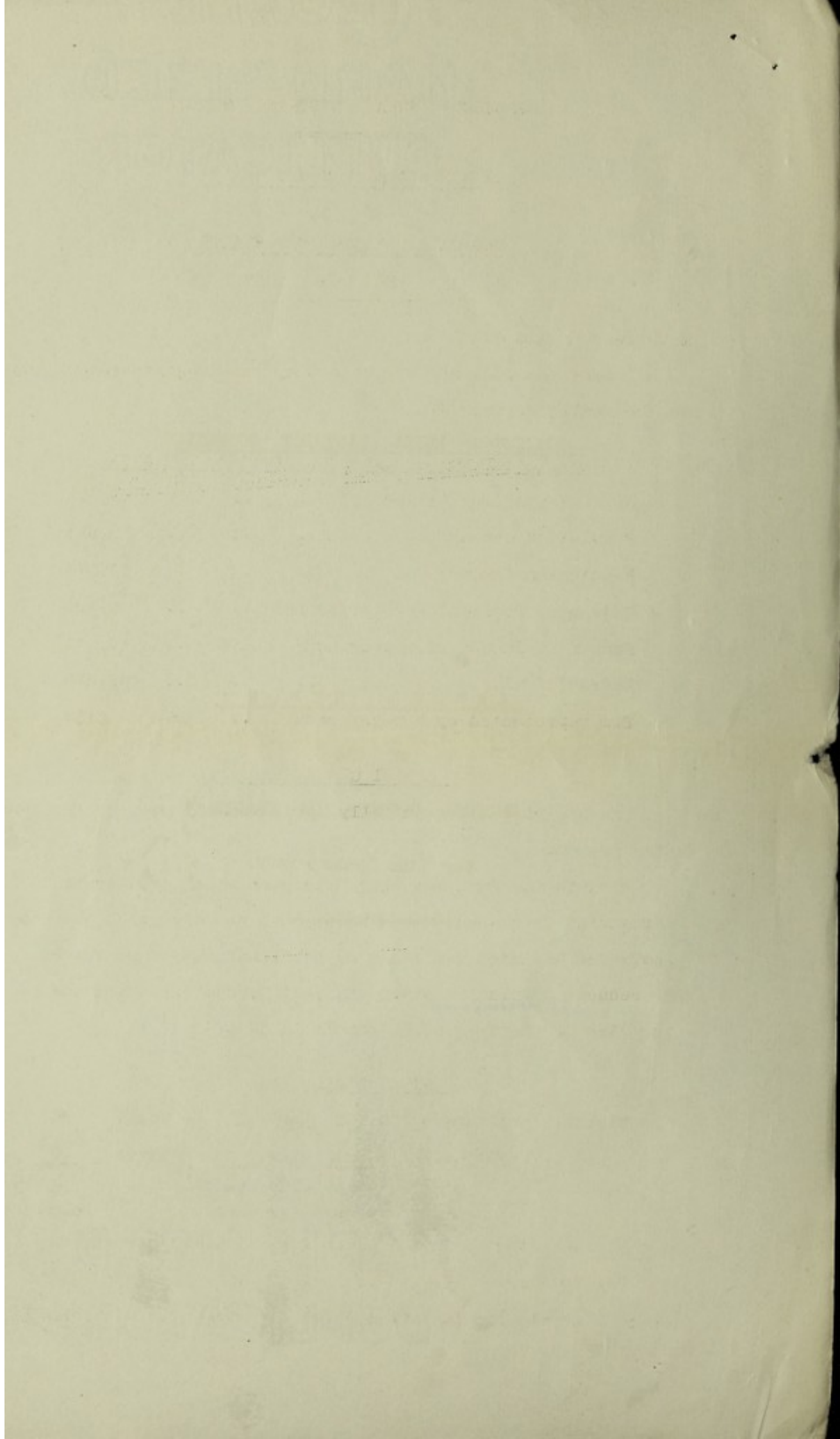

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA.

The particulars furnished in previous Annual Reports are still applicable, no special alterations or developments having taken place during the year.

Public Health Officers of the Local Authority:-

The Medical Officer of Health acts for the Leicestershire & Rutland Combined Districts in which this District is included.

The Sanitary Inspector is also Surveyor and is a whole time officer.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

Water:-

The Leicester Corporation's water is laid on in parishes adjoining Leicester and in the village of Great Glen. A Contract has now been approved for Extension of Water Mains to Houghton-on-the-Hill and Billesdon.

Fourteen samples of well water were analysed during the year six proving unsuitable for drinking. Two wells were closed, 17 were cleansed or repaired and in 67 instances the public supply was laid on in lieu of well-water, the latter being at Great Glen.

Drainage & Sewerage:-

There have been no important extensions during the year. Seven cesspools were abolished.

Public Cleansing:-

The parishes of Thurnby, Scraptoft, Houghton, Hungarton and Stoughton, are now scavenged by direct labour, the refuse being disposed of by a well managed system of controlled tipping at a suitable site in the parish of Stoughton. There is also excellent provision for the emptying of cesspools, and night soil is disposed of by trenching in arable land.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONER OF THE GENERAL LAND OFFICE

The Commission has the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 10th inst. and in reply to inform you that the same has been forwarded to the proper authorities for their consideration.

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Great Glen and Burton Overy are scavenged by contractors without suitable transport and without controlled tipping. It is far from satisfactory and I am of opinion that these and indeed all the larger villages should be included in the Council's scheme.
