposed of by controlled tipping at a site approximately 14 miles from the town centre.

A limited amount of trade refuse is retained for salvage (cartons, containers, etc.), and a total quantity of 8 tons 8 cwts. 1 qr. was collected and sold during the year.
