In accordance with the instructions of the Ministry of Health, I deal briefly in this report with matters within my responsibility regarding public health and preventive medicine.

These statistics are very satisfactory.

The Death Rate is very low, and an analysis of the causes of death shows that those most prevalent in this district are associated with advancing years, to a large extent inevitable.

The small number of deaths among infants is most gratifying, and is evidence that the health and welfare of new arrivals is receiving careful attention. In this connection it should be noted that during the year the County Council opened an Infant Welfare Centre in Houghton-on-the-Hill.

## SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

## 1. WATER

During the year, 15 samples of drinking water were taken from wells and all were found to be unsatisfactory.

Five wells were closed, six cleansed, and, with regard to the remainder, the owners of the property were requested, as a supply was readily available, to lay on a mains supply.

Progress made with regard to schemes for supplying mains water in various parts of the district is as follows:-

- TILTON. During the year, the work of laying a main to this village was commenced and is expected to be completed early in 1948.
- FRISBY, GAULBY AND KING'S NORTON. The laying on of a supply for these villages has been approved and the work is expected to commence very soon.
- CARLTON CURLIEU. A scheme for supplying this village has been approved and the work will be proceeded with immediately labour and materials are available.
- KEYHAM. All formalities with regard to the provision of a piped supply to Keyham have been completed and the work will be commenced as soon as possible.
- SKEFFINGTON. This village is in urgent need of a piped supply, and, at the present time, a scheme is in course of preparation.

#### WATER SHORT AGE.

During the year, wells in the villages of Tilton and Cold Newton "dried up" and it was found necessary to cart drinking water.

## 2. DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

The number of cesspools in the District at the end of 1947 was 483 and during the year some 4000 emptyings were carried out.

Over 100 inspections were made of sewers and outfall dykes. Where the sewers were found to be fractured or choked, immediate repairs were carried out. All outfall ditches receiving effluent were cleansed.

With regard to the new housing estates at Tilton and Houghton, proper disposal works were constructed to deal with the sewage from these.

Where it was possible, all sewers, tanks and dykes receiving effluent were treated to prevent infestation by rats.

A scheme for the provision of sewers and installation of disposal works at Great Glen and Burton Overy has been approved by the Ministry of Health.

## 4. PUBLIC CLEANS ING.

Continued improvement in this service was noticed during the year.

Proper vehicles are now being used which eases the work considerably and provides more hygienic collection.

Towards the end of the year, a further 22 parishes were added to the scheme and now the whole of the district is receiving a regular house refuse, nightsoil and cesspool emptying service.

Nightsoil and the contents of cesspools are tipped on agricultural land, whilst household refuse is disposed of by controlled tipping.

## 4. THURNBY CAMP (Continued).

Attempts have been made to divide each hut to provide separate living and sleeping accommodation, and, where necessary, additional windows have been fixed.

It is regrettable that many of the huts show evidence of neglect and wilful damage in spite of the efforts which the Council has made to improve living conditions.

# 5. RURAL HOUSING SURVEY.

This Survey was carried out at the instigation of the Ministry of Health with the object of obtaining information regarding housing conditions and needs in rural districts. The following shows the categories in which the various houses in this district have been placed:-

The houses were placed in five classes.

1. Houses which were fit for habitation.

2. Houses with minor defects.

- Houses requiring extensive repair. 3.
- 4. Houses requiring reconditioning.
  5. Houses requiring demolition on account of their inability to be brought up to standard at reasonable expense.

These classifications were made bearing in mind the terms of the Public Health Act, 1936, the Housing Act, 1936 and the provision of local Byelaws.

## GENERAL OBSERVATIONS ON HOUSING IN THE DISTRICT. 6.

We are still very restricted in our powers for dealing with unfit houses. Demolition is only advised when a house becomes unsafe, and during the year this course was taken in regard to one house at Owston. Urgent and necessary repairs have been dealt with informally, but we are hampered by the Building Licences Regulations which keep this class of work to a minimum. The result of these restrictions is an increasing need for general overhaul in many working class houses.

## 7. ERECTION OF HOUSES BY LOCAL AUTHORITY.

- 20 houses have been completed at Great Glen.
- 12 Swedish Houses have been completed.
- 24. houses at Billesdon are nearing completion.
- 10 houses at Houghton " " "
- 12 Airey houses at Tilton are in course of erection.

In addition, a scheme for 12 houses at Hungarton has been prepared and tenders will be in early in the new year.

Sites have also been selected in another seven villages and it is hoped that sanction will be obtained for the erection of houses thereon.

These figures show that the Council is pursuing a vigorous housing policy, and represent a considerable achievement.

Scarlet Fever. The scarlet fever cases were of the mild type prevalent nowadays, and many of the cases had very slight symptoms. This infection has changed considerably in virulence and is now probably less serious in childhood than measles. Its mildness makes it more difficult to check when there are so many missed cases and contacts.

Anterior Poliomyelitis (Infantile Paralysis), caused a good deal of anxiety to Health Departments throughout the country during the summer months. In this district we fortunately only had two cases. One case was a child in Thurnby Camp and the true nature of the disease was not ascertained until the mother had taken the child to a City Hospital for advice in regard to a limp. The disease is not readily spread by contact and our knowledge as to its causation is still incomplete.

## DIPHTHERIA IMMUNISATION.

During the year, 86 children under 5 and 2 children over 5 were immunised.

72 children were given a "Boosting" dose.

In addition, we made arrangements for 30 children to be immunised, and although at the time of writing our records in regard to these cases have not been completed, it is most probable that the majority have been dealt with.

It is known that a number have been done privately.

The above facts and figures show that the rate of progress previously reported is being maintained, and that the working of the scheme is satisfactory. From all the information at my disposal I can say with confidence that between 80% and 90% of the "under fives" in the district have had protective treatment.

## SCABIES.

During the year 5 cases were treated at the Clinic under my supervision. Our thanks are again due to Mrs. Keay for the valuable services which she has given in checking the spread of this disease in the district.
