Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I beg to submit to you my Annual Report on the health of the District for the year 1965. This has been compiled in accordance with the directions of the Minister of Health.

I have pleasure in reporting a satisfactory state of health in the District. The statistics compare favourably with those for England and Wales.

The population has risen by 300 and is now 21,440.

The Birth Rate has dropped from 14.67 the previous year to 11.93 (adjusted). This compares with 18.0 (estimated) for England and Wales.

The Illegitimate Live Birth Rate increased from 4.8% the previous year to 8.5%.

The population rise is obviously due to influx and would appear to be concentrated mainly in the parts of the District bordering on the City of Leicester.

The Infant Mortality Rate has dropped to 16.94 following a rise the previous year and compares very favourably with that of England and Wales, which was 19.0.

I am pleased to report that there were no Maternal Deaths, this speaks favourably for our maternal and ante-natal services.

The Death Rate has again dropped and is now 10.36 (adjusted). This compares with 11.5 for England and Wales. The chief causes of death were Cardio-Vascular Lesions or diseases, Cancer, Pneumonia and Accidents (mainly road accidents). Although the figures are small, deaths from Pneumonia rose from 3 the previous year to 8. Of this figure, 4 were 75 years or over. The main single reason for cancer deaths was lung cancer and these were all male deaths. We are all well aware of the main cause of this dread disease which lies in our own hands, but then, so does prevention. I refer, of course, to smoking. We must all double our efforts until we show man the folly of his ways and that his lungs were made to breathe fresh air and not smoke and pollution.

The number of notifications of infectious diseases showed a marked decline. This was due mainly to the reduction in Measles notifications, Measles epidemics have shown a tendency to fluctuate, being greatest during alternate years. When a suitable Measles vaccine is readily available, this prevalent and sometimes serious infectious disease will disappear from our midst to join its previous companions, in the limbo of infectious diseases. On the debit side of the account, Scarlet Fever notifications increased



from 6 to 14 and we are reminded of the ever-presence of Tuberculosis - there were 6 notifications. I would like to remind parents that all school children of 13 years are offered vaccination against Tuberculosis. My Report shows that in the only High School in the District where I, in fact, carried out the skin testing and vaccination, the acceptance rate was 80%. Whilst this response was good, one must aim for 100% acceptance. This reflects the insatiable need for more and more health education and embracing all our social activities.

Your Chief Public Health Inspector has covered the field of environmental hygiene most thoroughly in the latter part of this report so I refrain from further comment.

I have enjoyed the full co-operation of Mr. J.W. Stephenson, Surveyor and Chief Public Health Inspector and I express my thanks both to him and the other members of the staff for their willing and efficient assistance. May I also express my gratitude to the staff of the other departments and to the Council Members for their help and encouragement during the year.
