Work came to a halt at the Houghton on the Hill Sewage Works when the contractor became bankrupt and completion is being undertaken utilizing small local builders. Work is proceeding well in constructing a new sewerage system and sewage disposal works at Hungarton.

Newton Harcourt (constructed 1961)

Enlargement of the Tilton works to cater for new development is becoming necessary and a scheme has been prepared to add to the Billesdon Works to meet the needs of the Village Plan. The Stoughton Works must be critically assessed when local farmers remove all farm wastes from the sewers.
